Concern has been expressed by residents of Tyne Valley in regard to the auxiliary power unit being used at the hospital in Tyne Valley.

As a result of discussion with Red Cross officials at Summerside an announcement was made by Mr. Ewen Nicholson, chairman of the Summerside Red Cross Disaster Committee. He stated that arrangements were being made to supply the Stewart Memorial Health Centre at Tyne Valley with an auxiliary unit from either Mr. F. Schurman or Morrison and MacRae Ltd.

This will only be done in the event of an emergency or breakdown of the equipment now being used at the Tyne Valley Hospital.

FARM ESTABLISHMENT

Whereas capital costs in setting up farms have become very high, and whereas, other areas and types of employment offer attractions to our young people, and whereas it is of vital importance to the economy of this Province to keep the land in production, therefore be it resolved that the Provincial Government be urged to proceed with the establishment of a "Farm Settlement Policy". Moved by Allison Profit, seconded by Gregory McInnis.

THANKS TO PRESS

Resolved the thanks of this organization be expressed to the Guardian Publishing Company, the Patriot Publishing Company and The Journal Publishing Company for publicity and courtesies extended during the year. Moved by A. Henderson, seconded by Roland MacDonald.

THANKS TO RADIO

Resolved that the thanks of the Federation of Agriculture be expressed to the Island Radio Broadcasting Company and to the Gulf Broadcasting Company for the publicity and courtesies extended throughout the past year. Moved by Colin Waugh, seconded by R. MacDonald.

WOOD ISLAND FERRY

Be it resolved that the Federation of Agriculture press for the operation of an extended ferry service operating between Wood Islands and Caribou, such extended to cover December and January or until such time as conditions prohibit. Moved by Geo. MacDonald, seconded by R. MacDonald.

EXTENSION ON LOANS

Whereas many Island farmers are facing extreme difficulty in meeting their obligations this fall, and whereas the Federation of Agriculture seek to have extensions arranged for Farm Improvement Loans Act, Farm Loan Board payments and bank notes. Moved by Mrs. W. Lank, seconded by A. Henderson.

EGG AND HOG FLOOR PRICES

Be it resolved that the present floor price on hogs and eggs based on Montreal or Toronto is unsatisfactory to the producer, therefore be it resolved that those floor prices be changed to be the floor price at the local packers or grading station. Moved by Roland MacDonald, seconded by A. Henderson.

PRICE SUPPORT

Whereas the Price Support Act is applied on a hit and miss basis and not in keeping with the expressed intention of the Act and whereas the present condition of Canadian Agriculture indicates a more realistic approach to the problem of public responsibility in maintaining farm income. Therefore be it resolved that the C.F.A. continue to urge upon Federal and Provincial authorities the necessity of:

- (a) A review of the application of the Price Support Act.
- (b) The importance of a national approach to solving the problem of farm surplus.
- (c) The clarification of marketing legislation.

ADULT EDUCATION

Whereas Adult education is of marked importance in a rural society and whereas there is presently in this Province no director of adult education, therefore be it resolved that the Federation of Agriculture urge upon the Provincial Government the importance of filling this vacancy with a qualified person. Moved by Mrs. W. Lank, seconded by Gordon MacMillan.

Summerside Boy Scouts Were Prepared

The Boy Scouts of Summerside have been providing outstanding service during the present emergency resulting from the disastrous three day storm that left the town without electrical communication.

Beginning promptly Saturday two or three Scouts were on duty at the Police station at all times.

As conditions in the town began to improve and services steadily restored they did night duty only.

Their main task was to serve as runners in the delivery of messages. This was an important task, particularly in the beginning, as there were very few telephone connections working.

They carried messages of various kinds including the report of a fire to the Fire Hall after it had been reported to the Police Station. The Scouts also assisted the police in a great many ways.

MARKET INFORMATION

Whereas accurate daily market information is of value to potato growers and whereas the Potato Marketing Board would appear to be the proper source of such information, therefore be it resolved that the Potato Board be urged to publicize twice weekly the potato prices. HUNTING-FISHING LICENSE

Resolved that this meeting urge the Prince Edward Island Federation of Agriculture to oppose the proposal to impose license fees on farmers for hunting and fishing. Moved by Mrs. Lank, seconded by Roland MacDonald.

FARM LOAN BOARD

Whereas the Canada Farm Loan Board Act would appear to be administered in a very cautious manner and whereas there is evidence to indicate that higher rates of interest are being charged than is necessary and whereas if the Board were doing a higher percentage of mortgage lending, administration costs would be proportionately lower, therefore be it resolved that the Canadian Federation of Agriculture press for an immediate revision of the Act and for a more liberal application of its terms. New Telephone Link For S'side Tested After Two Men Make Hazardous Climb

Two Summerside men, Sonny Huestis and Ray Durant, made a daring climb to the top of the Summerside water tower standpipe, 200 feet above sea level, in strong wind and rain yesterday afternoon, and successfully completed the installation of an antenna device near the top of the tower by which telephone engineers made tests which they described as "very promising."

