High Noon Now Showing At The Prince Edward

Independent producer Stanley Kramer, who enjoys making pictures that are on the off-beat, chose for his current offering an extraordinary western called "High Noon" starring Gary Cooper who knows how to give just the right amount of scope, color and originality to his role as Marshal Will Kane. A United Artists release, the film is already drawing crowds across the nation, and it opens a three day run at Prince Edward Theatre to-day.

Discriminating adult audience will flock to see "High Noon" just as much as the regulation sagebrush western fans, for it is superbly done, with almost nerve-wracking tension throughout. Cooper's star and the word has never been applied more aptly. His acting is magnificent. The supporting cast is flawless, headed as it is by Thomas Mitchell, Lloyd Bridges, Katy Jurado, Grace Kelly, Otto Kruger, Lon Chaney and Henry Morgan. The story, which takes place in 35 minutes of breathless suspense for the players as well as the hushed audience, concerns ex-Marshall Will Kane, who dons his badge and returns to the little town of Hadleyville forced to fight single-handed four desperate outlaws who had been gone five years. Deserted by his former friends, and temporarily even his bride, Grace Kelly, Kane writes his will and gets his guns ready knowing full well that he may be killed.

There is a constantly mounting climax, with guns blazing viciously—however this reviewer refuses to tell the outcome. All that he will say is that it will keep audience enthralled until the last fadeout.
