### MONGOLIAN HORSES.

Mongolia is the great stud farm of the empire, and droves of ponies are thence brought down to Tien Tsin and the northern ports, to be shipped to the settlements of the south or sold for commercial purposes to the Chinese merchant. Just outside the north gate of Pekin is a large market where these ponies—griffins they are called—are sold by auction, as they come to hand from their Tartar breeders. In shape and make they are not attractive to the western eye, and they look, as they are, coarse and underbred: Their heads, in particular, are square and clumsy, but they have great qualities of sturdiness and hard condition, and it is found in practice that their legs will stand any amount of rattling over the hard ground and the stony roads.

It is almost needless to say that they are wonderfully sure of foot and cleve in avoiding the holes and drops of a "trapdy" country. In and near the capital twenty or thirty tael go a long way towards buying the best that are brought to the hammer, and their keep does not come to more than about five China dollars a month. All they have for food is chopped straw and millet, with plenty of hot water, making up a sort of gruel, which they eat at odd times by day and night. Their natural pace, agreeable to the Chinese taste, is a slow jog trot, but under European hands they soon learn to gallop at a respectable rate. Unluckily, the breaking is of the roughest; their mouths are as hard as iron, and accustomed to be tight held by the head, the reins must be taken short to make them go at all. Moreover, when owned by Chinamen they are ill-kept and scraggy, almost many in their coats. Nothing is done to improve the stamper, and, unlike the native princes of India, the high officials do nothing to help the farmers and carriers by introducing better strains of blood.

### MEN OF MARK.

L. Z. Leiter has given \$1,000 to the Chicago India famine relief fund.

Arthur W. Foster, president of the California Northwestern railroad, has been appointed regent of the California State university for a term of 16 years.

George Fred Williams is of German parentage. His father's name was George Weimigman, but he had it changed by act of the legislature to Williams.

Speaker Henderson, who lost his left leg at the battle of Corinth, is provided with a new cork leg which works so well that he thinks he will be able to dispense with his cane.

John G. Hoosier, a Minneapolis attorney who went to the Philippines as a member of the Thirteenth Minnesota volunteers, is still there and is now engaged to marry a wealthy and handsome Spanish widow of Manila.

Joseph K. Herod, first secretary of the American legation at Tokyo, Japan, who has been connected with the legation since December, 1892, is at home in Indianapolis on a leave of absence. He will return to Japan in September.

Sir George Francis Bonham, the new British minister at Belgrade, was educated at Eton and Oxford. He entered the diplomatic service when he was 22, and he has served in St. Petersburg, Vienna, Rome, Madrid and Lisbon.

Lieutenant General Sir Arthur Power Palmer, K. C. B., who has been spoken of as the new British commander in chief in India, is over six feet in height and is broad in proportion. He is extremely popular with his troops, especially the Sikhs.

Colonel William Anderson Herron of Pittsburg, whose death is announced at the age of 79 years, was for many years one of the most prominent business men of that city. He was a member of the Presbyterian church and was a commissioner to two general assemblies.

The Right Hon. William Bede Dailey, who died in Australia recently, was accounted the most brilliant orator and statesman that Australia has so far produced. He was a many sided man—barrier, journalist, humorist, lecturer, linguist, scholar, parliamentarian, administrator and the possessor of a charming personality.

Less than two years ago Grant Gillette was perhaps the leading cattle dealer and speculator in Kansas and was worth millions. Just before Thanksgiving, 1898, he collapsed through overspeculation. Cattlemen and banks are now fighting over the remains of his once vast estate, and Gillette is now peddling shirt waists to the senoritas of Chihuahua, Mexico.

Lewis Hoen, aged 24, has left a hospital at Logansport, Ind., after having exceedingly bowed legs.

First the physicians refused to attempt to straighten his legs, but finally they broke the tibia of each leg, and the limbs were placed in plaster casts for six weeks. Hoen is an inch taller than he was before his legs were straightened.

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### THE PEDAGOGUE.

Professor Brander Matthews of Columbia university has been asked to deliver a series of lectures before an association of London clubs.

Hamilton Macdougall of Providence, who has been called to the professorship of music in Wellesley college, is an associate of the Royal College of Organists of London.

Professor Edwin A. Alderman, for several years president of the University of North Carolina, one of the prominent educators of the south, has accepted the presidency of Tulane university, New Orleans.

Edward C. Delano, the new superintendent of schools of Chicago, was identified with the city's school system 44 years ago as an assistant teacher in the first high school. He worked his way upward until he became head of the normal department, in which capacity he served for 20 years. He was appointed a district superintendent in 1877.

RECENT INVENTIONS.  
A new dashboard attachment has been invented calculated to hold the reins when the driver leaves the wagon. A sliding rod supports a pair of iron jaws which close over the reins, holding them firmly.  
To preserve fruits and other articles against contact with the air a German has patented a hydraulic top for cans, comprising a pair of circular channels surrounding the top of the jar, with water or other liquid contained in the channels, into which flanges on the cap project.  
A Canadian has designed an office message box which prevents messages being read by outsiders, having a reel of paper to be unwound and slide across a shelf to receive the message, the sheet passing two rollers through a slot in the door, with locking pawls to prevent the rollers from turning backward.
