INCENDIARY FIRE.—A barn belonging to Joseph McDonald, M. P. P., Antigonish, was burned with its contents Thursday night. The loss is \$800. It is supposed to be the work of an incendiary.

CASUALTIES.—Thomas Showlin, who, with John Martin, escaped from the St. John Penitentiary, was shot and fatally wounded by Chief Keeper Keefe, about four miles from that institution. A man named Barnside fell dead at his residence, Marsh Bridge, St. John, yesterday. Michael Leonard, who was injured by a bull the other day at Musquash, N. B., has died from his wounds.

The plankway at the south side of the Post Office still remains in a wretched condition, and threatens destruction to the limbs of the pedestrian. The Dominion Government cannot afford to keep lamp in front of the Post Office; but surely they are not so poor that they cannot afford to place a decent plankway leading thereto.

The Rev. Thos. Duncan, formerly pastor of the St. James' Presbyterian Church of this city, may be expected to officiate in the Prince-Street Methodist Church to-morrow evening at 6.30. Rev. H. P. Cowperthwaite officiates in the same Church in the morning.

BUSINESS PROSPECTS IN GREAT BRITAIN.—The London Times now takes a very gloomy view of the immediate business future. The crops are poor, the potato crop especially was almost a total failure—the rot was not so bad for many years—and business generally is most oppressed. It was hoped early in the year that the turning point had been reached, but this hope is no longer entertained and the Times fears that the country must pass through more severe trials before an improvement will take place.

WHAT IS IT?—The steamer "Cortes," which arrived yesterday morning from St. John's, N. F., brought up a curious kind of sea monster, which was caught at Catalina on the 24th ult., by two fishermen. It had been driven round the east point of that harbor during a gale, and when noticed it was still living, but was in a very exhausted condition, and was rescued with much difficulty and taken to St. John's, N. F., where it was sold to parties in New York for \$500, who intend to preserve it and put it up on exhibition. The following are the dimensions curtailed from the St. John's, N. F. "Star":—The animal is forty feet six inches between extremities, or from the point of its longest tentacle to the point of its tail. It has eight arms which radiate from the head of the animal, four from either side of the head, near the extremity of which, with two of the shorter tentacula between them, spring two enormously long arms or feelers of about thirty feet six inches each, varying in thickness from their extremities to the base at from about six to twelve inches in circumference. The mass of the body, including the tail, was about ten feet in length and about three in breadth, with an average thickness of about twelve inches. The tail is about two feet nine inches across, and the head is about two feet and a half in circumference.—*Hx.*

WAR NEWS.

LONDON, Oct. 4.
 General attack was made on Mukhtar Pash's whole line yesterday morning. General Melikoff was in command.
 The Key of Mukhtar's position, which was defended by only a single battalion, was attacked on three sides and captured. Battalion was annihilated. Turks tried to recapture this point, but were repulsed. Hopes are entertained of cutting off Mukhtar Pasha from Kars. Russians bivouacked on the conquered position. Fighting is sure to recommence at once.
 Despatches state that a fight took place early to-day. Fifteen hundred Russian killed and wounded.
 Reported active interchange of communication between Serbia and Greece, concerning despatch of cannon to frontier, and other warlike signs.
 It is announced that Russia has asked for 40,000 men, for which she promises the cession of a portion of Russian Bessarabia and a considerable subsidy. Roumanian Chamber will be convoked to discuss the proposal.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 4.
 According to unofficial accounts the Russians under Grand Duke Michael were defeated near Kars, and two Russian Generals killed.
 The Prince of Montenegro has decided to consider this year's campaign terminated with the occupation of district of Banjani. The Prince has written to the Czar that he has succeeded in obtaining his principal object; namely, deliverance of Upper Herzegovina, and did not intend to go beyond.

Turkey abandoned Kalorick on approach of Russians around Tiernova.
 Fifty refugees are dying daily from typhoid fever.
 Four hundred Abchasin prisoners were killed in the railway accident near Woronesch.
 General Goshiffs has arrived at Constantinople.
 The Porte has consented to allow the passage of timber across the Danube for the construction of huts for the Russian wounded.
 Russia offered to clear obstructions from the mouth of the Danube if neutral powers will guarantee to prevent the entrance of Russian men-of-war during the present war.

GENERAL NEWS.
 OTTAWA, Oct. 3.
 A new daily Catholic paper to be called the Herald, will be started on the 15th of November.
 The members of the Pontifical Zouaves have presented Consineau, the Pilot of the steamer Victoria, with a gold watch and chain and a purse of \$200, for the part he took in the flag quarrel on board the steamer last summer.
 The Minister of Customs declines to accept the application of Delafield and return his diamonds.
 At the Rine temperance meeting last night Mr. David Brown, a former civil servant, delivered an address. He was intoxicated when he came to the first meeting.

