THERE were 293 deaths from smallpox in the Roman Catholic parishes of Montreal during the week ending last Friday night.

A SUBSCRIBER to an English newspaper recently died, leaving four years' subscription unpaid. The editor appeared at the grave, and deposited a palm leaf fan, a linen coat, and a thermometer.

THE OLDEST MASON.—The Bridgewater Member claims Jonathan Woodbury, of Middleton, as the oldest Free Mason in Nova Scotia. He was made a Mason in the first lodge in Annapolis in 1818.

AN ANXIOUS contemporary asks: "How shall we irrigate?" There are various ways in which this can be done. Some walk up to the bar and take their straight; others take it home in a jug and irrigate "on the sly." The subject is one concerning which great minds differ.

It is stated in Ottawa that the government has ordered the Indians recently sentenced to death for taking part in the Northwestern rebellion to be hanged on their several reserves, believing that it will have a strong tendency to prevent another Indian rising.

A MAN ROASTED TO DEATH.—Henry Harvey, one of the oldest settlers in Forest, Ont., was literally roasted to death at Toronto on Monday morning last. His house caught fire while the inmates were asleep, but all escaped except Harvey, who died towards evening after most intense suffering.

We regret to learn of the death of Captain James Fraser, of small-pox. His death occurred on Tuesday, after a week's illness. Capt. Fraser was for a time first officer of the Black Diamond Line steamer Cacouana, was unmarried, and at the time of death forty years of age. He was one of the most esteemed residents of Pictou.

SOME parties have recently been trying to pollute Heartz's Pump on Euston Street, and the pump at Chief Justice Palmer's, Queen Street. We sincerely hope the police will be successful in arresting the miscreants, and that His Honor the Stipendiary Magistrate will deal out the punishment they richly deserve.

THE lecture of Joseph Cook on the "Seven Modern Wonders of the World," drew a tremendous audience. For two hours and ten minutes he held his audience spell-bound; and, had he spoken three as long, none would have become weary of listening. His peer never appeared before a Bridgeton audience.—New Jersey Patriot.

GREEN BROTHERS here, last week, bought two oxen from the Indians of Lennox Island, weighing 3,200 pounds. They are of immense size, but in poor condition. After being stalled during winter, they are expected to weigh ten each. Green Bros. showed us also an unusually fine lamb (raised by Mr. Wm Taylor of Bedouque), which dressed 78 lbs.—Summerside Pioneer.

FREDERICK GREINER, the murderer of Margaret Seeling, was hanged in the Franklin County jail, Ohio, on the 18th inst. The execution was witnessed by about seventy-five persons. Greiner was wonderfully cool and self-possessed, mingling with his friends in the jail. He went upon the scaffold with a lighted cigar in his mouth, and uttered only one sentence, bidding all good-by.

A STATEMENT prepared by the Montreal Herald shows that there were interred in the Roman Catholic and Protestant cemeteries of Montreal, from August 29 to October 9, the bodies of 1,180 persons who had died from small-pox. Of these 100 were English speaking and 1,080 were French Canadians. Of the 100 English speaking, 48 were Protestants and 52 were Catholics.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The Eastern War Cloud.

LONDON, Oct. 21. Russian officers at Odessa are now refused leave of absence.

BERLIN, Oct. 21. The North German Gazette refers, with surprise, to reports that Lord Salisbury insists that the Bulgarian union be maintained.

VIENNA, Oct. 21. A despatch from Philippopolis states that Mr. Stransky, Provisional Governor of Eastern Roumelia, declares that Bulgaria cannot cede any portion of her territory. He expects momentarily that Serbia will declare war.

PHILIPPOLIS, Oct. 21. The garrison here, numbering 2,000 men and 1,000 Macedonian volunteers, have started for the Serbian frontier. Several divisions of the army assembled on Roumelian frontier have been ordered to fall back to resist the Serbians, who on Sunday advanced to Agor.

