FROM BOSTON.—The steamer Worcester left Port Hawkesbury at four o'clock this morning, and is due here early this evening.

CROWDED OUT.—The programme of the Regatta to be held here on Wednesday forenoon, the 1st of October next, crowded out, will appear on Monday.

POLICE COURT.—This morning three men, for being drunk and incapable, were fined \$2 or 8 days each, and two drunk and disorderly were fined \$4 each.

THE COILA CHARTERED.—The steamer Coila has, we understand, been chartered to take the place of the wrecked steamer Princess Beatrice, and will go on the berth at Halifax in a few days.

THE MIRAMICHI.—The steamer Miramichi arrived here at half-past ten o'clock this forenoon with a cargo of general merchandise. She left on return via Pictou at three o'clock this afternoon.

MATRIMONIAL.—We congratulate Mr. Hammond R. Large upon the interesting event which took place at Montague on the 17th, and wish both him and his amiable partner the fullest measure of success and prosperity.

PICTOU'S NATAL DAY.—Pictou's 117th anniversary was celebrated with the customary programme of sports, and passed off very pleasantly. The attendance of visitors, however, was smaller than usual owing to the threatening weather.

ATTENTION.—We are informed that the new celebrated house on St. Peter's Road is again in full blast, and that a similar house nearer town on the same road is doing a flourishing business. We again direct the attention of the authorities.

FIRE AT SUMMERSIDE.—A barn belonging to Mr. Robert Bowness, of Summerside, was burned down last night. The fire is supposed to have been started by an incendiary. The firemen worked well and prevented the flames from spreading.

SHIFTING ORDINANCE.—We learn that a second shifting ordinance team is being organized in this city. As in the case of the Quebec team, both city batteries will be represented. The new team will, we understand, challenge the Quebec team to a friendly competition shortly.

VERY CREDITABLE.—Mr. V. A. Landry, editor and proprietor of the *Evangeline*, Weymouth, has printed a special illustrated edition of the *Evangeline*, in commemoration of the recent Acadian Convention at Church Point, Digby County. The publication is highly creditable throughout. Among the illustrations is a picture of His Grace Archbishop O'Brien.

A MONCTON BLAZE.—On Wednesday evening fire broke out in a shed connecting Knight's bakery with a barn. When the alarm was given the barn was a mass of flame and the fire had spread to the bakery. The barn and sheds were totally destroyed, the other buildings being only slightly damaged. The loss is covered by insurance.

COAL DISCOVERY.—The Bridgetown, N.S. *Monitor* says: Last October Abram Duke-shire, of Maitland, while digging a well on his premises, discovered a seam of coal about 14 inches wide, running across the centre of the well. Recently samples of the coal were sent to New York to be tested, with the result that it has been declared the genuine article.

DALHOUSIE COLLEGE.—The results of the examinations—exhibitions and bursaries—have been made public. S. W. Robertson, of P. E. Island, won a senior exhibition, and E. Brehaut and Mary S. Ross each captured a junior exhibition. H. McNeill won a senior bursary and Hedley Ross a junior bursary. THE EXAMINER congratulates these Island students on their success.

FOOTBALL.—There was a large and enthusiastic gathering of football players at the office of Stewart & McNeill last evening. It was resolved to begin play this afternoon. The regular days of play will be as follows: Tu-nday, Thursday and Saturday from 4.30 to 6 p. m., and Tuesday and Friday from 7 to 8 a. m. It is likely that the Abegweits will send a team abroad this season.

LA GRIPPE COMING BACK.—The Windsor *Tribune* says: An eminent European doctor announces a second official visit of la grippe. The public will be pleased (1) to know that several modern improvements have been added, making it quite superior to the well remembered plague of last year. The chief feature hereafter is to be a tremendous swelling of the tongue, which will fall hardest on gluttons and gossipers, and will establish a suspension of their habitual operations for three days and nights.