MONTREAL, Oct. 3.
 Yesterday's receipts of taxes at the City Hall was the largest on record, being over \$120,000.
 The only banks severely victimized by sharpers are the Union and Ontario.
 The police are actively prosecuting the owners of unlicensed dogs.
 Stephen J. Meany is expected here again in a few days.
 American excursionists are still pouring in by hundreds.
 A number of gentlemen yesterday organized a Reform Episcopal Church in connection with the American body. Bishop Fellows, of Chicago, will preach their first sermon.
 It is rumored that at the close of the approaching session of Parliament Mr. Joy will withdraw from the Local House and run for the Commons.

MONTREAL, Oct. 4.
 A forgery has been discovered on the Bank Nationale for \$5,000.
 At a bazaar at Quebec the vote for the most popular public man stood 3068 for Hon. Mr. Langevin, and 1262 for Mayor Murphy.
 Depositions have been laid against two prominent physicians for forgery and conspiracy.

MAGDALEN ISLANDS, via Pictou, Oct. 3.—The steamer "Alert," with mails and passengers, arrived from Pictou last night and returns to-day. On the 22d and 23d ult., it blew a terrible gale of wind here, veer-

ing from east to north with an extraordinary high tide, doing a good deal of damage to wharves, buildings, haystacks, fences, etc. At Entry Island the schooner "Sea-flower," of Port Hawkesbury, was driven on shore with loss of anchors, where she still remains. Her fishing outfit is a total loss; crew saved. At Amherst Island twenty-two fishing boats were driven on shore and more or less damaged, and a number of stacks of hay blown down and destroyed. At House harbor a large sloop belonging to the Magdalen Island Packing Company was driven from her anchorage, capsized and lost. Her crew were fortunately on shore, or they must have perished. There are no other casualties reported from the other Islands. At Etang du Nord the fishing boats were all beached and hauled up before the gale commenced. Owing to the stormy and unsettled state of the weather during the past fortnight, our fishermen have done very little. Codfish are reported plentiful on the inshore banks. Bait continues scarce. Our vessels have commenced to load with the products of the fisheries for Halifax and a market.

REV. GEO. M. GRANT.

Our Charlottetown despatch informs us that Rev. Geo. M. Grant has signified his acceptance of the Principalship of Queen's College, Kingston, Ontario, to which position he has been elected. The reverend gentleman will be greatly missed, not only by the congregation of St. Matthew's, over which he has so long and ably presided as pastor, but by the citizens of Halifax generally, whose good opinions he has won, for though many of us had occasion to differ from him at times, none will deny that he has been a most energetic and useful citizen, foremost in every good work. Especially will he be missed by our benevolent institutions, in nearly all of which he has long been a most indefatigable worker; his eloquent appeals have brought money to their treasuries, and his untiring efforts have materially contributed to their successful management. St. Matthew's congregation will find it hard to fill his place, Dalhousie College will lose in him one of its most influential friends, and every work of the Presbyterian Church in the Lower Provinces will be a loser through his departure. Nova Scotia, and especially Pictou County, may justly feel honored by the choice of one of her sons to fill so important and responsible a position as that of the head of Queen's College. The whole community, while regretting his removal from a sphere of activity in which he has proved himself eminently useful and successful, will heartily wish him God speed in the new field of labor to which he is called, and for the discharge of the duties of which he possesses special qualifications.—*Hx. Chron.*

The following Bye-Law is, by order of the City, Published for the information of the Citizens:
CAP. 23.

SEC. 3. No person shall be allowed to build a wall, put up a fence, or porch, or erect a building of any kind facing upon the streets of the City, without first having applied to the Surveyor aforesaid, who shall give the applicant a written certificate so to do,—which shall be endorsed by the Mayor,—stating that he (the Surveyor) has, in conformity with the City regulations, laid off said building-site, and granted permission to put up such building, wall, or fence (as the case may be), in compliance with the survey, which shall describe the line or boundaries of the street or streets thereof, and for such certificate the Surveyor shall be entitled to receive the sum of Two Shillings and Sixpence, the same to be paid into the hands of the Clerk of the City quarterly by said Surveyor, who shall hand over the amount to the Treasurer thereof for City purposes. Any person who shall be guilty of a breach of this Section shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Ten Pounds.
