With the idea that plans and specifications should be drawn up and tenders called for the erection of a High School, so that we will have an actual figure before deciding as to whether or not this City can afford to proceed. When these costs have been placed on a concrete basis, the School Board can determine what share of this expense should be participated in by both the City and the Province.

We would strongly urge that whatever form this additional school accommodation is to take, they give very serious consideration to the outlay of the taxpayers' money and keep it to an absolute minimum. We cannot too strongly urge this upon the School Board. Our bonded indebtedness is now extremely high and our sources of current revenue strained.

While your Finance Committee impresses on the School Board the need of a strict economy, we would at the same time impress upon the members of this Council that, if there is to be an increase in taxation due to these school facilities, that they give study to our present tax structure and try and devise some other means of taxation, whereby the burden of increased taxation will not have to be borne by those taxpayers already paying their share from Real Estate and Personal Property (those paying personal property tax on large stocks of merchandise).

Revenue and Expenditure

The report of the auditors shows a payment to Sinking Fund of \$84,041.15 as against \$59,486.96 in the year 1951, an increase of \$24,554.19.

The explanation of this increase is: There has existed a difference of opinion as to the proper application of the Special Act of 1935 re the partial refunding of certain debenture issues of the City of Charlottetown bonds. The 1951 payment to Sinking Fund was computed on the assumption that bonds issued after the year 1935 were 50% refundable. To clarify this situation the services of Mr. W. A. Morrell were obtained, to ascertain the adequacy of our Sinking Fund.
