New Oxygen Mask For Montague Fire Brigade
The members of the Montague fire brigade have purchased a new oxygen mask to be used for rescue work at fires, it was learned last evening at the meeting held in the town hall.
In making the announcement, Fire Chief D.H. Coffin, stressed the need of such a unit, and commended the members for their interest and generosity in providing such a unit for the brigade.
Following the reading of the minutes and the correspondence, by the Secretary Mr. Ralph Beck, the financial statement was presented which showed a healthy balance.
Keeping in mind the unexpected power failures, the members discussed auxiliary means of fire trucks to notify the firemen, and Beck and Mr. James Cudmore were appointed on a committee to look into the question and submit a report. Discussion on the installation of buzzers in the homes of the firemen was also discussed, and will be further considered at a later meeting. Further improvements to the fire trucks were also discussed.
Mr. Coffin also announced that a first aid and salvage unit would be attached to the chemical crew. The first aid unit has recently undergone intensive training, and will be a valuable addition to this crew. Mr. Coffin also reviewed the nozzle and hose truck crew and the pumper crew, with respect to their positions in time of fire.
The meeting, which was attended by a large number of firemen, was adjourned after a demonstration of the new oxygen mask by Gilbert Clements.
