Inquest Held In Death Of Kensington Man Under Truck

An inquest at Summerside on Wednesday night into the death of David Lewis MacInnis, after hearing evidence of seven persons and the report of Provincial pathologist, Dr. N. J. Boyd, returned a verdict to presiding coroner Dr. Charles Dewar of O'Leary, stating that in their opinion the deceased "came to his death on September 4th, 1957, on the farm of Roscoe Walker, Kensington, due to the dual rear wheels of a heavy truck passing over his body causing injuries resulting in instant death."

Members of the jury were Aubrey N. Brookins, foreman, Sheldon K. Cameron, Francis L. Dunlop, Danile S. Fanning, Robert M. Owen, J. Augustine Cameron.

Dr. L.K. Zielinski told of the first witness told of responding to a call in which he found the deceased unconscious, and near death, which occurred less than five minutes after his arrival.

POLICE EVIDENCE
Cst. Earl Elliott of the Summerside detachment R.C.M.P. described police investigation at the scene of the accident where he talked with the driver of the truck, Lyman F. Moase, and two other passengers Vernon R. Reeves and Leigh Bell.

He said the truck was a 1952 Chev equipped for such work as hauling gravel. He said the mechanical condition of the truck appeared to be satisfactory, and the door on the passenger side of the truck was found to open and shut properly.

Wooden planking which paralleled the roadway was spread apart across the small wooden culvert where the accident occurred and there was a hole newly broken in the bridge. Tracks along the ditch edge showed the path the truck had taken which would place the vehicle at a sharp angle.

The body was found 45 feet from the bridge and the truck had continued past this point for several feet before returning to the lane roadway.

The odor of alcohol was evident from the truck passengers who otherwise appeared normal in speech and were not staggering.

While waiting for coroner Dr. Charles Dewar arrived from O'Leary, Cst. Elliott said he took various distance measurements in the accident area.

On information obtained from questioning Reeves and Bell, he questioned them in a search of a field and recovered an open rum bottle which had been picked up from beside the body of the deceased and thrown into the ditch immediately after the accident.

On the following morning the witness said he accompanied Cst. James Cox in a search of a field in which the four men had visited a grain combine, and the two police officers found numerous empty ale bottles, caps and broken bottles.

When searching the body he had found a liquor permit in the name of the deceased which confirmed statements made by the three men in company with MacInnis at the time of the accident, indicating the purchase of 36 pint bottles of ale and a quart of hard liquor, on the day of the accident.

Cst. James Cox, the third witness, corroborated the evidence of Cst. Elliott and recalled conversation with the truck driver which was made in the form of a statement to the witness shortly after the accident. He said he detected a faint smell of liquor on the driver but apart from emotional disturbance and shock from the experience the driver walked and talked in a normal manner.

DRIVER TESTIFIES
Lyman Moase, owner and driver of the truck, told of giving the deceased and Leigh Bell a drive to Summerside from Kensington in the afternoon. Mr. Moase met Vernon Reeves in Summerside and agreed to give him a drive back to Kensington along with the other two passengers. When the witness completed business at various stores, he rejoined the passengers at the truck parked behind Holmans.

MacInnis, in addition to a quart of rum, had a 12-pint case of ale which was open. Deceased was drinking a bottle of ale. En route home to Kensington they had taken a clay road at Travellers Rest and returned to the paved highway at New Annan. On the clay road each of the men had taken about two bottles of ale, while the deceased had finished drinking the remaining six bottles. The deceased requested the driver to take him to a combine about 1/2 mile from the highway on the farm of Roscoe Walker in Kensington to pick up some tools from the combine.

Former Tignish Lady Passes

The death of Mrs. Alvin Mosher, formerly of Tignish, occurred on Monday in the St. John General Hospital. Mrs. Mosher, who was eighty-nine years of age, was born at Bay Port, N.S. Seventy years ago she was married to Mr. Mosher, who predeceased her in 1915, three years after they came to Prince Edward Island to make their home in St. Felix, near Tignish. During the past twelve years she has lived in St. John, N.B.

Mrs. Mosher was a kind and good woman whose life was governed by Christian principles. Besides the good qualities of character which she possessed, she will be remembered for her skill in producing good handicrafts.

Survey Of Alberton Harbour May Open It To More Ships

The prospect of smaller freighters being able to enter Alberton Harbour this fall following completion of the hydrographic survey presently being carried out is attracting considerable interest among shippers of livestock, produce and pulpwood in western Prince County and elsewhere on P.E.I.

This information was made known Wednesday evening at the regular meeting of the Alberton and West Prince Board of Trade, held in the O'Leary Legion Hall with president Frank Bryan presiding. An unlimited volume of trade with northern New Brunswick, Seven Islands and Newfoundland was forecast by B. Graham Rogers, director of Transport, Provincial Dept. of Industry and Natural Resources, at a recent meeting with C.R. Leard, secretary of the West Prince Board of Trade and Dr. O.H. Phillips, M.P.

HARBOUR CHART
On completion of the harbour survey in the near future a limited number of photographic copies of the harbour chart will be made available to interested parties this fall.

On motion a sum of money was voted to pay the cost of a roadside table project sponsored by the board at Cane's Hill. It was noted that this picnic site has been in almost continuous use since it was opened up this summer. As it is the only one in the area between Bedeque and Tignish it was decided to continue efforts to obtain financial assistance from the Provincial sources to assist in establishing additional roadside tables in West Prince. The meeting was told that such assistance was given other areas.

J.W. Coughlan, O'Leary, and Earle Atkinson, Alberton, were appointed members of an educational committee with powers to add a high school teacher from each community to the committee. Their first project will be to make arrangements for an essay contest for the upper grades with substantial cash prizes for first, second and third prize winners. The subject of the essay and rules are to be worked out by the educational committee.

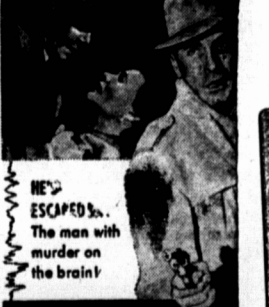
