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Western Section Mid-Canada Radar Line Now In Operation

OTTAWA (CP) — The western section of the 200,000,000 Mid-Canada radar warning line went into operation on schedule New Year's Day, the defence department said Wednesday.

The western portion of the 3,000-mile radar line, extending from James Bay to the Peace River district of Alberta, the eastern section from James Bay to the Labrador coast will go into operation about the end of February, six to eight weeks behind the Jan. 1 target date.

An RCAF spokesman said transportation difficulties and bad weather have caused the delay in the eastern sector.

Completion of the Mid-Canada line, built by the Trans-Canada Telephone System under RCAF supervision—Bell Telephone Company was the management contractor—will give North America two of its radar fences. The Pine-tree line in southern Canada, in operation for three years, controls the operations of its jet fighter planes which would intercept

Thermometers fell to 11 below Monday, one below New Year's Day and 10 below Wednesday. The weatherman predicted the lowest temperature of all for Wednesday night and early Thursday, 15 below.

Refugee Scouts Reach Canada

As a result of the offer by the Boy Scouts Association to provide temporary accommodation, sixty Hungarian refugees arrived at Gilwell Park, England, the Association's Training Centre for leaders, last month. All males between the ages of 14 and 30, the Hungarians are being looked after by the Scout Staff there. Film and other leisure activities have been arranged to entertain them.

Chronology of Events Leading To Canadian Pacific Strike

GEN CHRONOLOGY MONTREAL (CP)—Following is the chronology of events leading to the strike Wednesday of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen (CLC) against the CPR: Feb. 1—Union gives 60-day notice of new contract demands the old contract expiring March 31. Demands include a 25-per cent pay increase pay for statutory holidays and time-and-a-half for statutory holidays worked. Feb. 21—Company and union begin negotiations in East. Feb. 29—Negotiations begin in West. CPR raises the issue of firemen's board freight and yard diesel in East and West meetings. April 18—The company applies to the labor department for a conciliation board on the diesel issue. CONCILIATION BOARD April 19—The union applies for a conciliation board on the wage issue. May 9—Judge J. C. Anderson, Belleville, Ont., chairman, Liberal Senator A. W. Roebuck, Toronto, union nominee, and lawyer E. M. Hall, Saskatoon, company nominee, are appointed as conciliation board to hear the dispute. June 9—Board meets at Belleville to consider procedural matters. June 27—Board opens public hearings at Ottawa. The board upholds the company's request for court room procedure over union objections.

Saint John Terminal Of C. P. R. Quiet As Strike Gets Going

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—This eastern terminal of the Canadian Pacific Railway was quiet Wednesday night as 2,000 employees left their jobs in recognition of a nationwide strike by locomotive firemen. A CPR spokesman said the only company employees still working in the railway yards were 15 gangs of truckers loading non-perishable cargoes in little cars near the west side piers. During a regular night while the winter port is in operation between 35 and 40 gangs of seven men each are loading cargoes for train shipments to other Canadian points.

Sealed Mine To Be Opened Soon

HALIFAX (CP) — Mines Minister E. Manson said Wednesday that the No. 4 Colliery at Springhill which still holds 26 bodies from the Nov. 1 explosion, will be opened "in the near future." He said the inquiry, which opened following explosion that took 39 lives will be reconvened when the mine is opened. Judge J. W. MacDonald of Pictou, N.S., heads the inquiry.

Skipper Reports Rough Crossing

HALIFAX (CP) — The storm-battered British freighter West Hill pulled into Halifax Wednesday 25 days after leaving Glasgow, Scotland, and her skipper said the crossing was the roughest he has seen in 30 years at sea. Capt. Francis Campbell said the ship, bound for Hampton Roads, Va., for a cargo of coal, ran into a succession of storms. "North of Bermuda we ran into a real basher. I tried to get into Boston but the wind was against us so I made for Halifax."

Canadians Are Urged To Ease Tensions Of Living

MONTREAL (CP) — Canadians were urged Wednesday to ease the stress and tensions of every-day living. The plea was made by the Royal Bank of Canada in its monthly letter, normally devoted to some business activity. "Wise use of our leisure holds the germs of survival in our complicated civilization," said the letter. "Play, fun and laughter are agents of health."

Traffic On CNR Was Very Heavy During Holiday

MONTON, N.B. — More than 120,000 passengers travelled in Canadian national railways trains in the Atlantic Region during the Christmas and New Year holiday period from December 20 to Jan. 3, George Stiven, Regional general passenger agent said Wednesday. To handle the large movement of regular travellers, troops, students, refugees and immigrants, 26 extra trains were required during the two-week period, he said. This brought close to 1,000 4-boggy C.N.R. passenger trains operated during the Yuletide season in the Atlantic Region alone.
