MONDAY

Mr. George M. Andrew, of New Glasgow, P.E.I., has been appointed Director of Physical Education for the Charlottetown Y.M.C.A. It was announced by the Y.M.C.A. Board over the weekend. Mr. Andrew is a recent graduate of the School of Physical Education, McGill University, and is well and favourably known in the city, and to hundreds of holiday visitors and tourists at Cavendish, where he has been employed for the past two summer seasons with the staff of the National Park.

Employees of the Maritime Electric Company in checking over various pieces of machinery in operation outside the main plant during Friday night, discovered the pump house door forced and on investigating found that certain vital machinery had been tampered with.

A strong protest over the replacing of manual labor with the new motor street sweeper was registered by the Labourers Protective Union members at a meeting held over the week-end.

The feeling of the meeting was that the men thrown out of jobs, mostly between the ages of 60 and 70, could not obtain work anywhere else and would now be forced to go on relief. Members also feel that the motor sweeper cannot do as good a job as was done by the men. A motion was passed authorizing the Union to send a strong letter of protest to the City Council.

Mr. C. H. B. Longworth, prominent Charlottetown citizen and influential leader in business circles until his retirement a number of years ago died suddenly at his home 181 Fitzroy Street late last night. He was a grandson of Hon. George Coles, one of the Fathers of Confederation.

For many years he was engaged in the lobster canning and shipping industry.

Mr. Longworth was a director of the Eastern Trust Company and held the office of vice-president of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce.

In addition to his business activities Mr. Longworth took an active interest in the affairs of church and municipality. He was a member of St. Paul's Church and former Chairman of the Charlottetown Board of School Trustees.

Mr. Longworth is survived by his wife and two daughters. The daughters are Miss Nora Longworth and Eileen, Mrs. George Buntain, both of Charlottetown.

TUESDAY

Mr. Benjamin Rogers, son of Mr. E. H. Rogers, Charlottetown, has been appointed a member of the new liaison division of Canada's External Affairs Department. The announcement from Ottawa yesterday said the division was established "to concentrate entirely on relations with the United States and the rest of the Western Hemisphere."

The tablet unveiled by His Excellency Governor-General Vincent Massey, on his recent visit to Charlottetown, was recently placed on the eastern pillar of the front of the Province Building by the Historic Sites and Monuments Board of Canada. It commemorates the entry of Prince Edward Island into Confederation, as a Province of Canada, on 1st July, 1873.

Friends and former shipmates of Lieutenant Commander Ken Birtwistle will be pleased to know that he has successfully passed his examinations at the Royal Naval College, Greenwich, Eng., where he has been studying for the past six months. He was accompanied to the Old Country by his wife and child and expects to return to Canada shortly to reside in Halifax. Officers elected for the development of the proposed project are president, Dr. M. L. Bonnell; vice-president, E. K. Johnston; secretary-treasurer, George Ferguson.

Mentioning the new course being prepared for Grade XI in this Province, Premier J. Walter Jones at the Souris Exhibition yesterday said a change in the school curriculum would be designed to promote, in the growing generation, agricultural ideas which would tend to keep them in Prince Edward Island.

The big Eastern King's show was attended by His Honor Lieutenant Governor T. W. L. Prowse who opened the show. He was introduced by Hon. J. Brenton St. John, M.L.A., and complimented the president, H. J. MacKinnon, and other members of the show executive, on the excellent program prepared.

There were over 1,000 people attending yesterday as the show came to its conclusion. The classes were all well filled and the judges expressed their pleasure at the quality of the exhibits.

The seventeen employees of American Can Company's Charlottetown factory were told yesterday by Mr. P. G. Rigby that the plant will cease operations permanently on or about December 1, 1952.

Mr. Robert S. West, Newton Cross, last night was elected president of the Fourth District Queens Progressive Conservative Association at the annual meeting held in Eldon Hall.

Also named to office was vice president J. F. MacDonald, Eldon, and secretary-treasurer Sinclair MacTavish, Newton Cross, who was re-elected. The district convenors are Messrs. John MacIsaac-Cherry Valley, and Alex MacPherson, Bellevue.

