

Als Wallop Tiger-Cats; Argos Down Riders 42-24

Montreal Alouettes manhandled the Tiger-Cats 28-12 in the second game of a rain-soaked day at Montreal Saturday and Sunday.

The Alouettes, the league's top team, came late in the game and were the hottest in the country's setup, meanwhile walloped the Rough Riders 42-24 at Toronto. It was their third straight victory after a dismal performance in the first game and a drop into third place, one point behind Montreal and two in front of Toronto.

Kitchener-Waterloo Dutchmen rallied for a last-minute converted touchdown to win the London Lords 22-21 in the 100th game of the Senior Ontario Rugby Football Union scheduled Saturday night. Quarter back Bob Miller tossed the winning TD pass to Chico Mendoza in the end zone.

THREE INTERCEPTIONS
Quarterback Sam Etcheverry guided the Als off with a 47-yard touchdown fling to Dick Hunter, a mate snared three Hamilton passes, one of them good for a yard touchdown run by Bill Wiley.

The Als never trailed after a 35-yard Etcheverry's pass early in the first quarter. Pat Abruzzo and Joel Cracked through the Hamilton line later in the game and Wiley booted a field goal and converted.

The Cats mustered only one touchdown. It came in the third quarter when Bernie Faloney, from the Montreal 19, finished off a series of accurate flings by Ron Howell. Steve Onek converted.

LONDON (AP) — Australian athlete Elliot's mile run of three minutes, 54.5 seconds has been ratified as a world record by the International Amateur Athletic Federation said Saturday.

Also ratified were marks set by Australian Bert Thomas—3:58.8 for the three miles and 10:12 for two miles. Elliot and Thomas set the marks at Dublin last July.

First Landing Captures World's Richest Race

CAMDEN, N.J. (AP) — First Landing and Eddie Arcaro smashed home in a driving rainstorm Saturday to defeat the West's Tommy Lee by a head in the world's richest horse race—the \$297,250 Garden State Stakes. The winner's purse was a whopping \$175,000-plus.

While a crowd of 34,127 screamed with excitement, the handsome bay colt not only became the biggest money winning two-year-old in history, but definitely wrapped up the 1958 juvenile crown and established himself as the colt to beat in the Kentucky Derby and other three-year-old classics next season.

First Landing is a husky son of Turn — To, who won the first running of the Garden State in 1953 for the Cain Hoy Stable. His dam was Hildene, the mother of Hill Prince, the 1949 two-year-old champion owned by C. T. Chenery, of Doswell, Va., and New York.

WON SIX IN ROW
Tommy Lee is an English-bred colt who won six in a row in California before being defeated by First Landing in the \$151,300 Champagne Stakes at Belmont Park Oct. 11. His owner is Fred Turner Jr. of Midland, Tex.

Tommy Lee, with Willie Shoemaker up, finished two lengths ahead of the Brookmeade Stable's Sword Dancer. It was another three lengths back to the fourth place.

Thirteen two-year-olds started in the race after a storm turned the track into a lake of slop. **RECORD SINGLE PURSE**
Their jockeys were riding hard and furious for the second richest purse in the history of the sport, and for the most money ever earned by a horse in one race. In 1956, the race was worth \$319,210, and Barbizon netted \$168,490.50.

First Landing netted \$175,965, in winning his 10th race in 11 starts. His total bankroll of \$396,460 wiped out the former two-year-old money record of \$349,642.

Stocks Down First Time In 10 Weeks

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market declined on average last week for the first time in 10 weeks.

The lower trend ended Thursday as rails spurred, even though industrials continued to decline. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks closed at \$197.60, down \$1.50, although the rail component was ahead \$1.10 and finished at a 1958 peak.

High-flying American Motors jumped 4 1/2% most of it on Friday when the company reported auto sales in the first 20 days of October ran far ahead of all October last year.

The five most active issues on the New York exchange were: Studebaker - Packard, unchanged at 14 on 880,200 shares; American Motors, up 4% at 31 1/2; Avco Manufacturing, up 1/2% at 9 1/2; Servel, up 1% at 10 1/2; and Loew's, unchanged at 22.

The five most active stocks on the American exchange were: Lefcourt Realty, up 1/2 to 4 1/2 on 246,800 shares; Seeburg Corp., up 2 1/2% at \$1; Holly Corp., unchanged at 1 1/2; Crowell Collier, up 1/4 at 14 1/4; and Campbell Chibougama Mines, down 1/4 at 8 1/4.

See Boost In Steel Output
CLEVELAND (AP) — Continued increases in steel production during the next few days were predicted Sunday by Steel magazine.

The metalworking weekly said steelmaking operations would gain, with automobile manufacturers building up their inventories to take care of their needs caused by double shift operations and over-work.

