weeks ago. "We're just waiting for the fog to lift," Mrs. Cameron said. "We've had enough of that. And this time we'll have lots of food on board."

All they had to eat during six days of hardship were three cans of corned beef, three cans of sardines and two boxes of soda biscuits, their provisions when the craft left Rose Blanche, Nfld., last Tuesday morning, to be in Sydney next day.

"Wednesday the fog closed in," Mrs. Cameron said. "We lay-to waiting for it to clear up but it didn't. Then Thursday the wind breezed up."

"The waves were terrific. We had to drift and were carried far out to sea. We had no log and didn't know where we were."

As days passed they learned from radio broadcasts that the search had started. Food and water ran out and there was no gasoline for the engine. They halted three passis; ships but couldn't stop them.

**Freighter Arrives**  
HAMBURG, Germany, Reuters—The United States freighter American Inventor docked here Monday with the first load of American gift food for East Germany. Two other ships are on the way to Hamburg to fulfil the U. S. offer of \$15,000,000 worth of food for East Germany.

ard Lindsey to Gaspe to buy a fuel pump for their truck after it broken down in the bush June 10, the day after they entered the bear-infested area.

Dr. Roussel testified that the deaths of the two youths were due to "external violence caused by firearms." He said there were no such evidence in Eugene Lindsey's case, but pointed out that parts of the chest and the skull were missing.

He expressed the belief that the deaths were murder because "they necessitated intervention of a fourth person." There were indications of bullet wounds in the remains of the youths, he said and these could not have been self-inflicted or caused by accident.

The hunters were identified jointly by Dr. Roussel, who determined their ages by x-rays of bones, and by the relatives, who identified tattered pieces of clothing.

Dr. Roussel said Richard Lindsey's white sweat shirt, green sport shirt and black and red plaid windbreaker showed round perforations on the breasts of the clothing, which could have been caused by bullets. There were no corresponding marks on the backs.

Cause of death was difficult to establish, but it is reasonable to conclude that Richard Lindsey was shot, Dr. Roussel added.

He said there were "several perforations" on clothing identified as Fred Clear's.

Clarence Clear, father of the dead hunter, and Clyde Sell, the elder Lindsey's brother-in-law, who represented Mrs. Lindsey, also testified.

Dr. Roussel said Richard Lindsey received post cards with a Gaspe postmark dated June 8. That was the last word from them.

Meanwhile, the search for more evidence in the bush continued, but is expected to end today.

return the captives at the rate of 300 a day, including sick and wounded.

The United Nations command informed the Reds the proposed rate of 300 daily was "unduly small."

The Chinese Red staff officer handling repatriation, Col. Wuane Chien then said the Communists "will come to complete repatriation at the earliest date" and promised a study of transportation facilities.

The UN command agreed to send back 69,000 North Koreans and about 5,000 Chinese at the rate of 2,400 able-bodied men and 360 sick and wounded daily.
