"Those Delegations."

THE Patriot has, surely, not forgotten that the Hon. David Laird, himself, set the precedent which has been followed by the Government delegations in recent years. The trip which Messrs. Laird and Haythorne made to Ottawa, when they agreed to dispose of the colonial rights of this Province, on terms which the people refused to endorse—on terms materially worse than those which were subsequently approved—cost the country as much, in proportion to the time occupied and the expenses actually incurred, as the delegation to Ottawa and England about which the Patriot has now the impudence to rate Messrs. Sullivan and Ferguson. Mr. Laird charged \$8 a day for every day that he was away—Sundays included—and \$177 in addition, for travelling expenses!—considerably more, proportionately to the time occupied, than Messrs. Sullivan and Ferguson. In order that the public may have no doubt about the matter, we quote the following statement:

Why should Messrs. Sullivan, in 1887, regard their services as less valuable than those of Messrs. Laird and Haythorne, in 1873? The latter made a bad bargain; the former made out so strong a case for the Province that an additional grant of \$20,000 a year has been obtained as an immediate result of their exertions, and other beneficial results must inevitably follow. Mr. L. H. Davies went over to St. John in 1877 to get a Chief Superintendent of Education, and stayed away a week at a net cost to the Province of \$72.23! These be the Leaders of the party who—out of office—prate about cab hire and the cost of delegations! Why, it cost the Government of Canada nearly \$5,000 to transfer the Hon. David Laird and his effects from Battledford to Prince Edward Island. Yet the Patriot has the hardihood to criticize the travelling expenses of Messrs. Sullivan and Ferguson, both of whom went from here to Ottawa and the cost of Great Britain and back for very little less money.

Easter Meetings.

ST. PAUL'S CHURCH. The meeting was opened with prayer by the Rev. W. A. Crawford-Frost. Rev. S. Weston-Jones occupied the chair. In the absence of the Vestry Clerk Thomas McKinlay, Esq., was elected Secretary. The minutes of the last Easter meeting and also of meetings of the congregation held to decide upon the erection of a new rectory and the appointment of a curate, were read and approved. After some discussion, on a motion by Judge Hensley that the Rector be requested to give an explanation, a vestry was balloted for with the following result: John Ings, R. R. Fitzgerald, F. T. Newbery, H. Hazard, F. L. Hazard, A. B. Warburton, Samuel Lowe, H. W. Longworth. While the ballots in this election were being counted in an adjoining room, Rev. S. Weston-Jones delivered an address explanatory of his views on some points of Church doctrine and ritual. The meeting adjourned shortly after midnight, to re-assemble on Thursday evening next.

ST. PETER'S CHURCH. The Rev. James Simpson, Priest-Incumbent, presided, Mr. F. Messervey was elected Secretary. Minutes of last Easter meeting were read and approved. The report of the Treasurer, together with the estimates, were read and adopted. The following gentlemen were then elected Church Wardens, viz.: Mr. L. W. Watson, Mr. Fred. Foster and Hon. F. Brecken. The thanks of the congregation were, by unanimous vote, tendered to the Church Wardens, the envelope clerk, Mr. W. C. Harris (architect), Mr. L. W. Watson, organist and treasurer, the Ladies Sewing Society, and other societies which have aided the work of the Church; also to the Church Extension Society "for the handsome donations which have been received and which have enabled this congregation to supply poorer ones with requirements for the more decent performance of Divine Service." The meeting adjourned sine die.

SUDDEN DEATH.—James Adams, a well-known and highly respected resident of St. John, N. B., died suddenly on Thursday evening, within a short distance of his own door. David Duffy, of Stoney Creek, N. B., was found dead in bed by his hired man on Tuesday afternoon, April 9. Mr. Duffy was an aged bachelor and was apparently in good health. Report says that a small bottle, with plain traces of strychnine, was found on the floor near the bed. This and the fact of Mr. Duffy going to bed in the afternoon lead many to think the cause of his death unnatural, but more probably contemplated because of a broken promise to dispose of his property to a man who threatened an action to recover damages or the property Mr. Duffy promised to, but would not, deed away.—Albert Maple Leaf.

First Trip of the Season.

THE steamer Carroll made her first trip from Boston to this port, this season, today, arriving about ten o'clock. She brought a general cargo and the following passengers: Mr. P. McKeever, Miss Kate McDonald, Mr. C. D. McDonald, Mr. R. Manley, Mr. M. H. Levin, Mr. P. McCarthy, Mr. E. F. Morse, Mr. A. D. Gillis, Mrs. Jamieson.

Capt. Brown reports: Left Boston on Saturday, 13th inst., and arrived at Halifax on the morning of Monday, 15th. Left Halifax at 12 o'clock, same day, and reached Port Hawkesbury at noon on Tuesday, after working through about 18 miles of drift ice. Remained in Hawkesbury until Friday, at ten, when we left for Pictou, there being a light southerly wind. When about ten hours out, fell in with heavy ice and thick fog, between Capes Jack and George, and were obliged to lay to. About two hours later the fog lifted, and we found ourselves surrounded with ice. In the meantime the wind had shifted to the north-west, and we decided to return to Hawkesbury, which port we reached at five o'clock same evening. We laid in Hawkesbury until Monday morning at six o'clock when we left for Pictou. The wind was blowing hard from the south-west. By the time we arrived at Cape George the wind, which still continued to blow lively, had shifted to the west, and we observed large bodies of ice to the north and north-east. Pictou was reached at 2 o'clock same afternoon. Left Pictou for Charlottetown at 4 o'clock this morning, arriving at 10. Saw no ice during the passage. The wind blew heavily from the north-west during the run. The Carroll has been overhauled and considerably improved since last season. She has had a new propeller of the latest model put in, and has been newly caulked and coppered, as well as painted throughout. Her officers are as follows:—

Captain—William Brown. First Officer—S. G. Chase. Second Officer—Alexander Stinson. Chief Engineer—M. Thornton. Second Engineer—Daniel McDonald. Third Engineer—George Webb. Pilot—G. A. Briggs. Purser—W. Nickerson. Steward—John J. Welsh. Second Steward—M. A. Manley. Stewardess—Mrs. McQuaid. It will be seen from this list that there is little change in the personnel of the officers. The only alteration is the promotion of Mr. Chase (formerly second officer) and the appointment as second officer of Mr. Stinson, who held the position some four or five years ago. Captain Brown looks as hale and as hearty as ever, and Purser Nickerson has lost none of his old time geniality. Steward Welsh is also to the front ready and willing to attend to the every want of passengers, and he has an able assistant in Mrs. McQuaid, the stewardess. The other officers are also capable and obliging. THE EXAMINER wishes the Carroll and her staff a pleasant and prosperous season.
