SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Gen. Middleton. BOSTON, June 3. Lieut. Gen. Sir Frederick Middleton, Commander-in-Chief of the Canadian forces, and Lady Middleton, are stopping at the Adams House. They dined there last evening. In the afternoon they returned from a day's drive about the suburbs. They attended the Country Club races in the forenoon which they enjoyed exceedingly. Said Gen. Middleton: "I came especially with my regiment to take command during the Indian rising trouble, and shall not remain in Canada much longer, as we intend returning to England shortly. My wife is very fond of England, although she is French-Canadian, and myself about half Canadian already."

Three Men Drowned. MACAY'S STATION, Ont., June 3. Six men in the employ of Pierce & Co., Ottawa, attempted to run the rapids on the Petawawa River against the orders of their foreman. The boat swung around in the current and upset, drowning Clephas Theoret, of Point Claire, Hyacinthe N. Callet and Dennis Beaudry. The bodies had not been discovered when the messenger left the place of the accident.

The Vacancy in the Senate. OTTAWA, June 3. A popular agitation has been started to have the vacancy in the Senate, caused by the death of Senator Ferrier, filled by the appointment of Richard White, of the Montreal *Gazette*, brother of the late Minister of the Interior. The Government has not yet, however, considered the matter.

Winter Steamer. OTTAWA, June 3. The Marine Department have adopted the suggestion recently made by Capt. McElhinney, in reference to securing a steel steamer of the Swedish model to replace the Northern Light, and the Captain has been instructed to ask tenders of Glasgow builders, with a view to the immediate construction of such a steamer.

Another Newspaper Burnt Out. WINNIPEG, June 3. The offices of the *Call* newspaper were completely destroyed by fire about one o'clock this morning, together with plant and all contents, only some private papers being saved. The loss is about \$40,000. Crop reports from various parts of Manitoba are of the most encouraging character.

A Protest. OTTAWA, June 3. It is reported that several members of the Albany Club have written to Sir John Macdonald against the appointment of Mr. Dewdney as Minister of the Interior, on the ground that the appointment will open up the old sores of the Northwest Rebellion.

Quick Passage. NEW YORK, June 3. The Cunard steamer *Etruria* which arrived here this morning made the trip from Queenstown in 5 days, 23 hours, the quickest on record.

Orders Cancelled. HALIFAX, June 3. The orders for towing the Allan liner *Sardinian* to Montreal have been cancelled and she will be repaired here.
