# Stiff Judgement Awarded In Suit

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN — One of the largest judgments ever awarded in the province arising from a car accident was handed down by Justice Mark R. McGuigan in the Supreme Court of P.E.I. Friday.

The plaintiff in the suit was Thomas Dwyer of RCAF Summerside and the defendant, Hans Egbert Wilms, also an airman at the time of the accident, and the total judgment amounted to \$19,538.66.

The suit arose from a motor vehicle accident on March 29, 1963, on the Sherbrooke Road east of St. Eleanor's.

At the time of the accident Dwyer was stopped on the side of the road and standing in front of his car working on the engine in an attempt to get it started. A second vehicle was parked in front of Dwyer's car with its headlights shining on the plaintiff's car.

The defendant's car struck Dwyer's vehicle from the rear, jamming him between the bumpers of the two vehicles which were at a standstill.

Dwyer spent some two months in the RCAF station hospital here and later transferred to a service hospital in Halifax where consequently one of his legs was amputated above the knee.

In handing down the judgment Mr. Justice McGuigan said he found no negligence on the part of the plaintiff.

He awarded the plaintiff \$6,538.66 for special damages and \$13,000 in general damages plus the court costs for the suit.

Counsel for the plaintiff was G. Bruce MacDonald of Summerside and defence counsel were John P. Nicholson of Charlottetown and J. Melville Campbell of Summerside.

# Hog Producers Hit Records

Prince Edward Island hog producers achieved quality and quantity records in hog production in 1964.

Provincial livestock director Lou Roper said yesterday the percentage of Grade A hogs marketed last year reached 57.9, the highest Grade A percentage in history.

The Grade A percentage in 1963 was 56.1.

The number of hogs marketed last year was 90,171. This is more than 11,000 higher than the 1963 mark of 79,928.

Beef cattle production also increased last year.

Mr. Roper said that 15,167 head were delivered to packing plants in 1964, compared to 14,570 head in 1963. "In addition," said Mr. Roper, "about 7,000 were processed at smaller establishments such as slaughterhouses. This number was also an increase over 1963."

# Potato Market Shows Increased Strength

Potatoes were bringing about \$2.25 per bag to the producer at the farm in bulk yesterday, one Charlottetown dealer told The Guardian last night and "the prospects are for an even stronger market, though one can never be sure of potato trends."

"I was talking this afternoon," he said, "with buyers in Minneapolis who told me that the potatoes in Idaho, and some of the western states, are being cleaned up at \$6.00 per bag to the grower ungraded." The spuds there are pretty well cleaned up, the Charlottetown man was told.

Apparently there are no potatoes in the west and the market should be strong until the Florida and California crops come on the market, which will probably not be until March, he observed.

"I've had enquiries for potatoes from as far west in Canada as Vancouver, and with the demand brisk and from such widely separated centres, the market cannot help but be strong," he observed.

The movement is good, he added, though there is a shortage of refrigerator cars noticed right now.

# Improper Disposal In Sewage Seen Necessitating Warning

KENSINGTON — Payment of bills to the amount of \$1,812.09 was agreed upon at last night's annual meeting of Kensington-Town Council.

In connection with new sidewalks laid recently on Victoria Street West, council decided all properties where frontage on former temporary sidewalks had been paid would be credited with this amount on assessment of the new sidewalks.

Many complaints had been received regarding improper disposal into sewage of paper towels and other articles, causing expensive maintenance and possible stoppage in homes. It was decided to issue warnings to all homes and institutions in this regard.

Fire Chief Bruce MacLeod reported 10 calls were answered from outside the town during the year, and two in town.

Two requests received from outside town were refused, as those involved were not registered with the fire systems fund.

The report also stated one fireman moved away, and was replaced. Council moved a vote of thanks to the chief and firemen for their efficient services.

Coun. Lynwood Toombs, chairman of the streets committee, reported sidewalks laid on Victoria Street West and widening and curbing of Victoria Street East.

A returning officer, clerk and doorkeeper for the municipal elections, Feb. 2, were named, subject to their acceptance.
