

SKIFF AND GAYLORD'S MINSTRELS.—This celebrated Troupe of Artists, who have just closed a brilliant and highly successful engagement at Halifax, will give two of their pleasing and popular entertainments at the Temperance Hall on Friday and Saturday evenings, June 7 and 8. The Halifax press speaks of them as follows: "The performance of Skiff and Gaylord's Minstrels was all that could be desired, and well worthy the very liberal patronage they have received here. Master Willie Gaylord, the boneless boy, is one of the most daring and successful performers that has ever appeared in Halifax."

The new boat built for the St. John carmen to contest in the Paris Regatta, weighs, all complete, less than 175 lbs.; she is 34 feet long, 3 feet 9 inches beam; 13 inches deep, with a rise of 3 inches of rowlock. She draws, with the crew in her, 34 inches of water at the bow, and 4 inches at the stern.

THE WEATHER.—The weather during the month just closed has been very cold, and much grain will be sown very late in the season. This is very discouraging, seeing that flour has reached the unusually high price of from three pounds ten shillings to four pounds per barrel, and that very many are without the means of procuring it. The people of New Brunswick, and parts of Nova Scotia, are still more unfortunately situated than are the inhabitants of this island. The low lying interval lands of the neighbouring Provinces are, in many places, still under water, and will not, for some time to come, be in a state fit for cultivation. The lumber markets are depressed; little or no shipbuilding is being carried on, and money is very scarce. We must, therefore, expect hard times during the summer upon which we are now fast entering.—Isl.

Perhaps nothing indicates the state of the Island trade better than our spring importations. That a hard summer is before us it needs no figures to demonstrate. Our imports from Great Britain are fully 30 per cent less than they were 12 months ago, and merchants will find it difficult to dispose of even this comparatively small stock. Of breadstuffs, we imported in 1866 up to the 1st of June, 3534 barrels of flour, and 385 barrels of Cornmeal. This year, for the same period, our imports are 1922 barrels of flour and 1,150 barrels of Cornmeal. The high price of flour has checked the importation of the former article nearly one half, while it has increased that of the latter 300 per cent. The country wants fully as much breadstuffs as ever it did, but flour is so dear that the people must and will do without it, and buy a cheaper and coarser article of food in preference.—Pat.

BOMBARDMENT OF CITY OF MEXICO.—New Orleans, May 21.—The *Picayune's* special correspondence, dated Orizaba, May 8, says the City of Mexico is surrounded by 20,000 Liberals, and that the bombardment has commenced in earnest. The garrison numbered 8,000 men, under the command of Marquez, who had announced his intention to resist to the last. He had impressed all the water carriers and porters. None of the officers are to receive quarter from the Liberals. Indeed, orders had been issued that Miramon, Marquez and Maximilian were to be shot if captured. Since the surrender of Puebla the Imperialists have not had over 16,000 men in the field all told.

It is stated that the New Brunswick Government intend creating an Equity Judgeship.

British Columbia news via San Francisco, is to the effect that Governor Seymour has instructions to meet the reported desires of British Columbia to enter the Confederacy.

The *Cygnat*, which is owned by the Charlottetown Mechanics' Fishing Company, brought down 370 barrels of flour, a lot of brooms and buckets, together with a few boxes of hoop skirts, boots and shoes, for Messrs. J. W. Falconer & Co.—Pat.

An English Mail, was received at the General Post Office, Charlottetown, on Monday evening last, having reached Halifax by the *Cuba*, on the night of the 2nd instant.

A meeting of the members of the Charlottetown Cricket Club will be held at the City Hall, on Saturday evening next, at half-past 8 o'clock. All interested are particularly requested to attend.

We are glad to see that operations to finish the laying out and planting of Queen Square have been commenced. It is true that the ground which surrounds our Province Building should be improved. The Legislature have provided the funds, and we hope the work will be properly done. Mr. Murphy, of the gas works, and a few friends have, with little aid from the public Treasury, already made Hillsborough Square a credit and an ornament to the city.—[Pat.]

We trust however, that those employed upon the Square are not going to consume the whole summer in planting a few trees and sowing down grass seed. The Square in its present condition is simply a disgrace to the town, and promises to remain so unless more expedition is observed in the work upon it.

A melancholy railway accident occurred at Whitch (Canada) on the 24th inst., by which one man, three women, and a child, lost their lives. A collision of trains was the cause.

In a very able and eloquent speech at a recent public meeting in Halifax the Hon Mr Howe alluded in the following handsome terms, to the \$800,000 bail, and its prompt refusal by the people of this Island:— "And while on the subject of bribery, I cannot help reminding you of that magnificent bribe by which the delegates attempted to buy Prince Edward Island. I

the history of the British Colonies and of honorable legislation was there ever such a transaction as that? The people of the Island, with a unanimity which is charming to reflect on, rejected the bribe and would have nothing to do with it. We were told that we need not oppose Confederation for we would be dragged into it, but it has turned out that the little Colony of Prince Edward Island has not been coerced. Because her legislature and people were hostile, this attempt was made to buy up the whole people with a bribe of \$300,000. Hereafter, to the day of my death, I will cease to think of Prince Edward Island in reference to its size, for the mind is the standard of the man; and although the Island is small and sparsely populated, every one among her people can hold up his head in the presence of all the world as a true man. They rejected the wretched bribe, they maintained their integrity, and if ever it comes in my way to hold out the right hand of fellowship to that people, to show my sense of the respect I entertain for them, to my dying day, I will do it."

News by Telegraph.

London, 30th.—The unfortunate fate of Maximilian creates intense and painful feeling and anxiety throughout Europe. In the House of Commons to-night, Lord Stanley, in reply to request as to the safety of the Mexican Emperor, replied that the Government had received no official information on the subject.

London, May 30, evening.—Despatches received last night from the Continent indicate that fresh complications, the character of which is not definitely known, have arisen on the Schleswig question.

Dublin, May 30.—The trial of the Fenian prisoner Condon is now in progress before the Special Commission here.

New York, May 31st.—Gold 136 3/4.

London, May 31.—In the case of the United States vs. Prioleau, the appeal has been admitted by the Court.

London, May 31 (midnight).—In the House of Commons to-night, another discussion took place on the Reform Bill. An amendment was proposed by the Liberals, requiring that a borough shall have a population of not less than 10,000, in order that it be entitled to a member in the House of Commons. The division resulted in the victory for the Liberals, who carried their amendment by a majority of 127.

Berlin, May 31.—In Prussian Parliament to-day, the bill adopting the new constitution for North German Confederation, passed its second reading.

Cork, May 31.—The trial of Condon before the Special Commission has resulted in his acquittal.

New York, May 31.—Gold 36 1/2.

FROM CANADA.

Montreal, May 30.—The military authorities here have received information that field artillery will be sent to arm the forces in Canada.

The trade sales in this city are largely attended by western buyers; bidding is spirited, and fair prices are realized.

FROM THE STATES.

New York, June 1st.

The Herald's New Orleans special says the city of Mexico has certainly capitulated. General O'Haran was shot there for correspondence with the Liberals.

Maximilian and all of his officers above the rank of Lieutenants, are reported to have been shot at seven o'clock on the 10th inst. By officers who had arrived at Brownsville on the 27th May, from Queretaro, private letters received state that Juarez had ordered Escobedo to execute Maximilian and his Generals.

The official newspaper at San Louis, after narrating the particulars of the fall of Queretaro, state that the Secretary of War had forwarded orders to Escobedo on the 15th inst, to shoot Maximilian and his Generals. Gold 136 1-2.
