NANAIMO, B.C. (AP)—Namu, the whale, might be losing the affection of his family, but he certainly is building a flock of other devoted followers.

The 22-foot killer whale is being fed the finest of salmon, his every whistle is recorded for posterity, the resources of part of the towboat business and commercial fishing have been put at his disposal and he has a growing publicity department of reporters and magazine writers.

While he loafs along in his sea-going pen, under tow from the northern coast of British Columbia to Seattle aquarium, his keepers are growing haggard from lack of sleep and nervous strain.

The four-ton whale's cruise south began 13 days ago at Namu, B.C., after Namu was taken captive there when he became entangled in the nets of two salmon fishermen.

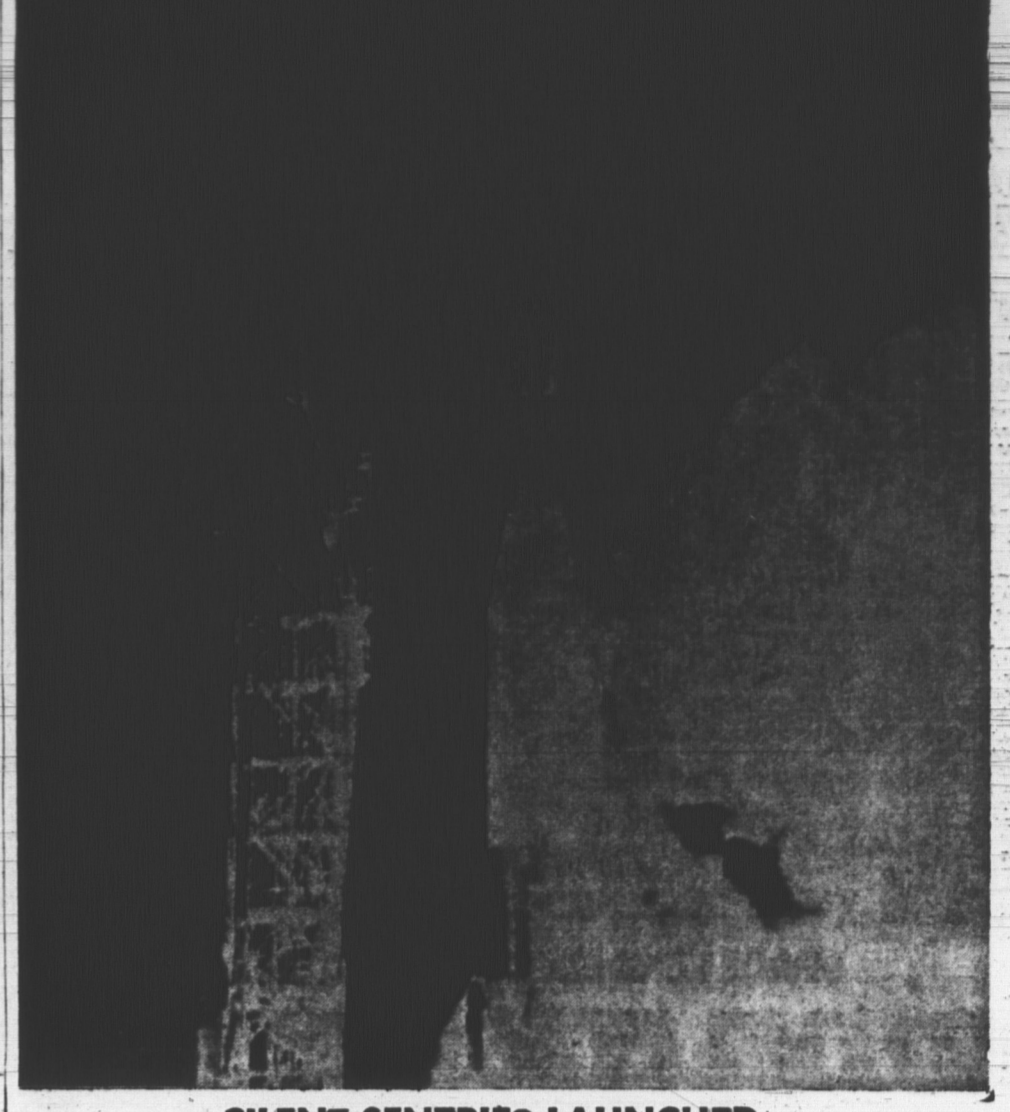

SILENT Sentries LAUNCHED

Twin silent sentry satellites headed Tuesday for space outposts over 69,000 miles from the earth following launch from Cape Kennedy with an Atlas-Agena rocket. Soon after the rocket had thundered from its launching pad at 3.27 a.m. (EST), the twin satellites and a tiny hitching radiation satellite entered a highly elliptical orbit ranging from 132 to 69,750 miles from the earth. The twin satellites are expected to be positioned in their final orbits by Thursday. The hitchhiker will remain in the transfer orbit. Twin satellites will police the nuclear test ban. (AP Wirephoto)

Small Firm In Guelph, Ont. Contributes To Space Effort

GUELPH, Ont. (CP) - When the first of two new rockets had built shattered on firing, Michael Valeriot decided his idea of using glass fibre as lightweight space material was "quite hopeless".

