

ST. MARY'S PARISH.—The Right Rev. Dr. Walsh, Coadju- tor Bishop of the Roman Catholic Church in Nova Scotia, accompanied by the Very Rev. John Loughnan, Vicar General of this Diocese, (and the Rev. Mr. Fréchette), arrived in town on Tuesday week, from Antigonish, where they had been on a visit to the Right Rev. Dr. Fraser, Lord Bishop of Halifax. Tuesday being All-Saints' Day, His Lordship officiated in St. Mary's Church, and after a very eloquent address, explanatory of the observances of the day, &c., he invited the Wardens and Electors of the Parish to meet him at his lodgings, at the City Hotel, on the Friday evening following, when, we understand, his Lordship treated them to an excellent supper. We are happy to learn, that the difficulties in temporal matters, which have for some time past unhappily existed in the Church, are likely to be arranged to the satisfaction of all parties, by His Lordship's assuming its temporal management. We also learn, that the Rev. Messrs. O'Brien and Fréchette, and Mr. Nugent, are continued as Professors in that flourishing and highly useful establishment. On Sunday last, the Right Rev. Gentleman delivered an excellent address to the Parishioners, explanatory of the object of his appointment, and spoke in the highest terms of the learning and piety of the Right Rev. Dr. Fraser, and of his efficiency as the head of the Church in Nova Scotia. —Recorder, Nov. 12.

NEW SCIENTIFIC INVENTION.—We were highly edified yesterday in witnessing some experiments with a new and handsome Air Pump, constructed by Mr. James Williamson, brass founder, of this City. We happened to call in when the Rev. Professor Mackintosh, of Dalhousie College, was present; and have to thank the Rev. Professor, who is the inventor of this excellent improvement in scientific apparatus, for the trouble he took in illustrating its power. The advantages this pump has over the old one, are the simplicity of its construction, its strength as a piece of mechanism, the ease with which it is worked, and its quickness in producing a vacuum. A receiver being corked tight at the top with a piece of oak, sealed round its edges, and being concave on the top, into this hollow some quicksilver was poured, and one movement of the pump handle was sufficient to draw the fluid through the close pores of the oak, and make it fall like a shower of rain to the bottom of the receiver. A bottle, the sides of which were an eighth of an inch in thickness, was corked tight, placed under the receiver, and on the air being exhausted, the force of the air inside the bottle easily burst it. We never saw glass of that thickness broken by any similar experiment. We look upon this as a very valuable invention—one that will not only afford the learned Professor great facility in illustrating his experiments in Natural Philosophy, but will also be a permanent acquisition to the scientific world.—Halifax Post, Nov. 8.

A NOBLE EXAMPLE.—If there be one object more worthy than another of the exertions and generosity of the Philanthropist and the Christian, it is the spread of Education among the rising generation. To this end, in all civilized countries, men whose names have gone down to posterity revered and blessed, have contributed their influence and their fortunes; and it is to this exalted liberality that the United States owe many of their splendid Temples of Education. Appeals to the Legislature, in this behalf, have been rather common in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick; but we have too high an opinion of both of these colonies to suppose that their gradual advancement, and the multiplication of wealthy men, will not be characterized by a liberality in the cause of education fully equal, if not superior, to that which has distinguished more prosperous states and older countries. As the pioneer among Colonial Founders of Educational Institutions, we have much pride in noticing the name of Joseph Allison, Esq., of Sackville, who has erected and endowed an Academy on the boundary line of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. The Editor of the St. John Mediator recently paid a visit to this institution, and describes its architectural appearance as highly classical, and extols the "princely liberality" of Mr. Allison, in expending some eight or ten thousand pounds for the cultivation of the Provincial intellect—the refinement of those ennobling faculties which render man superior to all the other tribes of the animal creation. Mr. Allison certainly merits the credit of being a benefactor of the rising generation; and we trust that his example will not be long lost on other wealthy men of the Colonies—through whose instrumentality many a gem of intellect may be rescued from oblivion.—lb.

PICTOU, N. S., Nov. 8.—The past fortnight has been remarkably stormy, with every appearance of a set winter. On Thursday it blew a hurricane, and the tide rose to a greater height than we remember to have seen it, sweeping away large quantities of timber along the river, and doing considerable damage in the cellars in Water-Street.

