MR. FOSTER ON THE BUDGET Gives the Government a "Going-Over"

POINTS OUT THEIR INCONSISTENT STATEMENTS

And Shows How They Have Broken Their Promises.

OTTAWA, May 5.—Mr. Foster spoke two and a half hours in criticism of Fielding's budget.

It was a good natured but still a severe criticism, and Foster's happy way of arranging facts and evidence gave great pleasure to his party, which cheered him loud and long when he closed.

He congratulated Mr. Fielding on the favor of his followers who now joined as heartily in commending increased debt, increased taxation and increased expenditure as they formerly joined in the demand for a reduction of all three.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier had promised a five million decrease in the expenditure, and had given instead a five million increase, and still they were happy.

Fielding had claimed that the expenditure per head of the population was last year only \$7.40—or 20 cents less than in 1896, but Foster pointed out that by Fielding's own estimate the expenditure for the fiscal year, now within a few weeks of its close would be over \$8 per head, or counting in capital expenditure, over \$9 per head.

The Government boasted of a surplus, but as a matter of fact the Conservative party had many surpluses, and the Liberals were very few.

Since confederation Conservative Government had returned surpluses amounting to \$39,000,000 and deficits amounting to \$16,000,000, while the Liberal party were responsible for deficits far exceeding their own surpluses.

Mr. Foster gave his explanation for the expansion of trade, which, he said, was due to good crops, good prices, and the increase of mining operations.

The policy of the present Government had nothing to do with this except that the notion of a protective policy was of great value to home industry.

Increased exports were chiefly in home produced materials and agricultural products, not one of which owed anything to the trade policy of the Government.

Mr. Foster, in closing, charged that the Government had succeeded in three years performing as near as possible the exact opposite of the service which the Ministers and party had contributed to perform.

They promised to reduce expenditure and debt, and had increased them. They were to destroy the national policy and had given it more life.

They were to raise the tone of public life and had brought it lower than it ever was before. They were to introduce an era of public purity and had been continually offering bribes not only to electors but to whole constituencies and to members of this House, who sat with promises of office in their pockets and did the bidding of their purchasers.

Sir Richard Cartwright, following, endeavored to justify the increased expenditure. As to the tariff he said it was not perfect but was better than the old one.

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

THURSDAY May 4.

At the afternoon session, Hon. Mr. McLean introduced a bill entitled "An Act to Authorize Souris East School District, Number 141, to borrow money for an extended term of years," which was set down for second reading tomorrow.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Farquharson the bill regarding the registration of deeds and instruments relating to the title to lands was read a third time and passed.

The act amending the Act relating to life insurance was also read a third time and passed.

On motion of Hon. H. C. Macdonald an act relating to the appointment of Stipendiary Magistrates was received and ordered to be read a second time tomorrow.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Farquharson a petition was read from Hon. Benj. Davies relating to the carriage of mails, passengers and freight from the continent to this island by the way of Cape Tormentine and Cape Traverse. Mr. Davies' proposition is that the new ice boat shall be so constructed as to be able to take a train of railway carriages on her deck and carry the same across the straits a harbor on the island shore opposite to the harbor recently constructed at Cape Tormentine, a distance of about eight miles. In order to carry the proposal into effect a harbor would have to be constructed at this side and wide gauge established on the island railway. The petition was ordered to lie on the table.

ONE OF THE DELEGATIONS.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson presented his report as delegate to Ottawa regarding the fishery rights of the province. The report reads as follows:—

Premier's Office, Charlottetown, February 2d, 1899.

To His Honor the Lieutenant Governor and Council, Charlottetown.

GENTLEMEN,—Having been appointed by Your Honor in Council on the 28th of December last to proceed to Ottawa, in conjunction with Premier Murray of Nova Scotia and Premier Emmerson of New Brunswick, to confer with Sir Louis Davies as to our rights as a Province in view of the recent decision of the Privy Council on the Fishery Award, I have the honor to report as follows:

THE FISHERIES QUESTION.

On the afternoon of January 2d, the delegates met Sir Louis at his office in the Parliament Buildings, Ottawa. After discussing the question for some time, we adjourned to meet again in the evening at the Minister's Private Office, where we considered for over two hours the many phases of this important subject.

Sir Louis evinced a deep interest in the proceedings, and although well satisfied with the decision of the Privy Council in the main, yet he regarded it as obscure and intricate on many significant points.

That the fisheries of the tidal waters of these Lower Provinces, including the bay and rivers, are the property of the several Provinces, was considered beyond doubt. And whilst the Federal Government have a legislative right and jurisdiction over these waters, the different provinces were the proprietors and owners, and were entitled to all the revenues and moneys arising from the use of these waters. It was also conceded that all licenses to fish must issue from the Local governments, and that all fish warden must be their appointees and consequently under their control.

The right of a province to grant lease licenses to fish in waters which are the property of the provinces is followed by the corresponding right to impose a fish tax. This, however, as laid down by the Privy Council, does not prevent the Dominion Parliament from imposing a tax also. The opinion is given by the Court that a double tax such as I have just mentioned would prove injurious to the fisheries, and to both Provincial and Dominion interests,—"if these taxing powers were exercised independently and without any preconcert or agreement between the two Governments."

The delegates pressed upon the Minister the fact that the Dominion Government should not levy a fisheries tax,—that their sources for otherwise taxing were unlimited, whilst the Provinces were almost entirely confined to direct taxation.

The right of the Dominion Parliament to regulate and control by restricting the time and manner of fishing is freely admitted. Whilst we acknowledged this, we at the same time pressed the point that our interests as provinces in protecting our fisheries were greater than could possibly be claimed by the Dominion, and therefore the Dominion Government should consent the Local administering their portion of the law as laid down by the Privy Council.

The "British North America Act" casts upon the Dominion the duty of protecting the Fisheries. The decision of the Privy Council on these duties is so far as regulating and restricting is concerned. The following quotation is taken from their Lordships' judgment:
