Jury Reduces Charge Finds Accused Guilty

SUMMERSIDE — "He grabbed me by my two arms, pulled me up from the floor and said, 'Don't open your mouth. Open the safe, or I'll kill you'."

These were the words of Mr. L.M. Lewis, 145 S. 10th Street, Summerside, as he testified in Supreme Court here yesterday in a case against Walter Joseph (Peamus) Arsenault, one-time professional burglar, found guilty on a charge of being unlawfully inside a dwelling house with intent to commit an offence by a petit jury before Mr. Justice R.R. Bell.

Mr. Lewis testified that the accused, masked and snarled, had a t r u c k e r in the floor of her upstairs hall when she asked him: "What are you doing?"

After she saw the man holding a safe that had been in one of the other upstairs rooms of the house.

The accused, Arsenault, was not convicted on the original charge of break, enter and assault, but had the charge against him changed by the jury to being unlawfully inside Mrs. Lewis' home on the morning of December 11, 1962, with an intent to commit an indictable offence. Following the jury's deliberation period that lasted for 35 minutes, the time for sentence was set for Friday, at 12:30.

Presenting the case for the Crown was George R. McMahon while the counsel for the defence was J. Harold Goodwin.

Mr. McMahon presented nine witnesses before the jury.

Fisheries Study Here Is Planned

Fisheries Minister Leo Rostker announced yesterday that his department is making a comprehensive study of fishery operations in the province and will seek federal assistance to finance the study.

The study will deal with equipment used, fish processing techniques, markets, and how the industry could be improved. When the study is completed, Mr. Rostker will make submissions to the federal government regarding proposals assistance.

The minister said that the potential of fisheries for the province is "untapped" if development is carried out correctly. He said that some assistance to development must come from federal sources.

Newfoundland has made a proposal to the federal government, seeking \$20,000,000 for fisheries development.
