

Beavers Take Cup Playoff Triumph In Four Straight

SHERBROOKE, Que. (CP)—The 21 victory of Sherbrooke Beavers over Nelson B.C. Maple Leafs Saturday night brought the Allan Cup back to Quebec province after an absence of 18 years.

Gill Gilbert, manager of the vanquished Leafs, said the Beavers were "without a doubt worthy champions of Canada" and added that the Beavers were the best-balanced team his 35-year squad had met all season.

The Saturday night win, before 4,100 spectators, was the fourth in a row for the Sherbrooke team in their best-of-seven Allan Cup playoff. Beavers downed the Leafs 7-3 in the opener, 4-1 in the second game and then steam-rolled the hapless Leafs 9-2 in the third. All games were played here.

SCORES THREE-TIMES

Simon Nolel sparked the Sherbrooke attack Saturday night, scoring three goals. Claude Cardin was a step behind with two goals and George Guilbeault, Larry Drouin and Reswan Richer got one apiece. Pace-setter for the hapless

Leafs was Mike Laughton who beat Beaver goalie Serge Aubry twice. The other two scorers for Nelson were Buck Crawford and defenceman Dave Stewart. The Allan Cup, emblematic of

Canadian senior amateur hockey superiority was presented to Beaver captain Rene Pepin by Lionel Fleury, president of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, immediately after the game.

In making the presentation, Mr. Fleury told the Sherbrooke squad that because of their clear-cut victory they had "a good chance of being sent over to Europe to compete there during the next hockey season."

The last time a Quebec province team won the Allan Cup was in 1947 when it went to the Montreal Royals.

GOALIE STRONG

Although Nelson played their strongest game of the series against the eastern club Saturday night, they were foiled time and again by the steady goal-tending of Aubry.

The western team, badly outshot in the first three games, did better in their final game, making 40 shots on goal compared to Sherbrooke's 42.

—sterling performance—by Nelson goalie Jim Letcher prevented Sherbrooke from running away with the game. Letcher stopped Nolel on three breakaways and turned aside a total of 34 shots.

Nelson scored both the first and last goals of the game but lost out in exchanges in between.

Both teams skated strongly throughout the match but Sherbrooke passing was slicker and the checking harder. The eastern team also displayed greater accuracy around the net.

The last game was generally cleanly played, as was the case throughout most of the series. However, there was one last-period altercation which resulted in a Nelson player being banished from the game.

DIDN'T LIKE IT

At the 18-second mark of the third period, Leaf goalie Letcher got a minor penalty for having thrown the puck into the crowd. Bob Kromm did not like the call and said so. He was sent to the penalty box for his trouble.

In the penalty box, he found out he had been given a major penalty and took a swipe at the referee with his stick. Referee Dutch Vandeleen changed the call to a game misconduct and sent Kromm to the dressing room.

Kromm said after the game that he had no comment to make.

Dodgers Win 5 Straight, Giants Mays Suffers Injury

Los Angeles Dodgers won their fifth straight game Saturday, clobbering San Francisco Giants 9-0 behind the three-hit pitching of Don Drysdale and the hitting and running of Maury Wills.

In other National League games, New York Mets defeated Milwaukee Braves 4-2, Cincinnati Reds trampled Pittsburgh Pirates 10-1, Houston Astros stopped Chicago Cubs 11-4, and Philadelphia Phillies edged St. Louis Cardinals 9-8.

In the American League, Detroit Tigers edged Baltimore Orioles 4-3 in 15 innings, Minnesota Twins defeated Chicago White Sox 4-1, New York Yankees knocked off Washington Senators 7-3, Boston Red Sox bombed Cleveland Indians 15-4

and Los Angeles Angels edged Kansas City Athletics 3-2.

Drysdale didn't walk a man and struck out seven in winning his fourth game against two defeats. He aided the Dodgers' attack with a triple and a single, scoring both times. Wills collected three singles, stole three bases for a total of 17, scored three runs and drove in one.

The Giants' Willie Mays was shaken up in the fourth inning trying for an over-the-shoulder catch on Drysdale's triple. The centre fielder left the game after the sixth inning.

Al Kaines leadoff homer in the 15th gave Detroit the victory over Baltimore. Bob Johnson had tied it for the Orioles with a homer in the fifth. Minnesota scored once in the

seventh inning on a sacrifice fly by Zoilo Versalles and twice in the eighth on Jimmie Halls homer, wiping out a 1-1 contest. The Twins' Jim Grant hurled his third straight complete game, scattering seven hits.

The Yankees jumped to a 5-0 lead in the first inning and coasted past Washington behind Jim Bouton's four-hitter. Joe Pepitone slammed a three-run homer in the early outburst.

Boston took advantage of two errors by third baseman Max Avis and scored six runs in the second inning, two each scoring on doubles by Bill Mombouquette and Felix Mantilla. Tony Conigliaro added a three-run homer for the Red Sox.

Rookie Ron Swoboda drove in all of the Mets' runs with a pair of homers, his sixth and sev-

enth of the season. Ed Mathews clouted his seventh homer for Milwaukee.

SCORES ON SACRIFICE

Cincinnati erupted for five runs against Boly Beale in the fourth inning, the last three on Deron Johnson's homer. Unbeaten Jim Maloney scattered eight hits for his fourth triumph.

Larry Dierker won his first major league game by stopping Chicago in the last 4 1/3 innings. The Astros, meanwhile, rocked the Cubs for 18 hits, three of them homers by Rusty Staub, Jim Wynn and Joe Morgan.

Philadelphia edged St. Louis by scoring the winning run in the 11th inning when rookie Nelson Briles walked Pat Corrales with the bases loaded.

Rookie Marcelino Lopez checked the Athletics on eight hits and drove in the tie-breaking run with a sacrifice fly in the seventh inning in the Los Angeles victory.
