Canadian Export Figures Running Behind '64 Boom

OTTAWA (CP)—Latest available Canadian export figures are running well behind the rapid rate of increase which a year ago triggered a 16.3 per cent boom for 1964. Figures now public for the 1964-65 months of December, January and February show Canadian exports to all countries rose just 1.5 per cent over the same period of the 1963-64 winter. Export statistics for the first quarter of 1965, which will be complete when March figures are released later this month by the bureau of statistics, are therefore likely to show a sharp drop from similar figures for the first quarter of 1964. The snail's pace 1.5 per cent advance during the past winter compares with exports during the winter months of 1963-64, which surged ahead 13.2 per cent. The slackened pace is clearly the result of sharply reduced wheat shipments to Russia. The special sales which took place through the winter and spring months pushed 1963-64 figures up substantially. While the Russian shipments have concluded, wheat and grain is being sold in large quantities to China and European Communist countries. FORESEEN EXPANSION Finance Minister Gordon's pre-budget white paper forecast for 1965 said exports should continue to expand, though not as dramatically as in 1964. Figures for the winter months showed healthy gains in total exports to the United States and to the European Common Market countries—up 10.7 and 11.4 per cent respectively. Exports of wholly manufactured products were up 17.3 per cent and sales of crude materials were up 12.5 per cent. In the 12 months of 1964 these classes of goods showed gains of 41.1 and 13.4 per cent respectively. The unusual impact of the Russian and other Communist markets in Canada's \$8,000,000,000 export aggregate in 1964 is demonstrated in the fact that exports to countries other than the U. S., Britain, Commonwealth countries, and European Common Market countries rose 36.6 per cent. In the 1964-65 winter months they were down 28.5 per cent.

FOOD EXPORTS RISE Exports of live animals and of food, feed, beverages and tobacco rose 21.6 and 27.2 per cent respectively in 1964. In the latest three months for which figures are available, however, they were down 22.4 and 19.9 per cent. The white paper forecast said that the export outlook for 1965 is determined to an important extent by conditions in U. S. markets. A substantial improvement in the U. S. market for Canadian goods is expected. European and Japanese markets are also expected to continue favorable, but sales to the U.K. will be affected by Britain's steps to correct her balance of payments difficulties. "Taking all of the above factors into account," the white paper said, "the expansive factors are expected to more than offset the anticipated declines in certain markets. On balance, however, we would expect a smaller increase in exports in 1965 than last year."

Probe Of Water Pollution Promised By Federal Dept.

By STUART LAKE OTTAWA (CP)—Mines Minister Benidickson said Monday his department will investigate water pollution caused by base metal mining operations in Canada. He was replying to a brief presented by the 10 provincial ministers. It contained recommendations from the 21st annual conference of the provincial ministers held at Banff last September. The brief, read by Mines Minister A. Russell Patrick of Alberta said it has been determined that concentration in waters of as low as 600 parts per billion of zinc or 40 parts per billion of copper will kill young salmon. However, it was not known what effect such concentrations have on other fish or what effect concentrations of other metals have in polluted water. The mines ministers asked the federal department to carry out research into the problem in conjunction with the fisheries department. Mr. Benidickson said his department has been monitoring mine waste waters and adjacent stream waters for some time in Eastern Canada. Preliminary work now is under way on the effect of coal-mining in the eastern Rockies. Laboratories will be established, one in Eastern Canada, and one in the West to help with the field work. A site for the laboratory in the Maritimes is under consideration and more staff is to be recruited. "Starting during the 1965-66 fiscal year," Mr. Benidickson said, "the provincial ministers also renewed their request for a change in the income tax act to provide that mining taxes and royalties paid to a province be allowed in full as a deductible expense. Mr. Benidickson replied that this was a question for the finance department, but noted that a Canadian metal mining association suggestion along these lines was getting 'sympathetic consideration.'"
