B. C. Lashed By Gale, Snow

VANCOUVER, (CP)—An arctic-born storm lashed British Columbia with gale-force winds and driving snow Friday and the weathermen held little hope of higher temperatures during the week-end.

Along the coast, blanketed under an inch of snow, winds broke up a \$1,000,000 log boom, sank three small vessels and sent other ships scurrying for shelter while the temperature dropped to the lowest point in three years.

Inland, drifting snow blocked a number of highways and isolated two small communities. Power and communication lines were disrupted. The storm also brought blizzard conditions and below-zero temperatures to many sections of the Pacific northwest United States.