THERE is only one really Scotch choir travelling in America this season, and that is Bruce & Patrick's Balmoral Choir. There is no mistake about this. The success of the Balmoral last year has, as usual in such cases, led to imitation, and several organizations are now trying to win popularity on the lines laid down by Bruce & Patrick. STRUCK BY A TRAIN.—The Moncton *Times* say: Victor Arsenault, who has been working at Buckley's Mill, at Acadieville Siding, Kent Co., was struck by McDerog's working train about a mile east of Rogersville while on his way to the mill, on Sunday night. He stepped off the track to let the train pass, but dropping a bundle went to pick it up and was struck. His head was cut open on the forehead. He was taken to the hospital at Newcastle, but there is little hope of his recovery. The young man is about 26 years of age.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

NEWS FROM OTTAWA.

OTTAWA, Sept. 19. The gross revenue of the Post Office department for the fiscal year 1889-90 shows an increase of over a quarter of a million dollars over the previous year.

Adam Brown has received so far only one hundred and fifty applications for space at the Jamaica Exhibition. He intends visiting the fairs at Toronto, Sherbrooke, Ottawa and St. John, with a view to securing the best possible exhibits.

W. C. Whitaker has been gazetted Assistant Post Office Inspector for New Brunswick.

Notice is given of an application for the incorporation of the New England and Nova Scotia Navigation Company, Limited, capital \$1,000,000, headquarters at Halifax, with the object of carrying on a steamship and sailing vessel business between various ports in Nova Scotia and foreign countries. The provisional directors are Allan Haley, Thomas McMillan, John Whyte, Arthur Dickie, and Governor Carvell, of P. E. Island.

A Train Wrecked.

READING, Pa., Sept. 19. A wreck occurred on the Reading Railroad, 17 miles above this place, about 6.45 o'clock to-night. The cars went into the river. According to the estimate, four or more bodies remain in the wreck or have been swept away by the current. Over 25 wounded and 13 dead have been taken out of the wreck. The train which left this city at 6.05, running 38 to 40 miles an hour, and had on board 125 to 150 passengers, consisted of engine, tender, mail and express cars and three passenger cars. Above Shoemakerville is a curve where the railroad is about twenty feet higher than the Schuylkill River. Shortly before a freight train ran into a coal train, throwing several cars on the opposite track, and before the train hands had time to go back to warn the approaching train of the danger, the Pottsville express came round the curve and crashed into the wrecked cars. The entire train went down the embankment. Physicians and a force of 300 workmen were taken to the spot by the Company, but the work was slow and the dead and dying were taken out with great difficulty.

The Methodist Conference.

MONTREAL, Sept. 19. A question of privilege was raised concerning some statements made in the Committee on Missions, and given to the press before presentation to the Conference. An invitation to go up to Mount Royal on the Elevated Railway to-morrow was accepted. A cordial reception was given to delegates from the British Methodist Episcopal Church. The Book Committee reported net profits on the *Guardian* for four years of \$23,000, and on Sabbath School papers, \$12,000. The price of the *Guardian* remains unchanged. *Home and School* is to be adapted to Epworth Leagues and general circulation. The report on tobacco, recommending instead of requiring total abstinence from the use of the same by all officials in the church, was after a warm debate adopted by a sweeping majority. Parliament is to be asked to enact a law making its sale to minors a punishable offence. Only committees will meet to-morrow.

The Fredericton Races.

FREDERICTON, Sept. 19. The races are again postponed till to-morrow afternoon at one o'clock, when the colt race, the free-for-all and running races will be called on. To-day has been very fine here.

The Queen Wants Details.

MONTREAL, Sept. 19. The Queen has cabled Lord Stanley, asking for details of the arrest of R. N. O'Brien, the alleged libeller of Prince George, whose case is now before the Montreal police court. O'Brien is a native of Halifax.

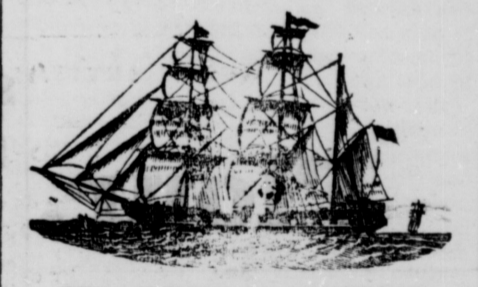
