SDU Announces Staff Additions

New staff members at St. Dunstan's University for the current year include Don Cregier, MA, and Baird Judson, MSc.

Mr. Cregier received his master of arts degree from the University of Michigan and has completed the basic requirements for his Ph.D. Research for his doctoral dissertation was carried out at Yale University and the University of London.

Centre Receives Financial Help

Prime Minister Pearson announced yesterday that the government will pay \$100,000 towards the immediate financial needs of the Confederation Centre in Charlottetown, P.E.I., and undertake to pay part of annual deficits in the future.

He said in a statement the government will pay half of the performing arts centre's deficits in the future with a top limit of \$175,000 a year from the federal treasury.

Construction of the centre, opened in 1964 to commemorate the first meeting of the Fathers of Confederation, was financed jointly by the federal and provincial governments. Its combined theatre, art gallery and other facilities were expected to operate with a deficit for years.

Mr. Pearson said the immediate payment of \$100,000 will assure that the centre will continue to operate.

"In addition," his statement said, "federal aid toward meeting deficits in running costs of the centre in the future will be increased from the present level of \$100,000 a year to one-half of such deficits, with the federal share not to exceed \$175,000 annually."

STILL UNCERTAIN

The Fathers of Confederation Memorial Trust said yesterday morning, however, that the money from Ottawa "does not ensure the continued operation of the Centre."

A spokesman for the trust said "there still remains a substantial difference between the amount offered by the federal government and the actual annual operating and maintenance budget of the Centre."

SOME OTHER SOURCE

"This \$100,000 difference," the spokesman said, "will still have to be raised from some source to guarantee the long-term operation."

"Meanwhile, the executive of the trust will consider the statement of the Prime Minister this morning to determine a course of action."

PREMIER DELIGHTED

Premier Campbell has expressed his delight with the announcement of Prime Minister Pearson stating "this removes to a great extent the doubts expressed lately about the future operation of the Centre."

"The Provincial Government has worked with the Fathers of Confederation Building Trust and the Fathers of Confederation Memorial Citizens Foundation and the supported their representations to the federal government. We shall continue to seek further financial support for the Centre from both the federal government and the other provinces."

GIVES RELIEF

"The former government of this province undertook in 1961 to pay all operating and maintenance costs of the Centre and the Prime Minister's announcement has relieved us to a great extent from the financial burden of this commitment."

The Premier also stated that the provincial government fully supports the Centre which was constructed by the people of Canada as a national memorial to the Fathers of Confederation and noted that "it also provides the people of our province with excellent library, theatre and museum facilities and the exhibits and activities of the Centre are now recognized as one of the major tourist attractions in the province."

City Hospital Boosts Fund

The Chairman of the staff canvass at the Charlottetown Hospital Brendon McGinn, reported an 82 percent increase in donations for the United Fund over the last year total.

In the campaign last year the total raised by this group was \$1,985.00 but in the initial planning for this year's campaign, the group set a target of \$3,500.00. The amount reported this morning, on completion of the canvass, was \$3,609.20, with 100 per cent of the staff contributing through payroll deductions.

A. W. Gaudet, president of the United Fund, when informed of this, remarked "what a fine example these people have given in their support of community services through the United Fund."

He extended his congratulations and the thanks of the 34 agencies, to all the staff at the hospital for their wonderful showing. He said he was sure it would be an encouragement to others who had not yet made their commitments to the annual drive.

This report brings the total of the current campaign to \$155,483.25, 61 per cent of the total required for 1967 operations.

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
