## INTERESTING TO MILITIAMEN

Deputy Minister of Militia to be Superannuated.

Ordered to Halifax—An Important Exchange Foreshadowed.

OTTAWA, Oct. 15.—Colonel Panet Deputy Minister of Militia, is to be superannuated shortly. He is almost certain to be succeeded by a French-Canadian officer.

OTTAWA, Oct. 15.—The 22nd Battalion Royal Canadian Regiment has been ordered to Halifax to take the place of the Royal Berkshires who go to Bermuda. It is not unlikely that eventually an exchange will be made between four companies of the Royal Canadian and companies of the R. R. C. I. of London, Toronto, St. John and Fredericton.

## The Atlantic Service.

OTTAWA, Oct. 15.—Tenders for the Atlantic Service must be submitted today. Hugh Allan, of the Allan Line, and William Macpherson of the Dominion Line, have arrived in Ottawa, and the inference is that these lines will put in joint tenders.

## Convicted of Murder.

HALIFAX, Oct. 15.—Henry Davidson was convicted by the jury yesterday at Antigonish of the murder of Charles Bowman at the Tracadie picnic. Life imprisonment will probably be the sentence.

## The Vice Regal Visit.

ST. JOHN, Oct. 15.—Lord and Lady Aberdeen arrived at midnight and will remain at the station till this forenoon when the Mayor will escort them to the Royal Hotel as the guests of the city.

## Jewish Children Attending School.

MONTREAL, Oct. 15.—The Jews have six hundred pupils attending one Protestant school which has been practically deserted by Protestants.

## The Muddy Meetings.

MONTREAL, Oct. 15.—While in the city Dwight L. Moody received a telegram from Lord Aberdeen regretting that his presence in Prince Edward Island prevented his attendance at the Ottawa meeting.

## LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

TAPACHULA, Mexico, Oct. 13.—Fuentes and Morales, two leaders of the revolution in Guatemala have reached here having abandoned their country learning that Barrios had sent large forces against them. Many revolutionists are fleeing.

HALIFAX, Oct. 13.—Herring fishing on this coast has been a failure this season and the only hope of the poor people on the shore was mackerel. Those are coming. Today as high as 700, 600 and 500 fish to the flat were got at Portuguese and Herring coves. Some of the fish weighed 3½ pounds. Several seines went down from Halifax this forenoon.

MONTREAL, Oct. 13.—The Star's London cable says: British exports to Canada de-

clined £12,000 or 4 per cent. in September, and £368,000, or 13 per cent. in nine months ending September, as compared with the same period last year. In the item of railroad iron alone the decrease in British exports fell £120,000 in nine months. The imports from Canada increased £583,000 or 32 per cent in September, and £2,141,000, or 24 per cent in the nine months ending with September.

MONTREAL, Oct. 13.—The Gazette's Newfoundland correspondent says: In the opinion of those best qualified to judge, the shortage of the codfishery this year will be not less than 400,000 quintals, comparing it with a good average fishery for other years. The entire catch will probably reach a million quintals. The Labrador fishery is one of the worst for many years.

LONDON, October 12.—The Berlin correspondent of the Standard says it is asserted there that Russia, Japan and the United States have already assented to the assumption of the title of emperor by the king of Corea, but China intends to protest.

AUSTIN, Texas, Oct. 12.—This afternoon, in broad daylight and within twelve miles of the limits of the city, the south bound cannon-ball train on the International and Great Northern, consisting of mail, baggage and express cars, three coaches loaded with passengers, was held up by four men and robbed. Conductor Tom Healy was shot by the robbers while resisting them, but was not seriously wounded. A passenger had his shirt collar carried away by a pistol ball aimed at his neck, and another received a bullet wound in the hand. The passengers were robbed of \$200 in money. The bandits attempted to rifle the safe in the express car, but were unsuccessful.

TARTE UNLIKE MACKENZIE.—His great schemes for railway extension and combinations, when encouraged by a Minister of the Crown, only excite the cupidity of "promoters," "contractors," "hoodlers," and other harpies who prey upon the country when extravagantly governed. Instead of "encouraging" wild-cat schemes and talking about dazzling projects, a prudent Minister of Public Works should rather assume the attitude of Mr. Alexander MacKenzie, and lie on his arms night and day against the combination of political enemies and friends who by such work-assail the national treasury.—Montreal Witness.

## ENGLAND IN EGYPT.

France Withdraws Her Opposition to the British Occupation of Egypt.

LONDON, Oct. 13.—France has withdrawn for the present her opposition to the British occupation of Egypt. This news, which is of the highest diplomatic importance and significance, comes from a source which entitles it to full credence, although there will probably be no official confirmation for several weeks. The announcement the other day that Lord Salisbury had conceded everything France claimed in Tunis has been received with astonishment and bitter though silent resentment by his own party, and savage denunciation by the Opposition press and leaders. Lord Salisbury can well afford to hide his time under such attacks, when he has, or thinks he has, acquired Egypt in exchange for giving France a free title in Tunis. A little serious thought ought to have convinced even the bitterest enemies of the Prime Minister that he would hardly make such a sweeping and important concession without any quid pro quo except a paltry five per cent. duty on sugar. Lord Salisbury has been yielding all along the line since the beginning of the present Ministry, wherever stern pressure was applied, but nobody ever knew him to give away a good thing in diplomacy voluntarily and without compulsion. If he has gained a free hand to Egypt he has certainly got the best of the present bargain, for it is practically certain that no other power will interfere if France is satisfied.
