Hon. John Lefurgey's Will.

The will of the late Hon. John Lefurgey, of Summerside, was filed in the Probate office yesterday afternoon.

To his wife Dorothea, he bequeaths the dwelling house in Summerside in which he resided, with the appurtenances thereto belonging, including the household furniture, plate, linen, etc.

The rest of his real and personal estate is devised to Dorothea Lefurgey and William Lefurgey, as trustees, to sell and convert the same into money, and pay the annual income of \$60,000 to his three sons, William, Ephraim and Alfred.

To pay the interest on \$9,000 to his daughter, Mrs. George Mcweeney, of Montreal, for her own use.

To pay the interest on \$18,000 to his two daughters, Mrs. J. E. Wyatt and Miss Dorothea Lefurgey.

To pay the interest on \$30,000 to his wife for her life, and after her decease to pay that sum to such of her children or grandchildren as she shall direct.

The residue of the testator's estate is to be held by the trustees in trust for his children in the proportions and manner thereinbefore set out.

The following bequests are also made:— To his nephew, John Lefurgey Read, \$500.

To his nephew, John Lefurgey, son of William Lefurgey, \$300.

To his sister, Mary Munroe, \$300.

To his brother, Alexander Lefurgey, \$300.

He appoints Dorothea Lefurgey and William Lefurgey executors of his will. The trustees have power in their discretion to advance any part of the principal money to the children.

The will is dated December 4, 1884, and is drawn by James E. Wyatt, Solicitor, Summerside. It is witnessed by Mr. Wyatt and Mr. S. H. Clarke, his book-keeper.

Ottawa Correspondence.

On Monday Mr. McMullen introduced a bill to provide that Senators and members shall be entitled to mileage in attending sessions of parliament only from residences in Canada to the seat of Government.

Mr. Tupper introduced a bill to prevent passenger ships carrying dangerous explosives—a measure based on the English Act.

Mr. Davies called attention to the great importance of the bill promised by the Minister of Marine to amend the law respecting the safety of ships. He referred to the anxiety felt by shipping men on account of the English law regulating the load line which will shortly come into force, and he urged special and speedy attention to the matter upon the Minister of Marine.

In answer to a question, Mr. Tupper said that supplies for the vessels engaged in the Fishery Protection Service are purchased by private contract, with instructions to the officers to obtain them at the lowest market rates.

In answer to Mr. Welsh, Sir Hector Langevin said that the estimated cost of the works proposed at the mouth of the South-West River, New London, was \$1300. At Pinette there were two estimates—for a channel 200 feet wide, by 15 feet deep, cost, \$5,200; for a channel 200 feet wide, by 16 feet deep, cost, \$10,000; report dated 20th January, 1890.

Mr. Foster presented the following revised statement of tunnel estimate, by Sir Douglas Fox, May, 1891: For tunnel of 11 feet, internal diameter from shaft to shaft, 2897,500, equal to \$4,369,433; do, including land, tunnel and contingencies, \$1,075,200, equal to \$5,232,640.

On Tuesday the House went into Committee of Supply, in the course of which Mr. Davies said the Finance Department was entitled to the unique distinction of being the only one in the public service which, for a number of years back, had continuously decreased the cost of its civil

Over the vote for salary of Chief Engineer of Public Works, the Opposition made a difficulty, contending that it should not be passed until Mr. Perley had been acquitted of the grave charges preferred against him in connection with the Tarte-McGregory case.

On Wednesday, in reply to Mr. Perry, Sir Hector Langevin said that the condition of the West Point Wharf was reported upon in February, 1885, when it was found damaged to such an extent as to render it useless as a shelter or shipping place.

Mr. Jamison then moved "that in the opinion of this House, the time has arrived when it is expedient to prohibit the manufacture, importation and sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes."

After recess, Mr. Cameron, of Huron, moved the second reading of the bill respecting the Electoral Franchise, the object of which he had already stated to be to abolish the measure, lock, stock and barrel.

Mr. Cameron's speech in support of his measure; it is sufficient to say that he denounced the Franchise Act in all moods and tenses. The Act, he insisted, was unequalled for, was harsh, vicious in principle, and difficult to work out in detail.