The tests being conducted on this experimental equipment are designed to establish a high frequency radio link between Summerside and a similar station located on a high point near Moncton, in the hope of being able to operate twelve telephone circuits on this system.

Braving the strong wind and cold rain, Huestis and Durant made the perilous climb to the top of the tower, each carrying a considerable load of equipment necessary for the installation of the antenna device which they hauled into position after securing themselves by means of safety belts a short way from the top of the towering standpipe which stands on the highest point of land in the Summerside area just north of the town, and which can be seen for many miles in all directions.

With the antenna secured near the top of the tower the two men returned safely to the ground where encouraging tests with the hauled station were conducted by Raymond Wilson, radio engineer of Halifax; Ian MacLeod, equipment and maintenance supervisor of Halifax; and R. McWilliams, technical assistant, Halifax.

As a result of the strong signal received in the tests, the successful installation of such a system at or near the site of yesterday's Summerside tests, would mean that a transmitting and receiving telephone radio range station similar to the one at Egmont Bay could be established here to supplement or replace the Egmont Bay unit which is now inoperative due to poles having been destroyed along the seventeen miles of lines that connect the transmitting unit with the Summerside office.

Rebuilding work, however, continuing along this line where 500 poles will have to be replaced, but it will be many days at best, before service can be restored on this system.

The successful installation and operation of a unit located at Summerside would be extremely important to telephone officials and the public, particularly at this time.

East Prince Junior Farmers Hear Talk On Livestock Breeds

The regular semi-monthly meeting of the East Prince Junior Farmers Organization was held Friday night at Department of Agriculture Board Room, Summerside with vice-president Junior Colwill in the chair. Roll call for the next meeting will be answered by "The greatest inconvenience the sleet storm caused us."

The guest speaker for the evening was Mr. H. W. Clay, Charlottetown, who is senior livestock fieldman with the Department of Agriculture.

"What will the agricultural be in 1976," asked Mr. Clay. "We will likely be saying then, that things have changed more in the last ten years than in the previous fifty."

Power Restored To 65 Per Cent Of S'side Last Night

About 65 per cent of the town of Summerside had power restored up to Sunday night with Milton Ave., Ottawa St. and Central St. from Water St. to Argyle St. completed over the weekend. Also poles have been erected on Notre Dame St., Granville Winter, Russell, Kirk and the Upper part of Summer St. and between Schurman Ave. and Corporation Ave. with work progressing rapidly throughout the town and hookups being made as fast as possible according to Mr. Ray MacKinnon, line supervisor.

Mr. George Morrison plant supervisor stated last evening that last Sunday the Summerside Electric Light Plant was only producing 55 kilowatts, but since that time had jumped their output on an average of 100 kilowatts per day. He said their biggest problem is the shortage of poles although two carloads are expected to arrive today from Truro which will help to alleviate the situation.

Mr. Morrison said that a roll-up car of diesel fuel for the plant was delivered through the cooperation of Mr. Ken Ford by means of Irving oil trucks due to the fact that there is now power between the plant and the pump house on Harvard Street which normally pumps the fuel to the plant.

TROUBLE WITH PLES

A rather harrowing experience befell Ray Jeffrey, a Summerside man on Saturday, when a newly planted pole on which he was working started earthward. It finally halted before it struck the ground which was a fortunate thing for Ray as he was on the side of the pole that was due to come in contact with the ground.

He said that many of the poles are not planted as firmly as usual due to the soft earth and mud resulting from the rain which is tamped around them. Linemen state that it is almost impossible to erect poles in some areas, as water rushes into the holes as soon as they are dug and if the pole is not immediately available it is almost an impossibility to plant a pole properly.

Plant authorities stated last evening that power should be restored to the whole of the town within a week if equipment is available and barring any unforeseen circumstances.

Make Progress In Rebuilding Telephone Lines

Telephone linemen continued the gigantic task of rebuilding lines and restoring service over the weekend, with crews working in unseasonal damp rainy weather that has continued unchanged for the past twelve days.

Progress as of last night showed that 13 telephone lines had been extended east from Borden to a point two miles beyond Borden and long distance telephone lines had been rebuilt in an area extending out of Summerside for a distance of three miles.

Four additional crews were brought in from the mainland during the weekend, making a total of 13 telephone crews working here from outside the Province. Two more cable splicing crews also arrived on Saturday to assist those already working here.

Meanwhile, local lines are being rebuilt and services restored as quickly as possible in Summerside, and work is also proceeding on the line to the telephone range station at Egmont Bay, N. B.
