A VALUABLE DISCOVERY.—A discovery of natural gas was made some time ago, a distance of about two miles from Moncton by the road. The discovery was made in a barren, boggy district, some distance back of the Fox Creek road, so called. The ground is almost impossible in the rainy season, and is valueless for agricultural purposes. The fact that natural gas existed there has been known for some time by residents in the locality, but they do not appear to have realized the possibilities within their reach it is believed from the large area showing indications that a valuable deposit exists, and the right to make further tests has been secured by M. Lodge of Moncton.

POLICE COURT.—This forenoon William Power, for being drunk and disorderly yesterday, was fined 250 or 30 days. He took the days. John Bell, son of the late March Bell, was arraigned on complaint of his sister who charged that he struck her in the face with his fist, inflicting a wound. The prosecutrix failed to appear this morning, however, and the court being informed that she had left the Island, the prisoner was discharged. Before being discharged, Bell was severely admonished by His Honor and promised 90 days in jail the next time he appeared. Clement Benoit yesterday paid the two fines of \$100 and costs imposed upon him for violating the Liquor Regulation Act. The fines and costs amounted to \$208.50.

A GOOD WORD FOR CANADA.—The Intere published in Chicago, says: "We are not so anxious to annex Canada as we are to see some of her good ideas transplanted to this side of the border. Throughout the whole of her vast western dominions you will not find an outlaw, or hear of a case of lynching. It is not because she has to deal with a class of frontiersmen so different from those of our own Western States, but because she has laws and executes them. You can go nowhere, not even in the fastness of the Rockies or the isolation of the Selkirk, without finding the scarlet uniform of her mounted police. You will feel everywhere the presence of protecting law. You are made to realize that you are in a land of order, and that your person and property are under the care of the commonwealth. In too many of our own communities we are fast relapsing into that barbarism in which private revenge becomes the miserable substitute for public justice. In so far as we do this we are centuries behind the age."

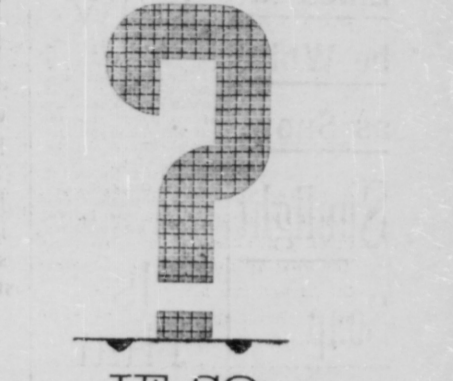
