

The Thistle on the Dock.

The Thistle was docked at Erie, N. Y., on the 21st. Hyslop Mobarer, of the New York yacht club, made outboard and in-board measurements of the Thistle. Her waterline, stem, bowsprit, mainboom, gaff, mainmast and topmast were measured. Her bottom resembles the Volunteer, with the exception of rounding the side. In the Thistle this does not extend so low or so far aft as in the big white sloop. She is not a typical cutter. Although dirty, she is not so foul as was thought. When the entire keel was revealed it was seen that there was not a straight line in her hull. Her bow is made a sharp angle to midship section. From there to the stern post that was also a slight curve in the bottom keel. The principal shoulders of the yacht are amidships, or nearly so. In that place the model Joe Elsworth said after looking carefully over the vessel, "There was not enough boat there to beat the Volunteer."

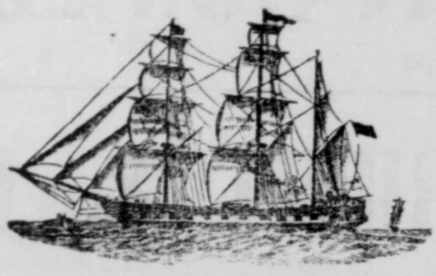
A Maine judge has declared Jamaica ginger an intoxicant. When a man has the colic down in Maine he must make a dead rush for New Hampshire or Massachusetts.

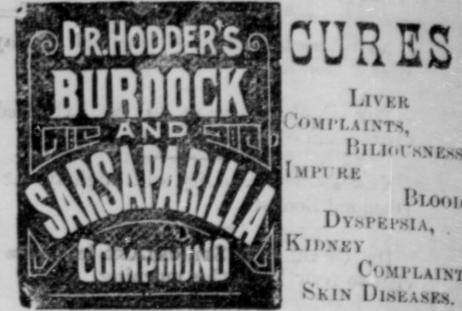
