## Benefit Regulations Re Married Women Revoked

The National Employment Office in Charlottetown has been advised by the Unemployment Insurance Commission, Ottawa, that Married Women's Regulations pertaining to claims for employment insurance benefits have been revoked.

Hitherto, a woman who married and subsequently filed a claim for benefits, had to meet certain conditions in addition to those applying to other claimants. Some of the newly married were able to satisfy these conditions, but quite a proportion suffered disqualification. The additional conditions imposed on the newly married were a source of many complaints and the Unemployment Office, Ottawa, and National Employment Office, Charlottetown, had a considerable number of these cases to handle.

Although the "Married Women's Regulations" no longer exist, it will be necessary for married women to fulfill the usual conditions required of any other claimant. One of these conditions sets forth that a claimant must be available for work.

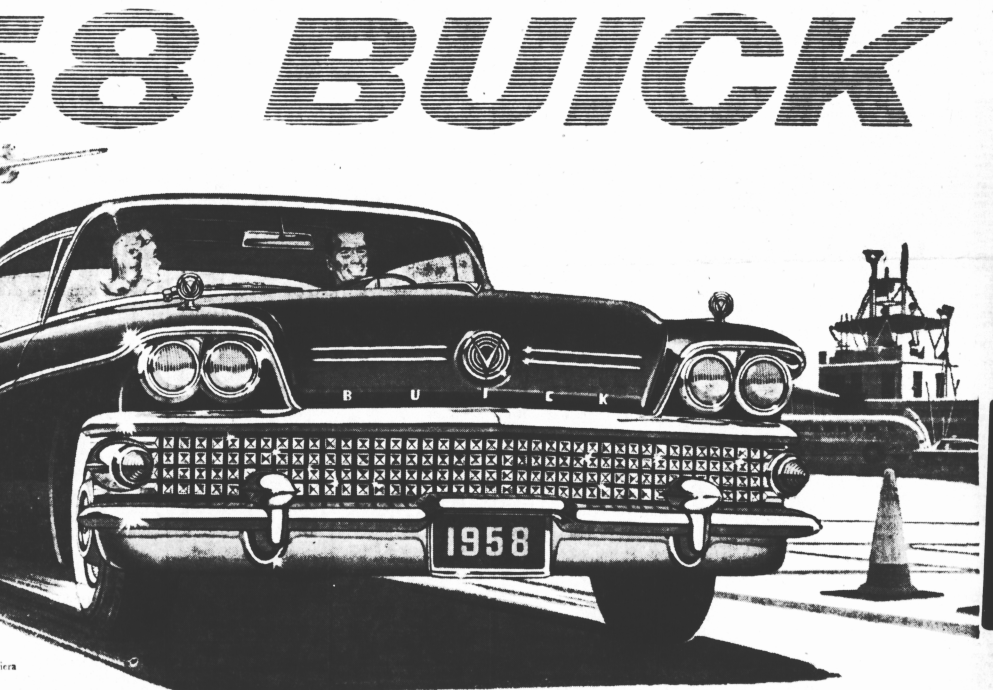
