MILLIONS MADE ON EGGS.

The Hens of the United States Produce a Valuable Crop.

CHICAGO, April 8.—In a South Water street commission house is a man who for months has been studying the lowly hen.

The results of his researches are appalling. He now fears that the money-making ability of Mrs. Hen and her family will tempt some greedy monopolist to attempt the formation of a Hen Trust.

He first found approximately the annual egg and chicken consumption of the 2,000,000 people who live in Cook county. Then he based the consumption of the United States in the same ratio, fixing the population at 70,000,000. The number of hens in business he cannot fix.

Eggs consumed annually in the United States.....210,000,000
Market value at a cent and a half each.....\$315,000,000
Number of chickens consumed 210,000,000
Market value at 10 cents a pound, average weight 5 lbs \$105,000,000

Besides this extraordinary output this expert figures that fully an additional 200,000,000 chickens are allowed to reach maturity.

The hen industry is greatest in Iowa. Illinois is second and Ohio third in activity.

More money is made off the hen and her product than off the total annual wheat crop. The Government figures on wheat last year, was a total crop of 55,000,000 bus., which at prices obtained last season, an average of 65 cents a bushel, represents \$357,500,000, while the egg industry based on the above figures goes to \$405,000,000.

POUVD SMALLPOX IN A COW

Peculiar But Alarming Case Disccovered by Montreal Milk Inspectors.

MONTREAL, April 8.—A case of peculiar scientific interest has been reported to the Health Department. The case is one of spontaneous smallpox in a cow, and was discovered by the Milk Inspectors. The sale of the milk from the cow was immediately forbidden, and the matter reported to Dr. Laberge, the medical health officer.

Dr. Laberge states that cases of a similar kind are of extremely rare occurrence. The most recent known case having occurred some fifty years ago. At that time two cows were discovered to be afflicted with spontaneous smallpox in France, one at town called Passy and the other at B gancy. The St. Michel case will be closely studied in its scientific aspect by Dr. Laberge and by other physiological experts in the city.

THAT SECRET DOSSIER

Nothing in it Affecting Dreyfus, Says a Paris Paper

PARIS, April 8.—The Voltaire, which a few days ago published an instalment of the evidence given before the Court of Cassation by M. Paleogne, one of the permanent officials of the Foreign Office regarding the reputation by the Italian Government, and by Col. Schwartzkopfen, former German military attache here, of relations with Dreyfus, publishes yesterday a further instalment, showing that the so-called secret dossier is not connected with Dreyfus, except as regards a single document—a letter mentioning him, which is dated after his condemnation, and is, therefore, unimportant.

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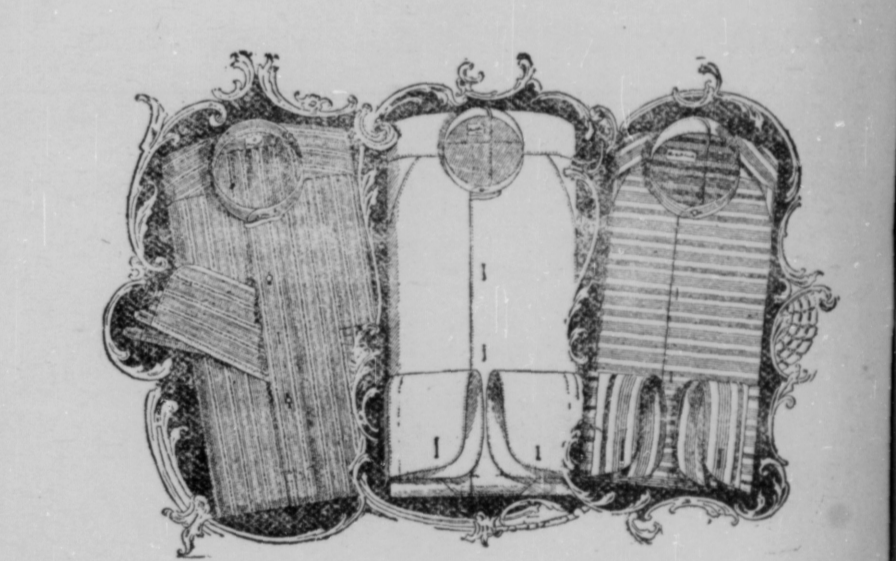