CANADA.

Mr. Aylwin, Solicitor General for Canada East, has been returned without opposition, as Member for Portneuf.

Mr. Small, Solicitor General for Canada West, has been returned by a large majority over Captain McAulay.

Mr. Baldwin, it is said, will be returned for some constituency in Lower Canada. Several members have already offered to resign in his favour.

Mr. Parent, the newly appointed Clerk of the Executive Council, and late Editor of the "Canadien," has taken leave of his constituents, of the County of Saguenay: in doing which he points out the incompatibility of the two offices, Member of the Legislature, and Clerk of the Executive Council.

The Steamer Unicorn has discontinued her trips for the season between Pictou and Quebec.

QUEBEC, Oct. 31.—A beautiful little steamer, called the Pocahontas, arrived here yesterday, in 8 days from Pictou. We learn that she has been bought by Wm. Stevenson, Esq., of this city, and that this gentleman intends, should he receive sufficient encouragement, to employ her between this port and the lower parishes.

KINGSTON MARKET.—Our market is well supplied with all kinds of agricultural produce. Fine Flour commands about 11s. 6d. per cwt. Oats, 10d. to 1s. per bushel. Potatoes, 1s. to 1s. 3d. per bushel. Beef, 15s. per cwt. Mutton, 24d. per lb. Butter, 7d. to 9d. per lb. Apples, 6s. 3d. per barrel. Many of our farmers complain that these prices are too low, and we have no doubt there is some truth in their complaints; but it appears to us they never think of the low price of all kinds of merchandise. For instance, if a farmer goes into a Dry Goods Store in this Town, he finds that any article which he calls for is full 30 per cent. lower than it was five or six years ago. This fact should be taken into consideration. Many think that if a protecting duty were placed on American produce, it would have the effect of raising our market prices—they urge this measure, too, on the grounds of reciprocity—now, for the information of these parties, we will quote the prices of two or three articles of produce, as they at present exist along the American border, immediately opposite this part of the Province. The Watertown Register says that Potatoes are selling in that Town at 6 cents per bushel (3d.). The Rochester Democrat says—"We were offered good beef a day or two since, for 1 1/2 and 2 cents per lb."—and Flour is selling at the latter place at 17s. 6d. per bbl.—all this, too, in a Country where imported wheat is taxed 1s. 3d. per bushel.—Chronicle.

We beg to call the attention of our readers to an article on our fourth page, prepared by the Board of Trade of Montreal, on the preparation of Provisions for the British market, for the original copy of which we are indebted to the Chamber of Commerce at Halifax, N.S. This is a very valuable document, and should be found in the hands of every farmer in the Colony who has the prosperity of the Island at heart, and who really desires to ameliorate his condition, and to promote his personal and pecuniary interests. The Tariff lately passed by the Imperial Parliament has opened up a new branch of Trade between the Mother Country and her trans-atlantic Colonies, which we hope will, ere long, be largely participated in by Prince Edward Island.

It is to be lamented, that in a country possessed of such great agricultural capabilities as this Island is acknowledged on all hands to be favoured with by a bountiful Providence, many persons should have so long neglected their main interests—arising from the cultivation of the soil—for the prosecution of a business at all times precarious, and of late years extremely disastrous to almost every one who has engaged in it—we mean the shipbuilding and lumbering business. We have reason, however, to believe, that our population are rapidly improving in the science of Agriculture; party politics engage much less of the public attention than formerly; large tracts of fertile land are annually reclaimed from the forest; new and flourishing settlements are springing up in all directions; and we rejoice in the prospect now afforded of a new and profitable outlet for our surplus produce. It must, however, be borne in mind, that if we would enjoy a share of the benefits likely to accrue to the Colonies from the operation of the new Tariff, above alluded to, great care must be bestowed on the culture and preparation of the articles intended for export, to the English market especially; but we can see no solid reason why, with proper attention to these important objects, we may not make a profitable business of it as well as our neighbours.

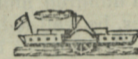
On Sunday last, by the Rev. Dr. Jenkins, Mr. Thomas Dodd, to Jane, second daughter of Mr. William Gardner.
