Stops Writing Policies For Hockey Casualties

CLEVELAND, Jan. 3 — (AP) — The Cleveland News announced the National Casualty Company of Detroit will stop writing new policies covering hockey casualties on Jan. 1.

The news quotes C. Jean Caspar, Jr., manager of National Casualty's professional sports policy department:
"During the last two years, injuries in hockey have been increasing at the fastest rate ever. This season there have been more to date than ever before.

"We kept reducing the benefits and raising the premiums, but even that did not permit us to keep the hockey division on a paying basis."

Caspar said there is a clause in policies that they may be renewed by players, but the company would not write new ones except for those covered by the clause.

Louis Matthews, secretary of the firm, said in Detroit that premium notices have been sent out and any premium returned will be accepted at no change in rates or in coverage.

He added, however, the premiums are due Jan. 1 and unless they are paid by then hockey policies will not be renewed.

National Casualty writes most of the casualty policies for hockey players.

Reports Relations Between C.A.H.A. And N.H.L. Brighter

TORONTO, Jan. 3 — (CP) — Douglas Grimston, president of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association has announced relations between the C. A. H. A. and the National Hockey League look brighter.

The New Westminster, B.C., man made this comment to reporters as the C. A. H. A. met to discuss resumption of negotiations for continuation of an operational agreement between the amateurs and the professionals.

"Relations between the C. A. H. A. and the professionals certainly have a much brighter future than when we met in July," said Grimston.
"Several suggestions have been made by both sides to clarify the player-contract problem in the major and junior "A" series and there are other matters of mutual benefit that must be kept confidential until ratified."

Clarence Campbell, N. H. L. president, said there is nothing to report until both sides ratify suggestions presented at a joint meeting here yesterday. Then the proposals must win approval of the N. H. L. and of C. A. H. A. annual meetings next spring and summer.

The C. A. H. A. today gave its branches until Feb. 1 to file any further claims on payment of players who turned professional during the 1949-50 season. The Quebec branch was granted \$250 to pay for the printing in French of several thousand playing certificates.

May 22-25 were set as dates for the 1951 annual meeting in Halifax.

"Dizzy" Trout Wins Award

CHICAGO, Jan. 2 — (AP) — Paul (Dizzy) Trout, Detroit Tigers' veteran right-hander, has won the award for 1950's "outstanding comeback in baseball," presented by the Chicago Chapter of the Baseball-Writers Association.

The 34-year-old Trout, offered on the trading block last winter with no takers after a 3-6 record for 1949, bounced back in 1950 for 13 victories against five losses.

WILMINGTON, O., Jan. 3 — (AP) — Sale of Fairmeade Farms, well known trotting horse breeding farm near here, has been announced.

Eddie Cobb and McKinley Kirk, trotting horse trainers, drivers and breeders of Washington Court House, Ohio, purchased the farm from W. J. Galvin, Ohio publisher who established the farm many years ago.

The farm was once the home of the late Bert Abbe (1:59 1-4), great Ohio sire. Many other famous trotters and pacers also were bred there.

Cobb and Kirk also bought Wilmington IV, 1:59 1-2, Bert Abbe's fastest son and already a two-minute sire.

Lift Suspension Of Hockey Pair

NEW WESTMINSTER, B.C., Jan. 3 — (CP) — Doug Grimston, president of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, yesterday lifted the suspension of coach Fay Emms and Leo Labine of Barrie Flyers of the Ontario Hockey Association Junior "A" series. Trucks Settles Damages Suit

CLEVELAND, Jan. 3 — (AP) — A \$32,000 personal injury suit brought by a hotel night manager against pitcher Virgil Trucks of the Detroit Tigers was settled in court yesterday.

The amount was not disclosed, but Edward C. Stanton, Trucks' lawyer, described it as "very small."

Charles F. Heidler, night manager at the Hotel Statler, charged the player hit and kicked him when he and a house detective went to Trucks' room on Sept. 20, 1946, to ask a woman to leave.

Pari-Mutuel Betting Down Slightly In U. K.

LONDON, Jan. 3 — (AP) — Pari-mutuel betting on horse racing in the United Kingdom dropped slightly more than one per cent in 1950 but there were 16 days less racing.

The total figure announced today was \$25,505,192 (about \$71,414,538) a decrease of \$368,878 from 1949.

Only a fraction of the money bet on racing in Britain is handled through the pari-mutuel machines. Bookmakers are legal.

The figures include flat racing and steeplechasing. There were 669 days of racing in 1950 on which 4,027 races were run.
