

# World Churches Council Names U.S. Man President

GENEVA (AP) — The World Council of Churches has elected Dr. Eugene Carson Blake of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. as its head. He immediately called for increased efforts toward the unity of Christendom.

He also pleaded for "reconciliation across all the divisions of our world."

Dr. Blake was named general secretary of the world council, and organization grouping 214 Protestant, Old Catholic, Orthodox and Anglican churches in more than 60 countries, including Canada. He replaces the founder of the organization, Dr.

W. A. Visser't Hooft of Holland, who is leaving office after 15 years.

Dr. Blake, 59, executive head of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., and leading figure in civil rights movements, directed his first words to unity moves with the Roman Catholic Church.

**UNITY PRIME AIM**

The primary thing is the movement under God for the unity and renewal of the church for its mission," he told the 100-member policy-making central committee which elected him.

"This mission includes a ministry of reconciliation, not only of God and man and of confessional and church divisions, but also a reconciliation across all the divisions of our world—divisions caused by geography, culture, race, poverty, affluence, ideology, sin and fear which, unless reconciled by the gospel, will prevent world peace and ever threaten world disaster."

Dr. Blake's election drew immediate applause from two representatives of the Vatican attending the meeting as observers.

"We are greatly pleased with Dr. Blake, he will certainly have our prayers," said Rev. Jerome

Hamer and Rev. John F. Long. "We Roman Catholics are also confident that with Dr. Blake we will continue to share that same spirit of loyalty, frankness and understanding which characterized our relations with Dr. Visser't Hooft."

After naming Dr. Blake, the central committee convened to study reports of the second Vatican ecumenical council as part of a continuing drive to bring about unity of the two churches. Dr. Lukas Vischer of Switzerland, who attended the Vatican council as a protestant representative, described it as a beginning of a new era in the life of the church.

But Dr. Vischer underlined major problems separating catholicism and protestantism, saying:

The council did not solve the problem of how the churches are to live in one fellowship. The Roman Catholic Church and the World Council of Churches stand beside each other without having become clear how the ecumenical movement, which is one, can be expressed as one.

"The question of our reciprocal relations will probably have to accompany us for a while without being solved."

# Wabush Firm Pushes Plans For Repairing Damaged Plant

WABUSH, Labrador (CP)—Company officials have made plans to repair the damage from a five-hour fire last week that raged through the seven-month-old main mill building of Wabush Mines here.

The blaze, believed to have been started by a welding torch spark, knocked the cornerstone industry out of production but how long the work will be stopped could not be determined immediately. Initial estimates of the damage range around \$25,000,000.

The question of layoffs among the 1,020-man work force which pours \$400,000 monthly into the western Labrador community of 2,700 also remained up in the air.

"At the moment," said Bud Mapes, director of public relations for Pickands Mather Co. Ltd. of Cleveland, "we don't anticipate any change in employment. . . . We don't anticipate any layoff . . . at least, any wholesale layoff."

The cleanup work and restoration, it was hoped, would absorb idle workers until full production is resumed.

**MENTIONS DATE:**

Gordon Puskie, Newfoundland representative of Wabush Mines, said the fire appeared to be less serious than first indicated and production on a limited scale might resume in three months, with full production within a year.

An investigation is underway and a more accurate picture might be possible within a week, another company spokesman said.

# Increased University Grants To Be Paid In 3 Installments

OTTAWA (CP)—The increased federal operating grants to Canadian universities and colleges for the 1966-67 academic year will be paid in three instalments, Prime Minister Pearson disclosed when letters to the premiers were tabled in the Commons.

The letters, written about the time Mr. Pearson last month announced the increase in grants to \$5 per capita from \$2, say in interim payment will be made in September based on an estimate of the provinces' populations.

A second payment will be made in January, 1967, when total enrollment and the number of out-of-province students is known. Final payment will be made in early May, 1967.

Provinces with a higher proportion of out-of-province students are to receive an extra amount.

Estimated total amounts each province will receive: Newfoundland \$2,280,000; Prince Edward Island \$615,000; Nova Scotia \$5,055,000; New Brunswick \$4,040,000; Ontario \$33,370,000; Manitoba \$5,090,000; Saskatchewan \$4,485,000; Alberta \$7,050,000; British Columbia \$3,890,000.

In nine provinces the money will be divided among universities according to a formula worked out by the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada. But in Quebec there will be a cash payment of about \$17,350,000 because that province opposes direct federal aid to education. This represents the extra \$3 per capita. The \$2 grant was made available through a one-per-cent abatement in corporation taxes.

In his reply to Mr. Pearson's letter, Premier Lesage of Quebec said his province is prepared to accept the payments "as unconditional."

The prime minister's letters to all premiers were identical. He emphasized that the extra grants are an interim arrangement pending a federal-provincial conference to discuss the whole field of financing education.

Mr. Pearson said he would write at a later date to discuss education at a conference scheduled for this summer in Victoria.

# CONTRACT BRIDGE

One of the most dramatic opening leads ever made occurred several years ago on the television show championship bridge. The millions of fans who were watching the weekly broadcast saw Alphonse Moysse, editor of the Bridge World magazine, make a brilliant but unsuccessful opening lead against the final contract of four hearts.

Moysse selected the king of diamonds as his lead, a startling choice considering that he had neither the queen nor the ace to back up the king. While Moysse had a good reason for his lead, it turned out that he had made virtually the only lead that could give declarer the contract.

South took the king with the ace and cashed the Q-J discarding three spades from dummy. He then led the king of hearts.

Moysse took the king with the ace and played the A-Q of spades, but declarer ruffed high in dummy and played another heart to bring the hand to a conclusion. The only tricks South lost were a spade and two trumps.

Note that Moysse would have defeated the contract, even with a diamond lead, if only he had not led the king. It was the king play which shattered the defense.

A diamond lead was certainly reasonable on the bidding though it is true that the lead of the ace and another spade would have been more impressive.

Moysse's thinking was that once he had decided to lead a diamond, he was in effect hoping that East had the queen. Having made this assumption, Moysse thought that the king lead would be more effective because it would create an entry to East's hand for a lead through South's supposed king of spades.

It was a beautiful theory all right, and perhaps Moysse's imaginative play should have been suitably rewarded, but the way things worked out, he is still busy these days trying to live down the disastrous effect of his brilliant opening lead.
