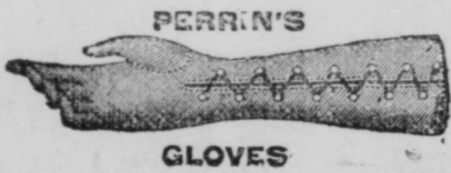

STEAMER WRECKED PASSENGERS LOST

Sad Fatality Near the Channel Islands.

A STEAMER LOST ON THE CASQUET ROCK.

Sixty Persons Said to have been Drowned.

SOUTHAMPTON, April 1.—The passenger steamer Stella, plying between this port and the Channel Islands, crashed upon the dreaded Casquet rocks, near the Island of Alderney, on Thursday afternoon in a dense fog and foundered in ten minutes.

Her boilers exploded with a tremendous report as she went down.

It is believed that sixty persons were drowned.

The coasting steamer Lynx, which brought the news of the disaster here picked up four boats and forty persons belonging to the Stella.

The second officer of the steamer, who was amongst those rescued, says that a collapsible boat was launched full of people, but he thinks she struck on the rocks owing to the fog.

Another steamer has picked up a boat containing 55 persons, including 10 women who escaped from the wrecked steamer.

The Stella had on board 210 passengers who were going to spend Easter in the Channel Islands.

LONDON, April 1.—The Cherbourg correspondent of the Daily Mail says that eight passengers of the Stella who were landed here were rescued from a boat that originally contained fourteen men. The boat capsized and six were drowned. The others clung to her keel for five hours and then managed to right the boat which was half full of water.

LETTER FROM FATHER BURKE

SIR,—I think all this coddling of the super-sensitive Premier over his F. G. A. huff is anything but dignified, and a very doubtful compliment to that important personage, whether taking the form of the absolutely untruthful correspondence of The Patriot, or coming from "A Silent Member" in THE EXAMINER. The whole thing is too silly to deserve passing notice, and should not draw a single word from me were such uncalled for comments not likely to deceive some friend of the Association, ignorant of the real facts.

Senator Ferguson was at Ottawa when we met, and could not certainly be blamed for the report of a committee named at the meeting and conscientiously discharging its duty; Secretary McCourt never opened his mouth during the several sessions, being completely occupied with his work; and so far as I am concerned every man present knows that there was not the remotest shadow of politics in my conduct, my influence having gone, as it happened, in every case adversely to the projects and candidates for office of my political friends—it is permitted so to speak. Many fellows, from behind pen names, may fling all the dirt they like and impure motives to their hearts' content. They are not the friends of the F. G. A. any more than they are the friends of truth. If they want to discuss the transactions of the Association, and are worth the powder, by signing their effusions they can, I make no doubt, be accommodated.

Now, as regards "an incident" unearthed by "Silent Member," I may say that I am personally concerned in the reference he makes, and do not purpose to be further misrepresented by him. The F. G. A. requires of its members an annual fee of one dollar. That fee and their regular enrolment give them a right to a voice and a vote in its proceedings. There is no other qualification and no exception made in favor of anybody. No such thing was ever thought of, even the Governor being always the first man to pay up. When Father Faquharson offered a few remarks, I called his attention, in a chaffing way, to the constitution; and instead of taking the matter sensibly and paying his dollar, he got mad, and for what I know, and I may add, for all I care, is dead yet. When I noticed this, I explained the ground I took and felt like holding to it, as I had an undoubted right to do.

At this stage a certain judicial gentleman volunteered a new interpretation of the qualification clause; and, as everybody knows that such legal opinions, whatever their value, under ordinary circumstances, are precisely worthless when professed gratis, I was constrained to answer to his "save and except the Premier" that there was no such exception; and if so, on what authority did he talk? There may be a difference of opinion as to whether or not this is the much-discussed and highly privileged "retort courtoise;" but when anybody exposes himself to such a stroke, who could resist the temptation of giving it? And among sane men, how should the interests of the association be involved therein?

As you know, sir, as know all our members, no effort has been spared by me to make the F. G. A. an element of lasting good for the community; and despite misrepresentation and the whims of the child, in conjunction with the good men and true who have planted its foundation deep and firmly, I am prepared to labor on at any sacrifice; but if to secure the continuance of its grant—a grant, dear only know, insignificant enough—one must humor and coddle these servants of the public for the moment occupying high places—men who with the exception of Mr. Wise, knew us not when we were struggling for existence as an Association, having still a soul I can call my own, I beg leave to say that I must register an emphatic protest against such debasement, a protest I feel sure every self-respecting member of the F. G. A. of P. E. I., cannot fail to share. Let us have peace by all means; but let us have "peace with honor."
