

Hawks Dump Islanders 4-0 In Moncton Game

MONCTON (CP) — Moncton Hawks snapped a three-game losing streak here Wednesday night, and climbed into sole occupancy of second place in the Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League, as they dumped the front-running Charlottetown Islanders 4-0.

Goalie Nick Pidsodny of the Hawks stopped 20 shots in posting his second shutout of the season. Oddy enough, the only other shutout in the league was a twin 4-0 job by the Islanders Jim Shirley over the Hawks here last Saturday.

The remaining Hawks scored twice in the first period and once in each of the two last frames. Shirley played a strong game in the Charlottetown net to prevent the score from going still higher, as Hawks pressed hard in all periods.

The rough game claimed two Hawks. Captain Freddy Weaver will be out indefinitely with a possible broken toe, and winger Yvan Houle suffered a charley horse ail which is sidelined at least two days.

NEW YORK (AP) — Wally Hergesheimer marked his first appearance of the season with the first goal of the game and Danny Lewicki followed with a pair as New York Rangers defeated Boston Bruins 3-1 Wednesday night in a bitter National Hockey League game.

The victory, breaking a five-game losing streak for the Rangers at home, bolstered their hold on fourth place moving them three points ahead of the Bruins. Boston had a non-losing streak of four games.

Hergesheimer had been out of action since March 11 when he suffered a broken leg against the Bruins. He got the Rangers under way when he took a pass at center ice and sped in for the goal by himself at 12:35 of the first period. That broke a shutout streak of 20 minutes and 50 seconds by Bruin rookie goalie John Henderson.

Lewicki rammed in his first goal at 2:12 of the second period. His second came at 4:11 of the final period when Dean Prentice cleared the puck from a pile up against the boards in Ranger ice.

Lorne Ferguson scored the Boston goal at 10:45 in the last period finally breaking through Johnny Bower subbing for the Rangers' injured Lorne Worsley, their regular goalie.

He has been advised by physicians to quit playing hockey but Williams could not be reached for comment on this decision. Officials of the Pictou Royals said that Williams would still carry on as coach of the team, whether he was able to play or not.

Former Star Looks Back On 45 Years Football

TORONTO, (CP) — The original Big Train of Canadian football looked back over 45 years of the game and said "it's been terrific all the way—it's still terrific."

Dr. Smirle Lawson, who played with University of Toronto in 1909 when Varsity won the first Grey Cup, says football has changed "quite a bit" since the old days of the two backs and a kick. But, to men who love the game as he does, it will always be great.

"Modern-day football is even more thrilling," he said in an interview. "The forward pass did it. The fans see the ball more often. The forward replaced the long lateral, which is a beautiful play but rarely seen."

The six-foot doctor, now 65 and supervising coroner for Ontario, played senior football for six seasons with Varsity and Toronto Argonauts. In that time he became one of the most bruising players in the business. He was in four Grey Cup finals and on two championship teams.

He so dominated backfield play that he was tabbed the Big Train, a name later given to Lionel Conacher, who was chosen the greatest athlete of the half century in a 1950 Canadian Press poll.

"Hughie Gall of Varsity was the greatest kicker of them all," Dr. Lawson said in his booming voice. "He could boot the length of the field with either foot and two men on his back. He could also kick right up the backs of his linemen something you don't see these days."
