Both teams sent every player to the plate at least once in the opening frame. Boston scored twice more in the second.

# Dodgers Trim A's In Hall Of Fame Baseball Game

COOPERSTOWN, N. Y., July 23 — (AP) — The National League-leading Brooklyn Dodgers broke loose in the ninth inning of the annual hall-of-fame baseball game today, overpowering Philadelphia Athletics 3-4 on two-run homers by Carl Furillo and Cal Abrams.

Up to this point Joe Coleman held the Dodgers fairly well in check except for the second inning, when he gave them three runs by issuing six bases on balls.

# Murphy Knocks Out Rindone In Fight

BOSTON, July 23 — (AP) — Irish Bob Murphy, the slugging southpaw from San Diego, Calif., today knocked out Joe Rindone of Boston in the fifth round of their 10-round return boxing bout.

While thus ensuring his next month's crack at Joe Makim's light heavyweight title, Murphy made good use of his 11 1/4 pounds edge over the Bostonian, who weighed 164.

Murphy's finishing punch was a terrific left hook to the head that dropped Rindone for the count at 2:02 in the fifth. Until that session started, Rindone was only a few points behind his bruising opponent.

But Rindone's light blows had little effect.

After being hit at least 20 times in each of the previous rounds, Murphy was convinced that Rindone could not hurt him. So he went out for the kill in the fifth.

# Big Battles This Week In American League

## Anchors And Stars Clash Tonight

The West End Anchors and the East End Stars will be battling it out here this evening at Memorial Field at 8:30 for a second place tie with Falcons in the City Baseball League standing.

Tied in third place at the moment with three wins each, although Stars have a lower win average with one game in hand over Anchors, it should be a clash that will develop into an all-out battle for that extra jump up the league ladder, that will bring one or the other within one game of reaching the leading Northeast Rovers.

Since the second section of the schedule opened last week, all four teams have been making it a very close race for league honors and every game is a vital one from here to the end of the season.

In their last meeting, on July 15th, Stars walloped the Anchors 8-0, and even though they need such a win again tonight to keep up with the rest of the field, Anchors can be depended upon to come out strong and will not be taking any chances of another such blanking.

NEW YORK, July 23 — (AP) — The American League's four top contenders — New York, Boston, Cleveland and Chicago — start clawing away at each other tomorrow and continue to hack away right through Sunday in seven games that may decide the League pennant.

Tomorrow afternoon brings together the League-leading New York Yankees and the runner-up Cleveland Indians in the first of three daylight tilts with the first place definitely at stake.

Boston's Red Sox, tied with Cleveland for second place, wait until dusk to take on the fourth-place Chicago White Sox, also in the first of three games. The White Sox, after leading the race most of the season, have shown signs of sagging, dropping 2 1/2 games behind the leaders.

On Friday, the teams switch. Chicago moves to New York for a four-game series against the Yankees and the Indians travel to Boston for a three-game set with the Red Sox.

Although they have played no better than 500 ball since they left New York July 6, the Yankees once again are in front, a position they held before the takeoff. Their lead, however, is a fractional .002 over the Indians and Red Sox, both of whom are even with the Bombers in games won and lost.

The Yankees, however, are encouraged by the prospect of a 17-game stay at Yankee Stadium where they've won 27 and lost only nine. Also, the arrival of the Indians always seems to spur the Yankees to greatness — at least at the Stadium. The Indians have dropped all six games there this year and the last five in 1950. Not since June 14, 1950, with Bob Lemon on the mound, have the Indians beaten the Yankees in New York.

The Tribe, however, is the hottest club in the league right now. Led by the redoubtable Bob Feller, the Indians have won 22 of their last 27 and eight of their last nine. They've made up eight full games in the last four weeks and figure to be tough right to the end.

The Yankees, handicapped by the absence of Joe DiMaggio on the entire road trip, may have the old locker back in the lineup tomorrow.

The White Sox hope a change of scenery will enable them to regain their winning touch. While their Comiskey Park record is a mediocre 27-26, the White Sox have won 26 and lost only 13 on enemy soil.