The magazine said operations of the steel mills are expected to reach a peak of 85 per cent of rated capacity during the fourth quarter. The rate last week was 75 per cent, a high for the year. This was one point higher than the previous week's level. Production totalled about 2,024,000 net tons compared with 2,052,000 tons in the corresponding week of last year.

Steel's price composite on prime grades of steelmaking scrap held at \$42.33 a gross ton last week for the third straight week.

Bruins And Rangers Win; Leafs Blank Red Wings

MONTREAL (CP) — Boston Bruins gave up two early goals while short-handed and then blasted their way to a 5-2 National Hockey League win Saturday night over the league-leading Montreal Canadiens.

The Bruins out-skated and out-hustled the Montrealers after trailing 2-0 late in the first period.

Five Bruins shared the scoring—Leo Boivin, Jean Guy Gendron, Johnny Bucyk, Don McKenney and Larry Regan.

Maurice (Rocket) Richard and Jean Beliveau scored on power plays while Canadiens had a manpower advantage. The Bruins, hit by injuries that have sidelined defencemen Doug Mohns and centre Bronco Horvath, struck back to even the count before the first period ended. They added two more goals in the second and another in the third to win going away.

Quebec Regains Soccer Crown From Ontario
TORONTO (CP) — With a lineup that included two United Kingdom internationals, Quebec defeated Ontario 12-2 Sunday and regained the interprovincial Jubilee Rugby Union Trophy.

The visitors, defeated in Montreal in the season's previous encounter in May, gained extra power from the inclusion of John Allan, former Scottish winger, and Tom Reid, who played forward for Ireland.

All Quebec's scoring came from penalty-goals. Bert Reid gave Ontario the lead with a penalty-goal after five minutes but after Fagan evened the score, Adams kicked another goal for Quebec.

In the second half Ferguson added another penalty-goal and Ian Nichols replied with an unconverted try for Ontario. Five minutes from the end Adams kicked a long penalty-goal which bounced over after hitting the crossbar.

DOESN'T HAVE TO PAY
MONTREAL (CP) — Mr. Justice Andre Montpelit of Quebec Superior Court has ruled that a night club client is not required by law to pay for liquor sold to him on credit. He dismissed an action brought by a Montreal night club (Cafe St. Jacques) against Emile Lehouerou for non-payment of a \$277 bill "for drinks."

NEW YORK (CP) — Six different players scored the New York goals as the Rangers won their first game of the National Hockey League season on home ice Saturday 6-2 over Chicago Black Hawks.

A small crowd of 6,805 watched the Rangers break loose for three goals in the second period and two more in the third. The afternoon game was watched by millions on television.

It was a rough affair with referee Frank Udvari handing out 25 penalties, 13 against the Rangers.

Al Arbour slipped a soft, high shot past Ranger goalie Gump Worsley for the first Black Hawk goal in the first minute but Jim (Crazy Horse) Bartlett quickly set up Bill Gadsby at 3:40 of the period, the veteran defenceman firing into an open Chicago net.

Next slickhandling by Hank Ciesla gave New York its second goal at 5:52 of the second period. Late in the period Bartlett stole a Chicago pass in Ranger ice and beat Glen Hall easily and Andy Heberton converted from an angle at 19:12 to make it 4-1.

After Danny Lewick scored for Chicago at 7:18 of the third period while Ed Shack of the Rangers was in the penalty box, the Rangers bounced back for goals on long shots by Shack and Andy Bathgate.

Lou Fontinato and Tod Sloan figured in a brawl in the first period and drew major and misconduct penalties.

TORONTO (CP) — Toronto Maple Leafs, scoring once in each period, recorded an impressive 3-0 victory over Detroit Red Wings Saturday night for their second win of the National Hockey League season.

A crowd of 12,894 watched Leafs put forth their best showing of their six games to date as they continually harassed Wing goaltender Terry Sawchuk with close-in shots. Between goals by Dick Duff, Bob Pulford and Brian Cullen, Toronto netminder Johnny Bower made some great saves for his first shutout as a Leaf.

Bower, obtained from Cleveland Barons of the American Hockey League last summer, was particularly sharp in the first and third periods when he stopped 23 of the 29 shots Detroit fired at him.

Sawchuk also turned in a stand-out performance and the three shots which beat him were not his fault. In the second period he stopped 19 Leaf drives and had a total of 33 saves.

It was the first shutout by Leafs against Detroit in 23 games between the two clubs. Leafs last won by a shutout Dec. 1, 1956, when they defeated Detroit 4-0 here.

With less than five minutes left in the first period Duff pushed the puck under Sawchuk after the Detroit goaltender had fallen to block a shot by Ron Stewart.

Midway through the second period Pulford banged Frank Mahovlich's rebound behind Sawchuk for his third goal of the season, tons for the Toronto team. Cullen also got his first goal when he took Mahovlich's pass.
