

BROWN ACCUSED OF PLOTTING HIS MOTHER'S DEATH, EXPLAINS

The Collingwood Insurance Story Takes on Another Aspect far Different From the Previous One Published—An Extraordinary Tale.

COLLINGWOOD, Oct. 2.—W.H. Brown was arrested yesterday on the charge of conspiracy against his mother. He subsequently made the following statement: "Four years ago Rose asked me to take some insurance. I told him I had all I could carry. We got talking about the rest of the family, and I told him if it was agreeable I would pay for an insurance policy on my mother's life. He went to see her and it was arranged. I asked her if she had any objections, and she said she hadn't. The policy was a twenty year paid up life, and I paid three years on it, \$93 a year. Then my mother sent me a lawyer's letter saying if I did not support her she would have the insurance transferred. I asked my wife about it, and she advised me to drop it, and I did.

"Last August Rose came to me at the water works, and after chatting a while he asked me how my mother was. I told him I had not seen her in fifteen

months. He asked me if I was keeping up her policy, and I said it had not run out yet. "Oh," he said, "why don't you give her a slug." "I thought it was a joke, and said, "you can do that." "Another time he came and asked how much I would take for it. I said a thousand dollars. He said he would see. After that he came and wanted me to lend him \$10, saying he had not any money for expenses. I said I hadn't it with me, but would send it to him by mail, thinking he needed some to get through the sale of the policy I thought he was working on. I sent him \$10 and don't know whether he got it or not. I never asked him. Some time after he asked for another \$10, and I borrowed that for him from Mr. Hilburn. On Wednesday of the first week of the exhibition he came to me and said my mother was going to Toronto on Tuesday and he wanted me to go to the station and see her off. I told him I could not because I had to work. I don't know whether she went or not. Last Thursday he came to me and said he had a lawyer's letter from a man he was dealing with in Toronto, who stated if he did not get some more money, he would put it in his lawyer's hands. I told him he would get no more money from me, and he went away."

The prisoner denied having made any agreement to support his mother in consideration of policy. Rose did not, it is said, make voluntary statement to the Toronto authorities, but it was thought his talkativeness here that the affair leaked out, and was brought to the attention of the authorities. It appears that Rose told the plot to a lawyer named Bond, who regarded the whole thing as so preposterous, he thought it was a joke or that Rose was crazy. But, Bond's client, who had introduced Rose, came next. Bond had been talking to him. He and Bond thought that whether it was a joke or not, in the public interest the matter should be laid before the magistrate. They submitted the facts to Magistrate John Nettleton, and Chief of Police Maiden investigated the matter and concluded there was nothing in it. Bond's client, who is a shareholder in the Continental Life Insurance Company, wrote to the Toronto manager and it was by him that Rose was called on to explain.

In an interview the prisoner's mother stated positively that when the insurance on her life was taken out her son agreed to support her, and had not given her one dollar. She said her second husband, prisoner's stepfather, had died four years ago. He was working for his stepson at the time. She found out afterwards that prisoner had insured his stepfather's life for \$2,000. When she spoke to him about it he had promised to give her \$200 when he got it, but he had not given her anything. About her Toronto trip, she said Rose had given her \$2.50 to pay her fare. He met her at the Union station, Toronto, and took her to his niece, he said. He took her up a narrow stair to her room without introducing her to any one, and after tea, she saw nothing of him. Next morning she went to visit a friend, Mrs. Levy, on Edward Street, and after a week returned home without seeing Rose.

Brown's wife denies any knowledge of the affair, and testifies to his good qualities.
