

Saints Score 55-49 Win Over Mount A In College Basketball Game Saturday

The Saint Dunstan's University basketball team piled up a 17-point lead in the first half to defeat Mount Allison University 55-49 here Saturday night in an N.B. Intercollegiate Basketball game.

The Saints led by playing coach Jack Reardon outscored the Mounties by 16 points in the second quarter but lost ten of those points in the last half as the visitors came back with a determined attack.

The game developed into a scoring battle between the Saints Reardon and the Mounties Laird "Mouse" McLennan. Reardon accounted for 27 of the Saints' points and McLennan for 24. McLennan scored his team's first ten points and Reardon the Saints' first eight.

The Saints led 15-14 at the end of the first quarter and 38-21 at the half. The score was 46-36 in favor of the Saints at the three-quarter mark. The Mounties gained four points during the last half to make the final score 55-49.

Play-maker Gus Dorais played a strong game for the winners. He scored 13 points, set up numerous plays and broke up countless others at his guard position. Guard Bob Mowrer and forward Bud Lawlor also turned in fine efforts for the local Collegians.

McLennan was the Mounties' big gun. A younger brother of Prince of Wales College "Sneakers" McLennan he showed plenty of drive and zip along with a fine hook shot to rack up 24 points.

Trafford scored seven timely points for the visitors in the last quarter and was runner-up with 11 points. Summerside's Bill Stewart, a first string forward, scored eight. Bain and McEwen alternated on guarding Reardon with Bain proving very effective.

Reardon was hot in the first quarter. He scored 13 of the Saints' first 15 points, most of them on long hook shots. He had seven points in the second quarter three in the third and four in the final ten minutes. McLennan had 10 points in the first quarter and eight in the third.

The Saints and Mounties will meet at Sackville Friday night in the return game of the home and home series.

Saturday's game was capably handled by Jack Ready and Harold Howatt. They handed out 16 fouls, 10 to the visitors and six to the Saints.

Islanders Within Game Of Glace Bay After 5-1 Victory Over Atlantics

HALIFAX, (CP) — Charlottetown Islanders climbed to within a game of third-place Glace Bay Miners by defeating Halifax Atlantics 5-1 Saturday night in a Maritime Major Hockey League game.

Atlantics' loss enabled second-place Sydney Millionaires, who defeated Glace Bay 2-0, to cut Halifax' hold on first place to two games.

Charlottetown spotted Halifax the first goal, and then barred the door. Islanders matched Halifax' goal in the first period, scored three goals in the second and added another in the third.

Both teams played close-checking hockey with Charlottetown using their extra men to wear Halifax down. Atlantics started with 11 players but lost forward Johnny Morrow in the closing minute of the first period when his weak ankle again gave out. Charlottetown dressed 13 men.

Orin Carver scored two goals for Charlottetown while Bob Gray, Spike Laliberte and Vince Palladino added the others. Bob Pepin scored the lone Halifax goal on a play with Bill Ford while Charlottetown was a man short.

Claude Robert of Charlottetown and Johnny Morrow tangled in the closing minutes of the first period and both were given minors. Morrow injured his ankle in the scuffle.

In the second period Palladino argued over a call by referee Bill O'Donoghue and was given a misconduct. There were nine penalties, six to Charlottetown.

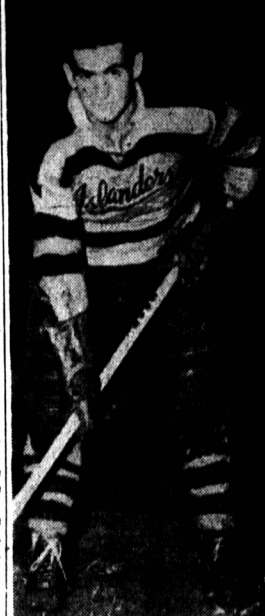
