SOURIS—Brendon MacAuley, grade nine, and Gailan were crowned king and queen of Souris Regional High School at a coronation ball in the school last evening.

Brendon, son of Mr. and Mrs. Stewart MacAuley, Souris, is a grade 12 student, and Gailan, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Michael Gallant, St. Charles, is a grade 11 student.

The new rulers were crowned by last year's royalty, Robert Pierce of Souris and Wendy Burke of Fortune.

Princesses are Shirley Chandler, grade nine, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Chaisson, Bear River, and Shelly Peters, grade 10, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. Arthur Peters, Souris, and the crown princess, grade 10, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Grant, Souris, and Alva Paquet, grade 10, son of Mr. and Mrs. St. Clair Paquet, Souris.

The third annual coronation ceremonies got underway with a parade of open convertibles carrying the candidates, starting at the high school, and returning to the school by way of Main, Chapel and Longworth Streets.

Selection Announced For Resources Fieldman

A fieldman to direct resource and rural development policies, particularly in Prince County, will be brought to the province through arrangements with the federal government, Premier Swan said yesterday.

The premier said the fieldman will follow in the footsteps of a former fieldman, who was announced in a day or two, will continue his office to Prince County for the present.

He said he anticipated improvements in many areas of the province under the direction of the new development of the district. Val McIntyre, provincial officer associated with resource development, said the fieldman, Premier Swan stated, was "a highly qualified practical technician who has directed rural development programs in Quebec."

Mr. MacAuley was back in his office yesterday after an absence of several weeks during which he mixed a vacation with a number of business functions on behalf of the government.

During the past few weeks, the premier visited the Atlantic Winter Fair in Halifax, was in Toronto for a visit to the Royal Winter Fair, saw federal government officials in Ottawa and attended part of the federal program for a new agricultural rehabilitation and development agreement in Montreal.

"In Montreal," the premier said, "I had the opportunity of discussing rural development with Forestry Minister Swan, who is in charge of ARDA."

"I told Mr. Swan that it is my contention that a common sense approach, and members of the Commonwealth Secretariat staff from the United Kingdom, including Robin Vanderhorst, general secretary, and Sydney Pakeman, deputy secretary general."

TEACHERS' RESEARCH WORKSHOP OPENS IN CITY

A two-day research workshop for P.E.I. teachers began last evening at Prince Street Elementary School under the chairmanship of Miss Matheson, school principal. Prov Government Blasted By New Grit Candidates

Provincial government administration was attacked with vigor at Mt. Stewart Thursday night by Eugene Cullen, Charlottetown, and Cecil A. Miller, Pictou, who were nominated by the Third District Queens Liberal association to represent it in the next provincial election. Thus the Third Queens Liberals have been the first to get their election in the field for an election that has not yet been called.

Mr. Cullen criticized the Shaw administration in particular for the "unbusinesslike way" the government is being run, so that now the province is paying out in debt \$1,500,000 annually in debt carrying charges alone.

He charged the government particularly for the complete disregard for sound investment in the granting of loans in the case of the Farm Establishment Board. He charged the government with revoking a sound liberal policy and allowing large fish processors on the fisheries loan board and even to make large loans to themselves.

As examples of what Mr. Cullen charged was undertaken, he said in the past couple of years three new corporations have been organized for the sole purpose of selling machinery and equipment to the government.

Mr. Miller noted the very grave possibility of the province's administration being placed under a commission government because of the "very serious financial plight of the province."

His main criticism was directed against "the degree of political patronage which is going on in the province's civil service. The 1,700 people employed now by the province from various wide areas include only several hundred under the Liberal administration. Not only have many new jobs been created, but good, hard working employees had been released from various government departments.

The case of Lorne McKinnon, a former M.L.A. in the province, and later a candidate for the federal house of commons, was mentioned as an example of the position of head of the Civil Service Commission.

Mr. Miller charges, who substitutes a flagrant disregard for the principle of impartiality in the Civil Service.

The Frenchman form charged in the case of industrialist, Hickey, of Lower Montserrat, that he had been given jobs that became available as the province now holds the position of head of the Civil Service Commission.