COPENHAGEN, Oct. 21. A desperate attempt was made this afternoon to assassinate Premier Estrupp, by a youth named Rosmussen, a compositor. Rosmussen fired two shots from a revolver at the Premier, but missed his mark. He was arrested.

Grits Crestfallen.

OTTAWA, Oct. 21. The Grits here are all terribly crestfallen over the result of the election in St. John, following, as it did, so closely upon Antigonish. They account for it by saying that the people of the Maritime Provinces are easily bought up; that Bishop Cameron was paid for supporting Thompson, and that St. John was bribed. The Grits here are so blind that they aver it is absurd to say their party has done anything since 1882 to warrant the overwhelming reverses they have experienced. They are very savage. Last night a number of Grits in Toronto held a meeting to form a Provincial Reform Club. Sir Richard Cartwright, Premier Mowat and others addressed the meeting. The intention of the Club the Grit organ says, is to combat extravagance and snobbery. The promoters hoped to have a big time rejoicing over their victory in St. John, but they postponed the rejoicing when the telegrams announcing their overwhelming defeat were sent up to the platform. In fact, they were a very sick crowd.

THEEBAW TO BE DEPOSED. LONDON, Oct. 21. A despatch from Rangoon says that at a meeting of his Generals in Mandalay King Theebaw declared that he would personally lead his army against the English. It is believed in Rangoon that the Indian Government will decide to depose King Theebaw whether he accedes to English demands or not. Further advices from Burma say the Spans have risen against King Theebaw. They have burned a number of villages on the west bank of the Salween River and have been attacking Thannoe. The Burmese fled on the approach of the Spans.

Fatal Explosion.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Oct. 21. A terrible explosion of gas works took place in Delaware and Hudson canal mine, at Plymouth, this morning. At this hour, 2 a. m., one man is dead, and fourteen frightfully burned. Most of the injured men are Poles and Hungarians.

OTTAWA, Oct. 21. In Riel's case to-day, before the Privy Council of England, says a cable, the Judges, after hearing Riel's counsel, stated it was not necessary to hear the other side. A decision against Riel will be given to-morrow.

The Smallpox in Montreal.

MONTREAL, Oct. 21. There were fifty-one deaths in this city yesterday from smallpox. The epidemic is far from being under control.

An Eagle's Victim.

A CHILD CARRIED A MILE FROM ITS HOME AND KILLED.

On Saturday morning last, the wife of Jean Bapte Ronilly, a farmer in St. Vincent de Paul, a village ten miles from Montreal, was feeding her fowls, while her child, aged about two years, was playing around. Suddenly a large bald-headed eagle swooped down and bore the little one off in its talons. The child screamed and extended its arms to its mother, who was beside herself with mental agony, but was powerless to render assistance. The screams of the child, however, attracted the neighbors, who with shot guns pursued the eagle. The bird was seen to alight with its prey upon the roof of a barn a mile distant, and, lifting up its head, with one powerful stroke it drove its beak into the child's head and then began its horrid feast. At the near approach of the neighbors, who were firing guns to frighten the eagle, it took flight, leaving the child behind. When the body was recovered life was extinct. The skull was split in two and a part had been devoured.

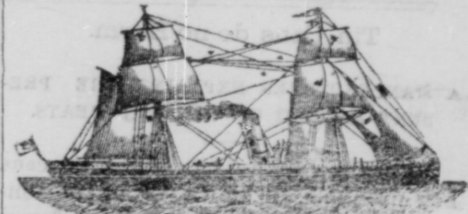

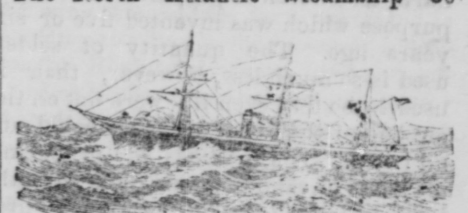
