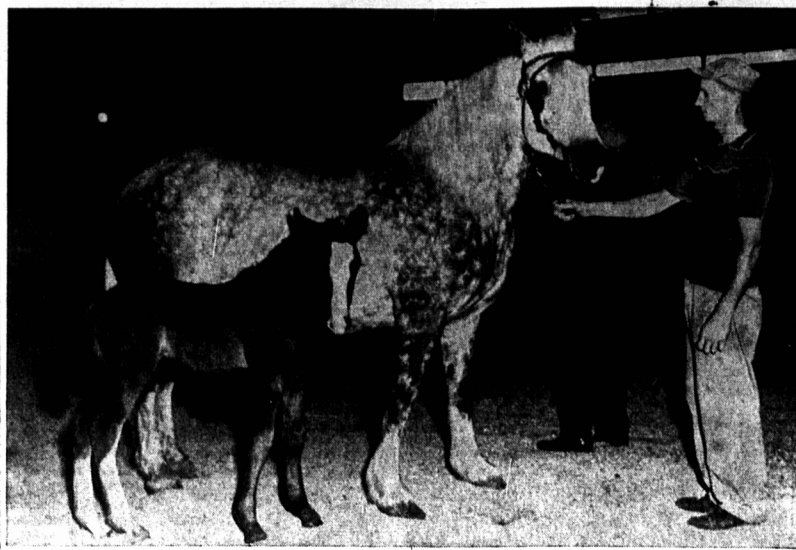


Vaudeville Proves Big Drawing Card At Fair

The list of horses which have set new marks for themselves in recent local racing is too long to permit any doubt of the speedways exceptional condition. Though he is not the type to look for praise, the credit for the improvement must go to "Jim" Llewellyn, the Exhibition's plant superintendent. All season long, in spite of many other duties, he has made extra efforts to make the track the best in the Maritimes. In his modest way, he has claimed that the oval has a better cushion than ever before, and the timers in the judges' stand bear him out. As overseer of all the Association's physical assets, including barns, stables, grand stands, driveways, and the new Coliseum, "Jim" has not one job but a dozen. Keeping the track in top shape is just one of them, though one in which he takes considerable pride. At any rate, thanks to him in great part racers and followers are seeing some very fine racing, only possible under above-average track conditions.

Most of our Island upland game birds are there, very much alive, and some fine specimens of the lovely Canada goose.