Glass fibre has never been used in building rockets before but Mr. Valeriot and his brother Pacific had hopes they had discovered a material much lighter than steel that would travel farther in space.

Their projectiles weighed 100 pounds less than conventional steel rockets.

The brothers built their rockets at their small Guelph shop, Valeriot Electronics Ltd., which has only 25 employees. They persuaded McGill University scientists to help them fire the missiles from their base in the Barbados.

The McGill scientists had been co-operating with the U.S. army for two years in taking scientific measurements of upper-atmosphere conditions by firing instrument "shells" from giant naval gun. In June 1963, Martlet II, a McGill-built rocket, set a world record for high altitude, gun-fired probes into the upper atmosphere.

A 50-foot extension was now added to the giant gun to gain extra velocity. The gun became the longest of its type in the world.

The Valeriot's gamble on glass fibre seemed lost March 26 when the first rocket exploded even before it left the gun barrel. But Dr. G. V. Bull, director of McGill's High Altitude Research Project, refused to be discouraged. Five hours later he ordered a second countdown.

Powered by 1,000 pounds of explosive, the 450-pound rocket hurtled into the sky over the Atlantic.

With the successful firing the little Guelph firm had made an important contribution to space research.

The Valeriot brothers first became interested in rocketry and space as a sideline to their main business which is manufacturing a variety of products primarily for defence purposes. They began marketing rocket shells six years ago.

From these tentative beginnings their involvement has mushroomed to the point where Michael Valeriot is now building a tracking station on his Puslinch Township farm for the Canadian Rocket Society, of which the brothers are co-founders.

Two Eskimo youths were among the workers who helped to build the Valeriot's glass fibre rocket.

After he heard the publisher of the Edmonton Journal urge Canadians to worry about problems at home before they helped the under-developed countries, Michael Valeriot arranged for his company to bring in and train the two Eskimos.

With the help of the northern affairs department, David Pinzark, 21, and Adam Tomassie, 22, were brought from Payne Bay in northern Quebec to Guelph and settled in a comfortable boarding house to "make them as independent as possible."

Both Eskimos are high school graduates who would have had little opportunity to use their education at home. David is learning rubber moulding and Adam is becoming proficient at the hand lathe.

Wholesale Price Index Up In June

OTTAWA (CP) - The June wholesale price index rose 1.1 per cent from May with the animal products group largely responsible for the increase, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported Tuesday.

The May index of 249.2 rose to 252 in June. The latter figure was also 2.7 per cent above the June, 1964 figure of 245.4. The 1955-59 price period equals 100.

Six of the eight major groups in the index went up from May to June, but the sharpest increase was in the animal-product group. Reflecting higher prices for livestock, fresh and cured meats, it rose 5.3 per cent to 274 from 260.1.

In other May-June increases price increases for potatoes, livestock and poultry feeds helped raise the vegetable index seven-tenths of one percent to 221 from 219.4.

Contract Awarded At Saint John

OTTAWA (CP) - A \$425,000 contract for dredging at Courtenay Bay, Saint John, N.B., has been awarded to Harbor Development of Saint John; the works department announced Tuesday.

The contract calls for removal of 662,000 cubic yards of material to provide a channel depth of 20 feet at low water ordinary spring tide for large oil tankers.

The department also announced two other contracts for a wharf extension and an access road.

The wharf extension, at Charlottetown, was awarded to Gulf Maritime Construction Ltd., of Matane, Que., for \$145,450.

The \$85,105 contract for an eight-mile road to the light house at Cape St. Mary's on Placentia Bay on the south shore of Newfoundland, went to All Sales Equipment Contracting Ltd., St. John's, Nfld.

WANT CAPITAL SHIFT

PARIS (Reuters) - A pressure group has been set up here to try to persuade the French government to set up a new political and administrative capital away from Paris. The group, which includes former army officers, businessmen and local councillors, says Paris is being strangled by its rapid increase in population. It also is too vulnerable to nuclear attack.

TO MEET NIKITA

CAIRO (AP) - Egypt's President Gamal Abdel Nasser will meet Nikita Khrushchev during his visit to Moscow starting Aug. 27, informed sources said Tuesday. Nasser was reported to have asked to see the deposed Soviet premier through the Soviet embassy here last week.
