

LABOUR: LACK OF CONTROL KILL

(RNR/CUP)— If your job is deadly boring, it may be deadly...period.

A new study by American and Swedish researchers has uncovered a strong link between heart disease and people working at dull, non-decision-making jobs. According to preliminary findings, too few decisions are more dangerous than too many, and mail sorters run a higher risk of heart disease than corporate executives.

Other dangerous jobs include those where machines dictate the pace, and jobs where workers spend most of their time in contact with the general public.

Researcher Robert Karasek of Columbia University says these jobs are as risky as smoking or high cholesterol. Workers with the least chance of being bored to death: those in outdoor jobs like forestry and conservation, skilled professionals, and craft workers like blacksmiths.

Researchers say one way to eliminate the health hazards of tedious work would be to give workers more control over what they do.
