

# 4 Inches Of Snow Is expected Here

The meteorologist at the Charlotte radio range reported last night that up until 8 o'clock the new snowfall had reached a depth of two inches, and another two inches was expected before the snow ends sometime this afternoon.

The temperature was ranging in the low 20s and was forecast to drop to the mid-teens during the night.

During the latter part of yesterday the winds were gusty to 40, and these were expected to diminish to light soon after daylight.

The light snow and blowing snow that was being experienced 9 o'clock last night were to continue throughout the night and with the coming of daylight, the blowing snow is forecast to end and the light snows to continue.

Transportation systems throughout the province were reported to have been able to maintain their services close to schedule. All aircraft flights were unaffected except for T.M.C.A.'s evening flight to Summerside and Montreal.

With the reports of increased wind and drifting, this flight was cancelled one hour early as to make certain that it could get to Montreal, before drifting could make landing hazardous.

The RCMP reported that all roads in the province provided heavy snowing, and in some areas, secondary and side roads were reported partially blocked.

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## Cold Storage Facilities To Be Built

The P.E.I. Industrial Corporation plans to begin immediate construction of public cold storage facilities in the Charlotte town area at a cost of several hundred thousand dollars, Industry and Natural Resources Minister Leo Rossiter said yesterday.

No decision as to a site for the proposed building was reached at a meeting of the corporation directors yesterday, Mr. Rossiter said. The corporation chairman said "we have several sites in mind and will be examining them in the near future."

The provincial government has been planning for some time to build new cold storage facilities to replace the outdated plant on Esler Street.

## New Polaris Has Success

CAPE CANVERAL, Fla. (AP)—The advanced A-3 model of the Polaris submarine missile scored its first success Thursday in seven test launches on a 1,800-mile strike down the Atlantic tracking range.

The flight was the first for the missile range project since the rapid safety officer failed in an attempt Dec. 2 to blow up the rockets above its soft off course. The second stage and nose cone of the runaway missile landed in the Atlantic Ocean 150 miles east of Savannah, Ga.

NEW YORK (CP)—Sugar futures prices continued to climb Thursday with word prices hitting new life-of-contract highs in several areas under pressure from reduced production and increased consumption.

World sugar futures prices closed one lower the night before Thursday, reflecting a continuing increase in prices as affected by Cuban setbacks and weather reducing the European beet output.
