The most innocent looking cards

sometimes turn out to be worth their weight in gold. If you examine East's hand, and I hope you do not hold many like it, you wouldn't think that this mediocre array of pasteboards could contribute anything substantial enough to beat a four spade contract. But it did, as we'll presently see.

Maybe you don't approve of North's jump to three spades, but he had passed originally and South didn't want to go on to game if he didn't want to. South, naturally, did bid game, passed partner or not, having a sound opening bid plus a shade extra.

It looks as though four spades is a laydown, but South didn't make it, and couldn't make it. When you come up against the kind of defense he got, just take your medicine and let it go at that.

West opened the king of hearts

and East gave him the encouraging eight. The ace of hearts then drew the seven from East and the queen from declarer.

West now looked over the situation and decided there wasn't much chance of East coming up with a defective trick, considering South's voluntary game bid. It seemed likely declarer had about every high card that was missing.

So West concentrated instead on low cards East could have and finally pinned his hopes on the possibility East might have the five of spades among his souvenirs.

At trick three, therefore, instead of leading his jack of hearts which was high, West led a low heart. East, of course, ruffed with his only trump, and this knocked South right out of the box.

He overtrumped with the queen, but it was now impossible to prevent West from getting a trump trick. This, together with the ace of diamonds, produced the setting trick.

It took good defense by West to down the contract, but it would be idle to deny East's was the hand that struck the decisive blow.

Doctors Meet At Halifax In '58

EDMONTON (CP)—The 1958 annual meeting of the Canadian Medical Association will be held in Halifax June 16-20. It was announced Monday. The following year the Canadian doctors will meet at Edinburgh with the British Medical Association.

Dr. A. D. Kelly, the association's general secretary, announced following CMA business sessions that while next year's convention is slated for Halifax, the New Brunswick division will be in charge. There was no site in New Brunswick capable of handling the CMA.

Dr. Kelly said approximately 2,000 doctors and their wives are expected to travel to Edinburgh in 1959 for the joint CMA-BMA meeting. Members of the British group have met four times previously with the Canadian association, the last time in Toronto in 1955.

Voices Different Views On Communist Ideology

LONDON (AP)—Communist China's leader Mao Tse-tung, in a speech made public today, admitted "contradictions" exist in a Communist society—and thereby differed with Soviet ideologists who maintain such a thing is impossible.

Further, Mao declared that any attempt to deal with such contradictions by "corrective" measures would not only be ineffective but harmful.

"We cannot abolish religion by administrative orders, nor can we force people not to believe in it," he said. "We cannot compel people to give up idealism, no more than we can force them to believe in marxism. In settling matters of controversial issues among the people we can only use democratic methods, methods of discussion of criticism, and not coercive nor high-handed methods."

RUSSIAN CLAIM

Mao, who appears to have taken over as the ideological high priest of world communism since Stalin's death, denied the often voiced claim of Nikita Khrushchev, Soviet Communist party chief, that "contradictions" exist in a Communist society.

Mao's speech, broadcast by Peiping radio, was originally delivered Feb. 27 at the 11th session of Red China's supreme state conference.

Hitherto the 17,000-word text had been a Communist secret, with only a few passages having leaked out several months ago from Poland, where Mao's reasoning apparently was used to bolster the independent Communist regime in Poland (Gomulka).

The broadcast today from the Red Chinese capital said Mao had gone over the verbatim text and made certain additions.

CAUSED DOUBTS

Mao conceded the Hungarian

uprising last autumn caused stirrings even inside Communist China, with some people hoping for a two-party system on the Western model.

Mao declared: "Certain people in our country were delighted when the Hungarian events took place. They hoped that something similar would happen in China, that thousands upon thousands of people would demonstrate in the streets against the people's government."

But this "ran counter to the interests of the masses."

For the first time, Mao made it clear that the Hungarian uprising had brought doubts to some Chinese circles. It was impossible to determine how widespread these doubts were.

Newsprint Made Of Kraft Pulp

CAMPBELL RIVER, B.C. (CP)—A paper mill in this Vancouver Island centre is the first to use bleached kraft pulp in newsprint production in the Pacific northwest.

The new Elk Falls mill of Crown Zellerbach Canada Limited, costing 1,900,000, has started production using bleached kraft pulp to provide the essential long-fibre content of newsprint. The most common source is sulphite pulp.

"The bleach plant provides the first Canadian outlet for kraft pulp from the Elk Falls kraft mill which began producing last August," said Peter T. Sinclair, president of Crown Zellerbach.

Until now all Elk Falls kraft pulp had been sold to the Crown Zellerbach paper mill in Antioch, Calif.

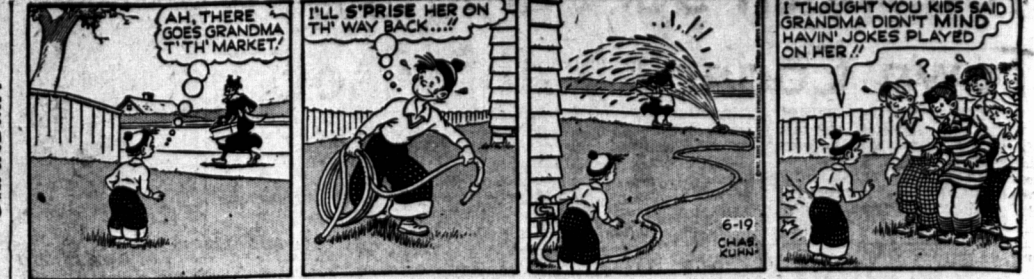
