Special Meeting Of Montague Town Council

The town clerk of Montague was instructed by the Town Council at a special session last night to publish a notice in the newspaper setting out the day and date when the defaulters list of taxpayers in the town of Montague will be published and returnable before the town magistrate for judgment and execution.

The special meeting was called last evening to discuss means to be employed to collect the \$3,000.00 in tax arrears still outstanding. His Worship, Mayor B. H. Yeo presided. Present were Councillors Hessian, Reynolds, Nicholson and MacLeod.

Following the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting, they were amended to include two additions. The first amendment rescinded the appointment of Mr. R. K. Clements as town magistrate, and the second corrected two items which appeared in the taxpayer's copy of the financial statement for the Town of Montague. Debiture interest which reads \$1,178.25, should read \$80.00. Streets and sidewalks (omitted) should read \$1,178.25. Postage and stationery which reads \$290.03, should read \$199.56 (omitted). The correct disbursement sheet appears on this page.

It was moved that the town policeman compile a list of all dog owners in the Town of Montague for tax purposes.

Following further discussion on tax arrears, the meeting adjourned.

All Government Forces Arrayed To Fight Prairie Cattle Disease



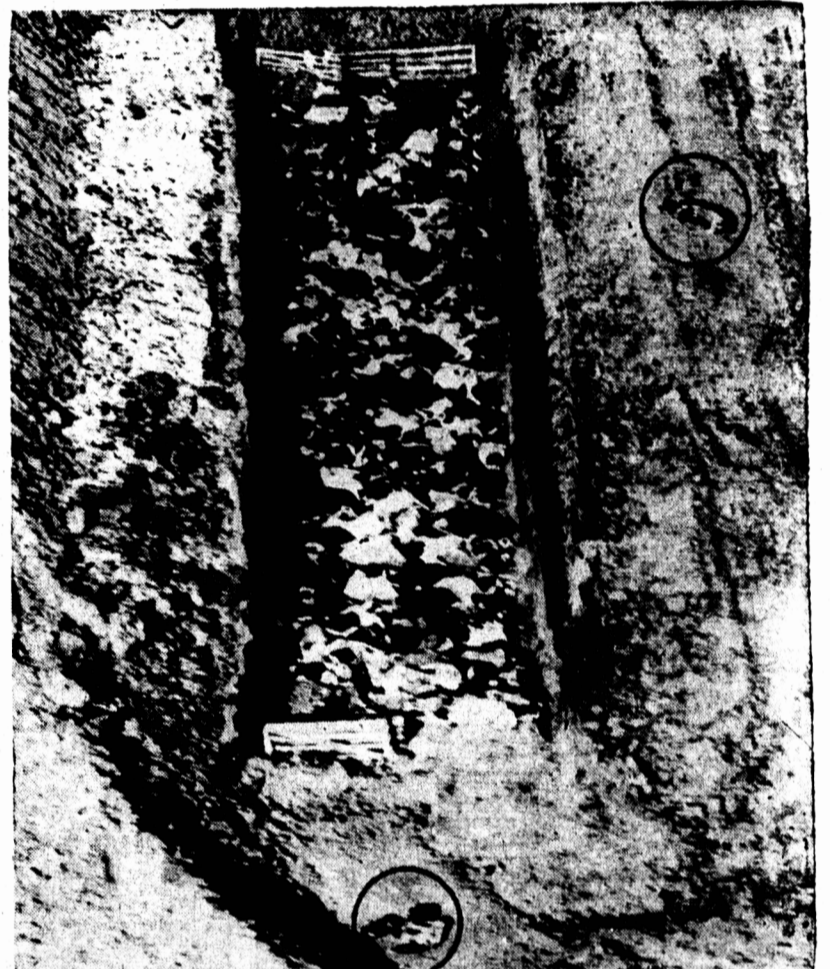
