The Mechanics' Bank of Montreal has suspended and closed its doors. The event does not cause much excitement.

Last night some evil disposed persons pulled down a telegraph post at Mr. McCallum's farm, Clyde River, and broke the wire in several places. Such vandalism should not go unpunished.

A VERY large attendance at the market today. Prices are the same as on Tuesday, with the exception of butter, which is falling.

A PROCLAMATION in the Canada Gazette sets down Thursday, the 3rd of July next, for polling in the Canada Temperance Act in Queen's County outside of Charlottetown.

The members of the Licensing Board met yesterday evening. Three licenses were considered, but they will not pass until the next meeting, which will be called by the Chairman.

The steamer *Carroll* cleared for Boston yesterday evening, with a cargo consisting of 1,937 bags and 1,198 bbls. potatoes, 826 cases and 11 barrels of eggs, and 368 cases of lobsters. The total value of the cargo is \$9,050—by no means a small spring shipment.

CAN our City Fathers do anything to allay the clouds of dust which are to-day blinding and choking our citizens, filling their stores and destroying their goods? The passage through Queen Street this afternoon was something horrible. Thick dust clouds were floating in every direction, and in many instances persons had to seek refuge from them in stores. A small effort on the part of the City Council would remedy this evil. We hope that body will consider the matter at their sitting to-night.

On Sunday last, four men, named Joseph Stephenson, Isaac Field, George Deshaw and Teraphin Martin, left Valleyfield, Que., in a sailboat, intending to sail a few hours on the lake. As they did not return on Sunday Sunday evening, it was supposed that, finding the wind too strong, they had put into port until it would subside. On Tuesday morning a party was started in search of them, and found the boat washed ashore bottom up, about three miles above the village, and the body of the man Fielding a little distance from it. It is supposed that all four have been lost.

The wife of Mr. Joseph D. Seaman, carriage builder, died very suddenly at her residence last night. Mrs. Seaman retired in her usual good health. Towards one o'clock she awoke and remarked that she was very warm. Immediately afterwards she felt a choking sensation in the throat, and about five minutes later fell back on her pillow and expired. Mrs. Seaman was a young woman—married but a short time. She was daughter of Mr. Charles Hartz, and was universally respected and esteemed. We tender Mr. Seaman and the parents of the deceased our heartfelt sympathy.
