GOOD NEWS FROM SEA VIEW.

On Saturday, evening the 20th inst, Sir
Louis H. Davies and Mr. John Campbell, the
operator of Log River addressed a public
summoned meeting of the electors of Sea
View in the school-house of that district.

No public announcement of this meeting
had been made, nor was the opposition
candidate invited to attend. But, during
the day, local "heelers" of the Liberal
party were despatched through the district
to summon the "faithful,"—and about
sixty men women and children responded
to the summons. Besides the "faithful,"
there were also present a score or more
of Conservatives who, although not invited,
had assembled out of curiosity to know
how the erstwhile "democratic" Davies
now bore his "tin pot" title, and also to
ascertain what desperate urgency had
caused him to convene this meeting.

Sir Louis had not even the candor to
invite Mr. Campbell, the honorable member
for the first district of Queens, to offer
a few remarks upon the political questions
of the day. No, not Sir Louis knew
full well that the "old timer of New
London" would give him another instal-
ment of the severe castigation which Sen-
ator Ferguson had given him in Malpeque
hall on Friday evening. As soon as Sir
Louis had brought his rambling and
hyperbolic oration to a close, he announced
his determination to reach Charlotte-
town that night. No doubt alarming
news from the Capital of the daily increas-
ing disaffection in the ranks, had caused
this sudden return. The chairman accom-
panied Sir Louis to the door amid a
perfect fusillade of taunts, jibes and wisecr-
ams from an indignant audience, many of
whom were former supporters of the re-
treatng knight. After this gnomish
and cowardly flight, the audience appointed
another chairman who discharged his
duties in a thoroughly efficient and impar-
tial manner.

Mr. Campbell, then, in a brief speech,
completely demolished the flimsy argu-
ments and worn-out sophisms with
which the fanciful Minister of Marine
had sought to defend the acts of the pre-
sent Administration.

The meeting, originally convened in a
clandestine manner by Sir Louis and his
"satellites," finally closed with rousing
cheers for Campbell, for Sir Charles
Tupper, and for William S. Stewart, the
talented young standard-bearer of the
Liberal-Conservative party in West
Queen's

Morell Notes.

The cheese factory is still in opera-
tion making cheese. The butter plant
is expected to be in operation by the 1st
November. The Company are fortun-
ate in having as manager a thoroughly
competent man, Mr. Frank McNeill, of
New Perth. Besides being an excellent
cheese maker, he is a genius as a machi-
nist, and knows all about making a
boiler and engine do their work in the
most economical manner. As an in-
stance, he made sixty-five cheese in
eight days and tested the month's milk
on a one-horse one-half cord of wood.
We would like to know of someone who
can beat him. We want "Frank" to
settle down right here and stay with us.

The starch factory, operated by H.
D. McEwen and R. N. Cox, is working
night and day and cannot handle all the
potatoes offered. They expect to have
30,000 bushels manufactured before the
end of this month. This is a boom to
farmers in this section who contracted for
their produce last year.

There is not much interest taken in the
election. People are talking more about
getting out their potatoes and getting a
market for their produce. The "growing
time" argument has not much weight
with the farmer when he compares the
price of his produce with the price he has
had to pay for his wheat, oil, tobacco,
sugar, etc. The truth is that the only
big part of his labor is the produce of
the milk—the industry established by the
Conservatives. Even the most radical
liberal knows this to be true.

It is reported that the Liberal candidate
took a "cold chill" after the canvass
through Bangor last week.

Mr. Hines, the boat builder and yacht
designer, is taking orders for boats for
next year. He is a thorough workman,
and designs and works chiefly in the
yacht goods of Essex, U. S. A. Those in
need of a "cupper" should see him and

RE-OPENING OF CHURCH.—The Church of
