Notice to Mariners.

The "Pilot Chart of the North Atlantic" for May gives the following forecast for the month: Fair weather will prevail generally over the North Atlantic, with occasional northerly gales along the American coast, and moderate north-westerly gales along the trans-Atlantic steamship route, north of the 40th parallel. There will be a notable increase of fog off the Grand Banks, due to the northward movement of the Gulf Stream and the southward extension of ice brought down by the Labrador current, fog being occasioned whenever moist southerly winds are chilled by contact with the ice and cold water to the northward. Icebergs may be encountered almost as far south as the 40th parallel, both on the deck and 5000 feet under, and may be more numerous than usual east of the 40th meridian.

Feed Famine in Cape Breton.

For feed for cattle and for seed grain the farmers of Cape Breton were never in such need as they are this spring. Hundreds of tons of hay, says the North Sydney Herald, have been imported by rail during the winter and bought up as soon as landed along the line of railway, and hundreds of tons are yet required. As for seed grain, there appears to be none in the country, and as the price of oats and barley is so high, poor people will find it difficult to procure sufficient feed for their stock. Oats are selling in Prince Edward Island as high as 70 cents per bushel. They cannot be bought in Cape Breton under 80 cents, so that poor farmers will find it very difficult to secure enough for seed purposes, not to speak of feeding. The people of the Island want the Provincial Government of Nova Scotia to purchase a few thousand bushels of seed for districts in need, and dispose of it at cost to farmers.

The Court.

The Court of Chancery opened on Tuesday forenoon, May 5th. Edward Jarvis Hodgson, Esq. Q. C., was sworn in Master of the Rolls and assistant Judge of the Supreme Court by Thomas Kelly, Esq., Judge of the county court of Prince County. At 10 on the Easter Term of the Supreme Court opened, the Chief Justice and Mr. Justice Hodgson on the bench. The docket this term was a very short one. Wm. A. Weeks and Lemuel L. Beer vs. Samuel H. Brown and Alexander Brown. The Charlottetown Woollen Mills Company vs. Samuel H. Brown and Alexander Brown. Mr. F. L. Hazard filed declaration of T. W. Dodd and Benj. Rogers, who were summoned as agents of the defendants on both suits. The examination of Benjamin Rogers was taken before the court. Stanley W. Brown was also examined. On motion of F. L. Hazard the court discharged the parties summoned as agents with costs. Peters and Peters for plaintiffs on both suits. Susannah Coffin, appellant, vs. Thos. D. Coffin, respondent. Mr. Morson read notice of abandonment of appeal, and moved that judgment of the court below be confirmed with costs. Court, be it so. Peter Patterson and another vs. Henry T. Lepage. Argument on return of rule for a new trial. The case stands over till Michaelmas Term. The court appointed James Gorman, of Campbellton, Lt 4, and Michael McCowan, of Soreby, to be Commissioners for taking affidavits in the Supreme Court. Commission under the great seal of Prince Edward Island appointing Hon. Frederick Peters Attorney and Advocate General for the Province of P. E. Island was read. Benjamin Rogers vs. Peter Gallant (Charles). Mr. Morson for defendant, argued in support of demurrer. The Attorney General showed cause against demurrer and Mr. Morson replied. Court dismissed demurrer with costs. John Healey vs. Wm. Heard and another. On motion of Mr. Mellish the court ordered the argument in the return of rule nisi for new trial to stand over till next term. Boute vs. Maxwell. The court ordered this case to stand over till next term. Application of Arthur S. Johnson for certiorari to remove conviction under the Canada Temperance Act. By consent this case stands over till next term. On motion of Mal. McLeod, Q. C., Wm. Lee Strickland is to be arrested by James E. Wyatt for the remainder of his term as student at law. Court adjourned sine die. Ringleaders Captured. ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., May 4.—A steamer has arrived here from Fortune Bay bringing eight prisoners, ringleaders in the recent trouble. Other captures are expected. Matters are getting quieter, and the government expects suppression of the trouble. Hartigan, one of the leaders, who threatened to fire on the inspectors, is among the captured.
