THE STORM.

Schooner Ashore at South Lake.

Lobster Factory Destroyed.

Other Damage Reported.

SOUSIS, Dec. 4.

A three-masted topsail schooner went ashore yesterday at South Lake, supposed to belong to Bay Roberts, Nfld., and bound to Sousis for produce. None of the crew had landed at latest accounts yesterday.

The steamer Coila arrived safely last evening after a rough night. Matthew & McLean's lobster factory at North Lake is completely destroyed, together with nine fish houses, several boats and dories, nets, lines, salt and fish belonging to fishermen. The total loss to fishermen alone will not be less than a thousand dollars.

Considerable damage is also reported from Campbell's Cove. No such tide was ever witnessed by the oldest inhabitant.

In Favor of Parnell.

MONTREAL, Dec. 3.

Although undecided at first, the leading Irishmen of Montreal are now fully determined to stick to Parnell. The True Witness is out to-day in favor of his remaining at the head of the party. The proprietor of the paper has forwarded the following to Westminster:

MONTREAL, Dec. 3.

CHARLES STEWART PARNELL, LONDON:—The Irish people of Montreal and the Dominion are with you. Hold firm.

C. J. Dogherly, Q. C., in reply to a query from a London paper, wired the following: Parnell should not retire. Ireland needs and trusts Parnell. She can do without and cannot trust Gladstone.

These statements are so general amongst the Irish population that O'Brien and Dillon will not be looked at here.

LONDON, Dec. 3.

At a meeting of Irish members of the House of Commons to-day Clancy proposed the temporary retirement of Parnell, subject to certain conditions being exacted from Gladstone in connection with his proposed Home Rule scheme. The meeting adjourned until to-morrow.

Personal.

OTTAWA, Dec. 3.

Col. Herbert, Commander of the Militia, arrived to-day.

HALIFAX, Dec. 3.

Rev. Mgr. Hawley, Prefect Apostolic of Newfoundland, is in town. He advocates a division of that province into east and west—the latter to become a part of the Dominion—as the only possible solution of the French shore question. He says: "A petition to that end unanimously signed by the inhabitants of the west, will be presented to Lord Knutsford."

The Cold Wave.

QUEBEC, Dec. 3.

The cold wave is the severest on record for this early stage of the season. In exposed situations the mercury fell to 23 below. The Lunenburg Basin and the River St. Charles have frozen solid, and heavy ice is forming along the shores of the St. Lawrence.

FREDERICTON, Dec. 3.

Last night was the coldest of the season, the thermometer registered twelve below.

Heavy Failure in the States.

PASSAYE, N. J., Dec. 3.

The Rutter House Manufacturing Co., operating extensive woolen mills here, has failed, with liabilities of about \$800,000 and assets \$20,000 less. The failure was caused by the embarrassment of other houses and the low prices prevailing in the wool market.

The Land Purchase Bill.

LONDON, Dec. 3.

In the House of Commons to-day the Irish land purchase bill passed its second reading, 269 to 133. Parnell and his followers voted with the government.

Relieving Distress.

LONDON, Dec. 3.

Balfour, Chief Secretary for Ireland, has ordered a man-of-war to convey ten tons of meal for the purpose of relieving distress among the inhabitants of Clare Islands, Inanesturk, arising from the failure of the potato crop.

The McKinley Bill Again.

TORONTO, Dec. 3.

A Washington despatch says that several bills have been introduced in Congress to repeal or modify the McKinley Bill, but it is not likely there will be any legislation at this session.

A Forger Sentenced.

NEW YORK, Dec. 3.

Albert H. Smith, of the bank and firm of Mills, Robinson & Smith, was to-day sentenced to 17 years in the State Prison, for forgery in the first degree.

The Halifax Forgery Case.

HALIFAX, Dec. 3.

J. P. Chetwynd was committed for trial in the Supreme Court to-day by the Police Magistrate for the charge of forgery and invoice falsification. He was then served with a similar process in eighteen other cases.

An Islander's Sad Death.

DANIEL STEWART FALLS OFF A TRESTLE AND MEETS HIS DEATH IN THE BAY.

(Seattle Telegraph, Nov. 22.)

Daniel Stewart, a laborer employed on the trestle work being built along the water front by the San Francisco Bridge Company, met his death yesterday about three o'clock by drowning. Mr. Stewart was working on the trestle near the Rainier Mill Company's property, on the North Seattle beach. The foreman had left him a few minutes before the accident to go further up the trestle, telling Stewart to come along in a few minutes. As the man did not come, the foreman had started back to where Stewart had been working, when he was attracted by a number of people who were on the trestle calling for help.

The people were attracted to the spot by cries for help, and when they got there found a man in the water apparently dead. Pike-poles were secured, and by their means the man was raised out of the water by hooking into the man's clothing.

When brought to the shore it was found that the man had been drowned, but there was a large bruise on his forehead. It was the general opinion that Stewart had slipped on the trestle, and in falling into the water, which was only six or seven feet deep, had struck his head and was thus rendered unconscious and unable to save himself from drowning. No one saw the man fall, but his cry for help was answered promptly, but the blow evidently hastened his death.

The body was taken to the undertaking rooms of Cross & Co., where it will be temporarily embalmed, awaiting advice from relatives in Prince Edward Island, Canada. Mr. Cross at once telegraphed to the brother of the deceased, Bruce Stewart, who resides in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, and his father, who lives a short distance from that city, and an answer is expected this forenoon.

The only relative of the dead man in this city is a cousin, W. J. Stanley, who viewed the remains last night. Mr. Stewart was a single man, aged 23, and was a steady man and well-liked.
