The bidding:

Opening lead—king of hearts. How should South play this hand at five diamonds doubled? Of course, he does not see the opponents' cards, and all he can do at the start is rely on the bidding and the opening lead.

There is a raft of information contained in the bidding. There is no good reason to disbelieve West's cuebid in diamonds, and declarer should therefore assume that West is actually void.

He should also credit West with all the high cards missing, since the cuebid announces a very powerful hand.

So, while South does not see

"We can achieve the objective I have mentioned without any reduction in our living standards," he said. "In fact, barring some world catastrophe, it is inconceivable that the living standards of Canadians will not continue to rise rapidly in the years ahead."