Mr. Howard F. MacEachern, formerly of St. Catharines, P.E.I., but now residing with his father John F. MacEachern, Parkdale, has been awarded the Royal Humane Society Certificate for an act of heroism performed at Haney, B.C., last October, where he was employed by the British Columbia Telephone Co.

The presentation of the award will be made at Government House by Lieutenant Governor T. W. L. Prowse at 11 a.m. on Thursday.

Approximately 90 miles of highways in this Province have been standardized by widening, sub-grading and preparing for graveling, Hon. Douglas MacKinnon, Minister of Public Works and Highways, said yesterday.

Some of the graveling has already been done, he stated, and the work has been fairly divided between the three counties with about 30 miles of roads having been done in each. This work is separate from that being done on Island roads in connection with the Trans-Canada Highway.

The marketing of beans at the Aylmer plant in Middleton, N.S., is an increasing industry throughout the Southern King's area as many farmers are now planting several acres specifically destined to this market. The price paid the farmer is four cents per pound or \$80.00 per ton, which is said to yield a fair profit on the acreage production.

Green bean is the primary product cultivated, but there is also a relatively large portion of wax beans marketed. It would seem however, that the green bean is the more popular among farmers as approximately eight out of ten tons at the transportation station are of the green variety.

Mr. D. O. Stewart, Q.C., returned home in Summerside on Monday evening after a business trip to the Pacific Coast where he was the sole representative of Prince Edward Island at the conference of commissioners on uniform legislation for Canada, which was held at Victoria, Vancouver Island during the week of August 25th. The purpose of this conference was to draft uniform legislation for adoption by the various provinces.

Plans to build a new community centre at Murray River were formulated at a special meeting held at the Murray River School last evening. The meeting was attended by a large number of interested residents of the community who discussed the plans at considerable length with excellent results forthcoming.

While polio continues to be the cause of anxiety in the Health and Welfare Department, it is encouraging to know that not a single death has occurred in the Province this year, as a result of the disease, according to a report released yesterday by Hon. A. W. Matheson, Minister of Health and Welfare.

A total of 40 cases have been discovered and treated since the first of January this year, with the highest number for any month developing in August while for the month of September up to the 10th, 16 cases have been reported.

Ottawa, Sept. 11—Although weight of the catch for the first seven months of the current year was a million pounds less than for the corresponding period of 1951, value of fish and crustaceans caught in Prince Edward Island waters from January to July 1952 was \$200,000 higher than the preceding year.

This comparison of catches and values was divulged today in the latest issue of fisheries statistics prepared by the Department of Trade and Commerce.

FRIDAY

A charge of arson against Wallace Palmer, Borden, was dismissed yesterday by Magistrate R. S. Hinton, Q.C., at the conclusion of a preliminary hearing that continued for five days during which a total of 32 witnesses were called.

The charge was laid as a result of a fire on April 14th at Borden Theatre, owned and operated by Mr. Palmer.

Magistrate Hinton, in reviewing the evidence, said all the circumstances did breathe suspicion, and that there had been no explanation of how or why the fire started.

He said while there was lots of circumstantial evidence, it would require more than that. He pointed out several important factors in the evidence which were in favour of the accused. He said there was no direct evidence so strong as to convince him the accused should be committed, and he therefore was obliged to dismiss the charge.

Mr. James MacEachern was taken to the P. E. Island Hospital by ambulance shortly after 7 a.m. yesterday suffering from facial, rib and leg injuries received when the car which he was driving went out of control and crashed into a tree.

The accident occurred on Elm Avenue near Passmore Street while the car was being driven northward. On swerving to the left side it collided with a tree. The steering gear and wheel, in addition to the whole front of the car, was badly damaged. The hospital advised at a late hour last night that the patient was not seriously injured.

That the City of Charlottetown should have an annual grant from the Provincial Government to assist in the work of street repairs was stated last night by Mr. E. Earle MacDonald, M.L.A., at the adjourned annual meeting of the Fifth District of Queen's Liberal Association held at the Legion Home.

The speaker stated that it was highly important to the farmers nearby to have year-round roads into the city. He said he, in his

legislative work, was only asking the Government for a proportional share of the Provincial revenue for this district.
