

Four Tenders Called For CCG Vessels

OTTAWA (CP)—A call for tenders on four Canadian Coast Guard vessels including a new 630-ton icebreaker for service in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, Newfoundland waters and the eastern Arctic was announced by Transport Minister Pickers-gill.

The icebreaker, to be in service by 1968 will handle ice problems in the gulf, be equipped to service heavy navigation aids along the Newfoundland coast and make cargo deliveries to remote Arctic bases.

The other three smaller vessels will replace vessels now in service. These are the channel sounding vessel Frontenac in the St. Lawrence River district and the icebreaking lighthouse supply and buoy vessels Safe-guarder and Grenville now based at St. John's, Que., and Prescott, Ont.

Specifications for the icebreaker include a length of 295 feet, speed of 15 knots and engines capable of 10,300 horsepower. It will have a crew of 55 and its equipment will include two landing barges and a helicopter for reconnaissance.

No cost estimates were given in the announcement. Tenders must be in by June 30.

Newfoundland Mill Expansion Is Announced

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—An \$18,000,000 expansion at the Anglo-Newfoundland Development Company pulp and paper mill at Grand Falls has been announced by Premier Smallwood in the Newfoundland Legislature.

Basis for the expansion will be a large new paper machine described by Premier Smallwood as "the largest... and the most modern newsprint machine in the world."

He said engineering surveys have started and construction and installation will be planned so that the machine will come in production at about the same time as the Bay d'Espoir power development is completed.

The company stated earlier any further expansion would depend on the amount of power available. The Bay d'Espoir project, which comes into production in 1967, will eventually produce 500,000 horsepower. The new paper machine will produce over 400 tons a day, Mr. Smallwood said, and will replace some of the older machines. Total production of the mill will be raised to the 1,000-ton a day level.

Also planned is a new building so a second large machine can be installed. This will mean an additional wood cut of 50,000 to 100,000 cords a year and a second machine, would bring the daily production up to 1,500 tons a day.

Gignac Ordered To Stand Trial

MONTREAL (CP)—Robert Emilien Gignac, 38-year-old contractor, was committed to trial Friday on five charges of perjury arising from testimony he gave at the Dorion inquiry.

Judge Emile Trottier of Sessions Court, in a five-page judgment, ruled that the Crown had submitted sufficient proof to send Gignac to trial. No date was set for the trial.

The judge rejected a claim by Gignac's lawyer that the five charges constituted only one single offence.

Gignac also is being held without bail to await trial for capital murder in connection with the shooting last September of Arnie (Rocky) Brunette, a night club waiter.

Exporter Found Guilty On Eight Of Nine Counts

OTTAWA (CP)—David L. Maunder, who thought he had found a loophole in the law against unauthorized exports to Communist countries, has been convicted on eight of nine charges relating to exports or attempted exports to Cuba and Russia.

Magistrate L. A. Sherwood remanded the Ottawa exporter to March 22 for sentencing and agreed to a defence request that his \$15,000 bail be continued until that date.

Maximum sentence on each charge is a \$25,000 fine, five years in prison or both.

Maunder, 35-year-old former army officer, was charged last November on 12 counts, three of which were later withdrawn. All related to shipments made in late 1962 and 1963.

It was the first court test of the 1955 Import and Export Permits Act. Under it, federal permits are required to ship strategic goods or any American-made goods to Communist countries.

Of the convictions, three relate to shipments of electronics and electrical equipment to Cuba and five to attempted shipments of diesel and locomotive parts to Russia after export permits had been refused.

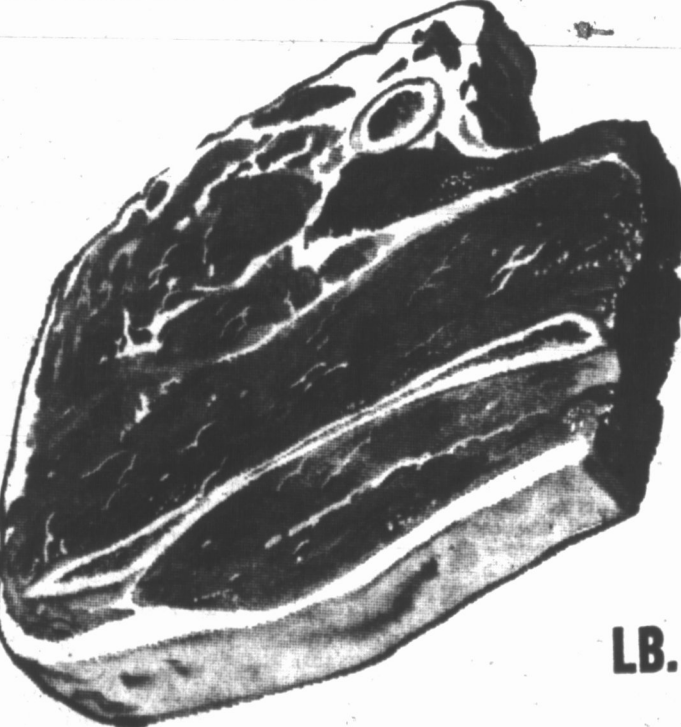
